## **The President's Notes**

The Metro Parks of Butler Co had their Cardboard Regatta July 20<sup>th</sup>. I wasn't able to make last year's event, but signed on for these years. I didn't realize how Big the event was. There were cars parked on the grass all the way out to the front gate. We had a full complement of members signed up and others came along to help out. We sure needed them. We did some casting instruction and fly tying too. I worked with the casting group and I don't think I permanently scarred anyone. We were able to work with both kids and adults. A number of people took with them our new membership pamphlets. Tony Kalbli worked with some of us on long cast and double hauls. I think this may be a precursor to his "salt water" class that will be held in October. Thanks for the tips. The fly tyers were inside in the conference center. The station was located on the way to the inside bathrooms, so they had a lot of traffic. I saw some great demonstrations, and a number of kids and parents tying their first flies. Some of them were quite good! They fed us well and the races were fun to watch. I am looking forward to next year. Thanks to everyone that helped and a special thanks to Ed Jones for putting this together for us.

The weather continues to be unusual. Heavy rains, then rain, then extended hot temperatures. The streamers are getting a good work out this year. As the summer progresses, I am going to start using my water thermometer more frequently. Trout are very sensitive to the water's temperature. In the spring they will start to feed at around 40 degrees and actively feed at 55 degrees. The best fishing is when the water is between 60 and 65 degrees. The ideal is around 61. When the temps get above 65, the effort to get food starts to be more than the benefit of taking it. The trout will slow down and become very picky and maybe go into lockjaw. If a trout is hooked the fight will put the fish in danger. Reviving them will take a long time and may not be possible. Most DNRs will not stock trout in fisheries very often when water temperature gets over 70 degrees. The best thing to do is check the water temperature. If the temperature is above 65, look for another place to fish where it may not be so warm. Try closer to the spillway; look for a spring feeding the river or creek. The bushes and trees along the streams may be a bane to our casting but they are critical to helping keep the sun off the waters. The water is more oxygenated by waterfalls and in riffles. The fish will gather there. If all else fails, don't fish for trout and fish for our warm water fish. The black bass and sunfish are a lot more temperature tolerant. A Smallie will fight every bit as well as any trout pound for pound.

At our next meeting, Jim Stone, the President of the Ohio Council of the International Federation of Fly Fishers will be our speaker. Steve Rose, the Treasurer of OHC, should be riding down with him. They are both members of the Mohican Fly Fishers and the Clear Fork is their home trout water. They will be speaking about the Ohio Council and the IFFF. We are an affiliate IFFF club, which means some of us are members but not all are required to be. We pay a per capita for our affiliation to IFFF. Part of what Jim and Steve would like to do is answer any questions you might have. It would be helpful if you would send these questions to me and I will send them on.

# Up a Creek

I don't know why it always happens when I'm up the creek quite a distance. I was fishing in a small creek that I had never been in before so I was exploring as much as fishing. As it's the middle of the summer and muggy, I decided to use some hip waders rather than full length waders. I had never used these hip waders before even though I had kind of made them.

Actually, about two years ago my wife had come home from some garage sales and announced that she had bought me some waders. Based on my years of marital training, my usual response to someone, usually my wife, buying me something like fishing equipment is to say thank you and put it on the shelf somewhere hoping its existence will be forgotten and they can eventually be disposed of properly. This usually works, however, there is that question that sometimes comes up from the giver some time later and it goes "whatever happened to \_\_\_\_\_ (?)\_\_\_\_\_ (fill in the blank). I hate hearing that question especially when I know from the beginning that I would never use whatever it was.

These waders are a full length boot foot waders with felt soles from Cabela's. They are a heavy canvas, by today's standards, probably fifteen years old. They went to the basement where they stayed for a year. Last year I decided that what I would do is to cut the legs off from the top. After I cut them off, I rolled the top of the legs down an inch and sewed it all around. Then I sewed on a vertical strap on the outside so that I could fasten the strap to my belt to hold the legs up.

So I'm out here on the maiden voyage of my hip waders, exploring this creek and fishing some. The bottom was a mixture of small pea gravel that you would sink in about two to three inches as you wade, sand, and pointy rocks of various sizes. Everything is going along fine. When I got to about a hundred yards from where I eventually turned around to go back, I noticed that the rocks were really pointy here and not too fun to walk on. They didn't look that bad and really didn't look much worse than what I had already walked on, so I kept on going being a little more careful where I stepped. I finally decided to turn around and go back. I started thinking that these waders were so uncomfortable on the bottom of my feet that I would have to put something in the inside of the boot to cushion my feet. I decided to check the felt soles on the boots with my hand. To my surprise I found out that I didn't have felt soles anymore, just the rubber bottom of the boot. Somewhere along the line the glue that held the felt soles on had come unglued and I was basically wading with moccasins. It was going to be a long walk back.

Now that I know I have this problem my feet seemed to hurt more. After I had gone a ways back, in some pain I might add, I noticed a tractor path off to the right that went up to a corn field. I had not seen it before on the way up the creek. The tractor path looked like mud, not pointy rocks, so I decided to give it a shot.

It was much easier walking. I got all the way back to where I had initially come across the creek without stepping on any more rocks. All I had to do was go through some woods and wade back across the creek, read pointy rocks. When I got home I had two jobs to take care of. First, I made sure that my wife knew what terrible and traumatic difficulties I had just been through. Second, I cut the straps off of the top of the waders and then made sure that the waders were disposed of properly.
