President's Corner

At the November B.U.F.F. Board of Directors meeting (November 17, 2004), the Board voted to postpone the 2005 BOD elections by one month. The election will be held during the January membership meeting (January 12, 2005) instead of December. Our reasoning for this change is a good one in my opinion. As B.U.F.F. has continued to grow over the years, our need for additional leadership to support this growth and move forward has increased as well. Over the years we have increased the number of club trips, our education program is second to none and we have significantly increased our outreach programs for women and kids. But to continue to serve our membership now and in the future, we need to expand our leadership base, starting with the Board of Directors. Our current bylaws limit the number of Directors to thirteen (no more, no less). The Board is proposing a change in the Bylaws that will not limit the number of BOD members to thirteen, but will set the minimum at thirteen. We are blessed to have more than thirteen members who have stepped forward to volunteer to serve on the Board and set our direction over the next year. If the membership approves of the proposed bylaw change, I am confident that the new, expanded Board will serve our club well in 2005. Having Fun – For those of you who missed the November dinner meeting, you missed a great presentation on kayaking and smallmouth fishing. Jeff Little (Blue Ridge Kayak Fishing) showed us the opportunities and watchouts of fishing with a kayak. Jeff Kelble (Playing Hookie Guide Service) equally did a great job discussing techniques for smallmouth fishing. At the December meeting, come listen to Ronald Preston, Steam Ecologist, provide a presentation on “Stream Restoration: Addressing Our Legacy of Habitat Destruction”. You will still have one more opportunity to nominate a member for the Fly Fisher of the Year Award. This is our highest honor we award to one member every year to recognize their leadership and actions in B.U.F.F. and for the sport of fly fishing. The Fly Fisher of the Year election will be at the January 12, 2005 meeting and the award will be presented at our annual Banquet. So plan on coming to the December meeting and please remember to make your reservations.

Proposed B.U.F.F. By-Laws Changes

As with just about everything in life, things change. This is true of Buckeye United Fly Fishers as well. B.U.F.F. came into existence back in the 1970's by a small, but energetic and dedicated founding members. In September of 1997, B.U.F.F. was incorporated as a non-profit organization with a mission to promote fly fishing through education, assist in the protection and improvement of our natural resources, and to be a voice of organized fly fishers. Through the last three decades, we have continued to grow, both in the size of our membership as well as the number of activities and events. When B.U.F.F. was incorporated in 1997, a set of By-laws was approved to help govern and guide the organization. In the By-laws, we are required to hold annual elections for our officers and BOD (board of directors) members. There are four officers – President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The By-laws also stipulate that there will be thirteen (exactly thirteen, no more, no less) Directors elected. The Bylaws have served B.U.F.F. well over the years. But we are a different and much larger organization than we were in 1997. With this growth has come an ever increasing involvement in new and expanding education and outreach programs. We need the efforts and leadership from the BOD to manage these activities as well as continue to find new opportunities.

We have a great organization, of which we should all be proud. Our level of volunteer support is steadily increasing, the very thing we need to continue to flourish. We want to do everything we can to encourage this support. One way to do this is to not limit the BOD to thirteen, but change the number of Directors to a minimum of thirteen. By modifying our By-laws, we can take advantage of this opportunity to include an expanding volunteer base interested in supporting and leading B.U.F.F. in the years to come.

Per the By-laws, we are required to inform our membership about any proposed By-law changes thirty days in advance in writing. This Buffer announcement and posting on our website will serve as our notice. We will vote on the proposed change at the January dinner meeting (January 12, 2005). A complete set of By-laws can be found on our website (under "Library"). If you do not have access to the website, but are interested in reviewing the By-laws, please call me (513-697-9576) and I will be happy to mail you a copy.

Current By-Laws:

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS OF THE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers of the Organization.

The members shall annually elect or re-elect from the eligible members of the Organization the following Officers:

- A) President
- B) Vice President
- C) Secretary
- D) Treasurer

Section 2. Directors of the Organization.

The members shall annually elect or re-elect from the eligible members of the Organization, thirteen Directors. Each director will be assigned prime responsibility for one or more function of the organization, such as Education, Conservation, Membership, etc.

Proposed Change to By-Laws:

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS OF THE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. Officers of the Organization.

The members shall annually elect or re-elect from the eligible members of the Organization the following Officers:

- A) President
- B) Vice President
- C) Secretary
- D) Treasurer

Section 2. Directors of the Organization.

The members shall annually elect or re-elect from the eligible members of the Organization **a minimum of thirteen** Directors. Each Director will be assigned prime responsibility for one or more function of the organization, such as Education, Conservation, Membership, etc.

FLY FISHING FIRST CLASS!

(Rockwell Springs Trip Report)

First class, top of the line, luxurious, top shelf, country club style, fly fishing at it's finest – all terms to describe the BUFF Trip to The Rockwell Springs Trout Club on October 30-31st near Toledo, OH.

The Rockwell Springs Trout Club is actually a trout fly-fishing country club. The club has all of the features you'd find at a typical private golf country club without any of the "little white ball" frustrations. Club house, dining room, bar, pro shop (Orvis), pro guides (Glenn Weisner and Wayne Samson of Glenn River Fly Company), manicured grounds, and locker rooms. But more importantly, there are hundreds and hundreds of healthy, good-sized to absolutely giant trout. The club has a spring fed, crystal clear stream meandering for three and a half miles through its fifty acres. Two thirds of the property is maintained and landscaped like a golf course with the stream changing from runs to pools and back again. The remaining one third of the property is still in it's "wild" undeveloped state with wider runs and larger pools (some say the biggest fish as well). We stayed at their new sleeping lodge which accommodated eight people, located on the undeveloped side of the property. You could walk as little as five to ten yards from the lodge and start fishing.

The trip was set up by Glenn Weisner and Wayne Samson - the partnership that makes up the Glenn River Fly Co. Ltd. Glenn and Wayne are award winning fly tiers and their business is the preparation and sale of pre-packaged fly tying kits for beginners and experts who tie their own flies. Their line of products can be found at their web site www.glenriver.com Glenn and Wayne provided informal guide tips during both days. They also sponsored a fly tying session for all of us Saturday night after the excellent dinner we had in a private room at the clubhouse. They provided the materials to tie two each of their "Para-nymph" (hatching nymph used as an indicator fly) and tiny black midge larvae/pupa combinations. These two flies provided us each with a "hopper and dropper" combination that the fish literally and figuratively ate up during midge hatches! Virtually all of us caught fish on each of their flies on top and below the water. The other thing Glenn and Wayne provide was expert commentary and discussion based on their balanced combination of academic study and practical fish catching experience. They were happy to answer all of our fishing questions.

The BUFF members making the trip included Mike Bryant, Lee Chambers, Lou Haynes, Jeff McElravy, Bob Rohrbach, Bill Schobel and Steve Walker. We fished all day Saturday and Sunday and although no official tally was taken I'd bet we averaged 25-30 really nice fish each. All were caught and released. If you wanted to keep any fish you caught you could pay for them by the pound and the club would clean and package them for you. In addition to the number of fish caught there were also some truly trophy-sized catches in excess of twenty inches. I was the rookie in the group and I caught three eighteen "inchers"! Needless to say, this trip has been the highlight of my trout fishing experience to date! I don't want to give the impression that the fish were easy to catch. In many cases you could sight cast to a specific fish but you had to keep changing flies until you found the food it was looking for and present it in a way that didn't spook them. Some of the flies that worked well, in addition to the Glenn River flies mentioned above, included white midge larvae/pupa, brown zonkers, scuds, pink San Juan worms, red San Juan worms, brown woolly buggers, white woolly buggers, and some of Lou Haynes' "special editions" that I'm not cleared to discuss in public. Talk to others who went to find out what worked best for them. The only downside to the weekend was some rain Saturday morning and high winds all day Saturday. But even these two challenges were overcome because the fish never stopped biting and we all learned to deal with the weather. All in all, this trip was just about as good as it gets. Great accommodations, expert guides, fine food, helpful discussion, fly tying and really great fishing. Fly fishing first class – it's the only way to fly!

Michigan Fall Steelhead Trip

It was cold, rainy, windy & down right nasty!
PERFECT Michigan weather for fall Chrome Steelhead

On November 18, David French and Steve Walker made a nine hour trip north to fish the Muskegon River in Newaygo, Michigan. Our guide was Chad Betts of Betts Guide Service. (the nine hours includes the mandatory stop at Cabela's). David had scheduled us to fish two days with Chad out of his jet boat. We arrived in Newaygo Thursday afternoon and headed to a close stretch of water so I could learn the chuck-and-duck system. After a couple of hours of no fish, I had learned how to break off my tippet so I could tie on some more flies to lose them again.

We hooked up with Chad on Friday morning at the restaurant next to where we were staying. While we were eating and hearing Chad's plan, a number of local guides stopped over to talk to Chad. All of them were willing to share their numbers of fish taken and where they found them. (keep in mind that none of them were swearing on a stack of Cabela's catalogs). We were on the river by about 9:00 o'clock. Chad informed us that he had devised a new system for getting the flies down to the fish with a more natural drift. We were to be his first clients to use it. This new system is still very much like the traditional chuck-and-duck but with a very large indicator which helps keep the flies from being snagged on the bottom. Even though it was rainy and cold, I was happier already.

On the trip up, David had already warned me that I should lower any expectations that I had on the number of fish we would catch. Chad was echoing that thought saying that we could expect about five hook-ups and land two or three, but they were big. With that mind set, I was kind of ready to fish.

Nothing happened until late morning (by the way it rained all day). All of a sudden I had a bite and set the hook. Line started screaming off of the reel on my eight weight rod and I'm hanging on. After a lot of jumps by the fish, a lot of cranking by me, and a lot of coaching from the fellows in the boat with me, we managed to land my first steelhead, a big powerful female (thanks also to Chad's anti-reverse Billy Pate reels and fighting butts on big Orvis rods). I think David also hooked and landed a big steelhead before lunch.

Chad's system proved it's worth in the afternoon. We totaled for the day eleven hook-ups with David landing three and Steve two, not that I was counting. These are much higher averages than usual for fall steelhead fishing.

Saturday morning we got started again with an intermittent mist and a little warmer air temperature. The morning was slow as it was the day before. Then just as we were starting to go set up for lunch around noon, the steelies started hitting. Lunch didn't happen until about 3:00 o'clock. Among the fish we landed Steve had an eight pound, 24 inch brown trout that fought like a steelhead and David had an 11 ½ pound steelhead. That was the only steelhead that we weighed but was not the biggest for either of us. These fall steelies are incredibly beautiful bright chrome with hints of rainbow colors.

For the two day trip we totaled over thirty solid hook-ups and landed thirteen magnificent fish. Chad said that it was the best fall fly fishing trip that he has had. Besides being an excellent fisherman, David is a professional photographer and took some terrific pictures. He was also my net man for some of the fish. 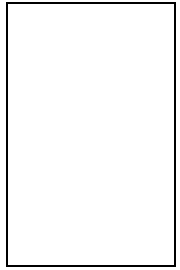

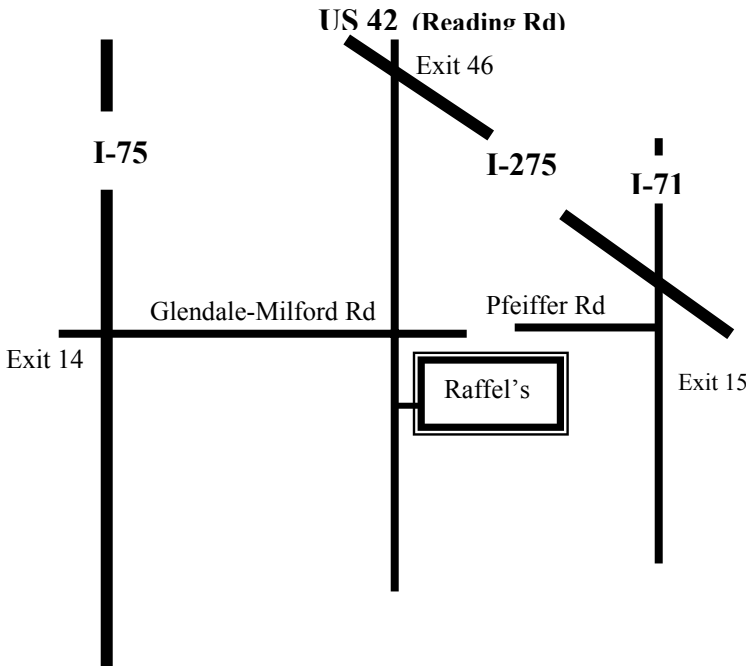
