Great Water Bug

Fortunately the North America Toe Biter also known as Giant Water Bug doesn't prey on humans but if someone with bare feet were unlucky enough to step on one they might quickly learn how it got its name. They are aquatic insects that live in still water like lakes and ponds. They have lungs instead of gills and are often seen hanging upside down just under the water and holding on to a stem of vegetation. They have two retractable breathing tubes that extend from their abdomen to above the surface for air. From this perch they can pounce on their prey and with strokes of their powerful middle and hind legs can catch insects, fish, frogs, tadpoles, small birds, and anything else they can grasp in their powerful pinches. They inject an enzyme into the prey to kill it and break the tissue down into something easily digestible. The ones in our

area live for a couple of years and can be fairly active during the winter. They have been seen swimming under the ice, but will burrow into the lake or pond bottom if need be to survive. With the arrival of spring, the mating season begins and they fly from pond to pond looking for a mate. It is during these flights that they flutter around lights in large numbers, earning their other nickname "electric light bugs". The female approaches the male to begin the courtship ritual which involves sparring with one another in midair. To ensure that he is the father, the male after copulating will have the female attach the eggs to his back but only a few at a time. They then copulate again and again until the male's entire back is covered with approximately 150 eggs. The male takes care of the eggs, frequently stroking them with his hind legs, and exposing them to air so they can dry off to retard any mold. After about three weeks the eggs hatch and the young start out on their own as small nymphs. For eight to ten weeks the juveniles go through five instars (various forms of development between molts) before becoming adults.

For those of you who do not know him, Chris is a world class fly tier, most notably known for his work with deer hair, including his famous deer hair mouse, bass bugs, muddlers, and more. In addition, he has made numerous DVD's on tying. Not only is he a great tier, Chris is recognized as arguably the leading expert on deer hair in general. In addition to running his shop, he collects and processes deer hides each year for major suppliers such as Nature's Spirit. Chris is a good friend to many of us and has over the years been a great supporter of B.U.F.F. Chris has always had an outstanding stock of tying supplies. To many of us, visiting the shop is akin to being a kid turned loose in a candy store (except we don't have someone else to pay for our extravagance at the end of the day). The 2014 Fly Show is shaping up to be our best ever--over 40 exhibitors are already in the fold, and the show is well on its way to a sell-out of exhibitor booths. The Cincinnati fly show has become one of the best in the Midwest over the years and is drawing unprecedented interest in new and returning exhibitors.

The show will have a superb lineup of speakers, casting demonstrations, and fly tying demonstrations. Show headliner is A K Best, a top name in fly fishing and tying circles and the author of many magazine articles and books. Speakers include:

A K Best – two presentations: "Fishing with Too Much Water" and "Fishing with Little Water"

Dane Law, Southeastern Anglers – "Trout Fishing the Southern Appalachians and Beyond"

Frank Willetts, Pere Marquette River Lodge – "Steelhead vs. Trout"

Jon Ray, Hawkins Outfitters – "Smallmouth on the Fly"

Jerry Darkes, Angling Consultive Services – "New Fly Fishing Gear for the Coming Year"

There will be featured fly tying demonstrations by top notch tiers: A K Best (two presentations), Glenn Weisner of Glenn River Fly Co., Mike Schmidt of Angler's Choice Flies, and Kevin Compton of Performance Flies as well as top tiers from regional fly fishing clubs, including BUFF, Northern Kentucky Fly Fishers, Miami Valley Fly Fishers, and Mohican Fly Fishers.

Casting demonstrations at the Casting Pond will be conducted by Dave Leonhard from Orvis Streamside, Traverse City, MI and Kevin Howell from Davidson River Outfitters in Pisgah Forest, NC as well as BUFF casting instructors. This year there will be more time for public access to the casting pond to try out rods for sale at the show and for Boy Scouts to work on Fly Fishing Merit Badge requirements.

Putting on a world-class fly fishing show takes a lot of work. BUFF is fortunate to have a dedicated team of volunteers working hard to prepare for the show. To date, 28 BUFF members have volunteered to serve on the Fly Show Committee or to work the day of the show. We need more volunteers. 
