Blind Auction Guided Fishing Trip Report Bob Bowers

I placed the winning bid at the BUFF Banquet for a full day of guided, wading fly-fishing for two from Scott Cunningham of On the Fly Guide Services.

On October 6th, Scott met my son Ian and me at 0800 at our cottage in Spruce Pine, NC. The temperature was in the low 40s and the wind was about 15 mph. We had intended to wet-wade, but opted for waders instead.

Our first stop was a small stream in the village of Bakersville. It was fairly well sheltered, giving my first-time fly fisher son a chance to learn a bit without the undue influence of the wind. The fishing proved to be slow, with two hits but no hook-ups.

We next tried several of Scott's favorite places on the North Toe River, all of which were already being fished by others. We did find one location that was vacant and looked promising, but produced no fish.

We moved to a little park in the village of Spruce Pine where the North Toe flows through. The winds were funneled directly upstream and proved to be challenging. Leaves littered the feeding lanes, making dry fly fishing nearly pointless. Several locations looked promising, enough so that a few fishermen walked in on us, as those with little courtesy are prone to do. Rather than create a scene, we moved 50 feet or so and continued fishing. We fished the balance of the morning with no fish caught.

After a nice shore lunch we moved down stream where we had great success. The wind had died down considerably and we fished "hopper/dropper" combinations. I found a nice honey-hole, catching three 8 to 10 inch rainbows on 5 drifts with a BH Pheasant Tail. I moved upstream a bit to give my son the opportunity to catch fish, which he did. Between the two of us, we caught 20+ rainbows, mostly on BH Pheasant Tails, some on Hare's Ear Nymphs.

We moved further down stream, fishing some more promising water. We could count in one hole perhaps 15 fish holding deep. Nothing we tried evoked any interest at all. The fish would simply move out of the way and regroup as a fly drifted through.

We ended the day of fishing around 1700 hours, in time to not be too neglectful of our wives.

Ian and I returned to the North Toe the next day with only moderate success. The wind had increased a bit making the favored Stimulator/BH Pheasant Tail combination difficult to fish. Leaves fouled the Stimulator constantly. We eventually abandoned this approach in favor of a strike indicator/nymph combination. I spent much of the afternoon helping my son and simply working on improving my casting skills and getting that perfect drift over varying current conditions.

This was a very enjoyable trip. Scott provided valuable tips to my novice son and also to me. I am convinced that the weather, combined with low water conditions, conspired to make very good trout waters produce only modest fish numbers caught. I will return to these waters, very likely with the services of Scott Cunningham as a guide. You might well consider placing a bid on this trip in March.

Trip Report: Smoky Mountain Trout Trip 2010 Jerry Schatzman

The Smoky Mountain Trout Trip was a success. We had nine members on the trip, and everyone caught fish. We stayed at the Smoky Mountain Retreat near Bryson City. We had two cabins each with 8 beds. There were three private bedrooms and two loft areas, each with 2 double beds. The bedroom on the second floor had two double beds.

Pete Moore and Steve Walker fished the Trophy Water on the Cherokee Indian Reservation on Thursday. They each caught a few fish.

Ed Jones and Don Prince did a float trip with a guide on the Tuckaseegee River. The river was down and the guide had to drag the boat over many areas, as a result they did not catch many fish.

The rest of the crew fished the Tuckaseegee River near Webster. Bruce James and Gary Cummins out fished everyone. They had 31 and 29 respectively. WOW! Gary had an 18 inch Rainbow. They were both using wooly buggers with chartreuse tails. Talking with other fisherman we found out that the DNR had stocked Brooks, Browns, and Rainbow earlier in the week. The fish were in pods and not very well dispersed throughout the stream. If you found a pod you could usually catch a few fish.

On Friday, everyone decided that the "Tuck" was the place to go. As we arrived to fish at Webster, there were emergency vehicles near the river, and blocking one lane. A car was off the road and in the trees between the road and the river. We never hear the story behind the accident, hopefully no one was injured.

We found that the fish had dispersed somewhat from the day before. Bruce and Gary had to work a little harder for their fish.

Ed Jones started off with the hot hand with a Elk Hair Caddis (12 or 14) on top with a trailer (14-16 Prince nymph) about 18-20 inches down. He had 6-8 fish in about 15 minutes. Being a good Buddy, he shared his secrets combo with everyone. I was up steam from him and quickly changed, but used a size 16 Copper John. I did not have any small Prince nymphs. Ed's combo worked for me and I was able to catch Brooks, Browns and Rainbows throughout the day, even a few fish on the dry fly. About 10:30 am the sun broke through the clouds and the fish seem to take a break. We all tried other thing without success. I stayed with Ed's combo, but changed the depth of the second fly to abut 30 inches. This combo worked and several of us fished it, the rest of the day.

Pete Moore was fishing down stream from Ed Jones and me. He landed the biggest fish of the day. It was easy 20 inches. There is a picture of him on the website with this fish.


We all headed back to the cabin for a walleye dinner. Don Prince provided the walleye, Ed Dahmann helped with Mac and cheese. Everyone pitched in for dinner and a perfect end to a good day of fishing.

Saturday, we all had eggs sausage and toast for breakfast, and headed to the "Tuck". When we arrived, the river was up about 1½ to 2 feet from the previous day. We talked to some people on the shore who said Saturday was a day for "generating". Most of us headed for the Nantahala River. Bruce James, Ed Dahmann, and I went up stream to the last bridge and caught a few trout. We then moved down stream to some other holes without much success. We continued down stream and found Pete Moore and Steve Walker under the second bridge setting on fish. They had a honey hole and shared with their fellow buffers Ed Jones and Mike Jenior.

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Don Prince and Gary Cummins stayed at the Tuck, which was on its way down and fished there all day with success.

We finished the trip with a great dinner at Pasqualino's Italian Restaurant on Saturday evening. It was a great time to be in North Carolina, the trees were just starting to change colors, and the weather was just wonderful. We had cool mornings and warm sunny afternoons. Thanks to everyone on the trip, I got my deposit back from the owners with a thank you note raving about how the cabins were cleaner than when we arrived. Thanks again to Don Prince for providing the walleye for our dinner.



CUMBERLAND RIVER TRIP

We had eight members go on the trip. The river had been holding with a discharge of 2020 cubic ft per sec (CFPS) from the dam. At his flow the river is wadeable and fishable. Some brought water crafts (drift boat, canoe and kayak) to fish from and the others plan to just wade the river.

On the first day, Thursday, the three water crafts started on a float trip of 11.2 miles about 3:00 PM or later. Before they reached the take out point, fog began to settle in and darkness was coming fast. Only heads could be seen above the fog. They thought they might have to make plans to sleep on the river over night.

On Friday the flow was very low till 10 AM when the release went back to the 2020 CFPS. The waders were fishing at the landing at the end of Ray Mann road when the water quckly came back up to the 2020 CFPS flow 2 hours earlier than posted. I was making my way back the rivers edge when I stepped in wash-out and got my waders partly filled with water. That is not a comforting feeling. The river was full of debris and contained a lot of suspended particles making it difficult to fish.

The total number of fish caught could have been counted on two hands. We couldn't even catch any trout in the kiddy stream at the hatchery. The up and down of the river must have caused the trout to lay low.

To add insult to injury, those who left early on Saturday; the motel charged us for three nights not two. Check your bill!

In 2009 we planned this trip 3 times and high water cancelled each of them. This trip will not be scheduled again until the work on the dam is completed. The constant changing of the river level doesn't make for good fishing.

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
