"ABC News reported on eyewitnesses who discovered a large, bizarre, bloblike life form floating in a lake. One witness came up with the theory that it must have come from out of this world. The entity was henceforth dubbed the "Alien Pod."

The "Alien Pod" didn't come from outer space, unless there were flying saucers during the Cambrian Period 500,000,000 years ago. A colony of macroinvertebrates that lives and functions as one large animal is classed as Bryozoan. Corals are an example and their skeletons are found in numerous fossils, but not all Bryozoans leave behind a skeleton; some are gelatinous. The "Alien Pod" is a Bryozoan sometimes called "Dragon Booger" that is made up of several thousand individual macroinvertebrates named Pectinatella Magnifica. They usually appear during August or September in nutrient rich waters with little or no current and are often anchored to a submerged object. Their presence is a sign of good water quality and they feed on plankton such as algae. As fall approaches, they release their eggs that don't go far but cling to the colony until the cold water causes the colony to disintegrate. The eggs then go into a state of diapause until conditions are right to start another disgusting blob.



Inland Waters



Ohio's inland waters provide a diversity of opportunities. These include over 60,000 miles of rivers and streams, 451 miles of shoreline that border the Ohio River, and numerous lakes and reservoirs. Ohio has very few natural lakes because it was only partially inhabited by glaciers during the ice age, unlike states such as Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Michigan. Near the end of the last ice age, as glaciers retreated, large deposits of ice were left behind in hollows that later melted to create lakes. Therefore, only 110 natural lakes of 5 acres or greater are found here, with 69 of these lakes less than 25 acres and 41 between 25 and 345 acres, for a total of 4,658 acres. Many of Ohio's natural lakes are privately owned and few have not been modified with water control structures, such as dams.

Artificial lakes, also called reservoirs, represent a greater portion of Ohio's inland lakes. To meet Ohio's needs for transportation, water supply, flood control and other uses, a variety of manmade reservoirs have been built since the early 1800s. Today, 112,536 acres of water are available for public fishing in over 170 reservoirs of 25 acres or greater.

The three primary types of reservoirs are canal lakes, tributary reservoirs, and upground reservoirs. The canal lakes were built to provide water sources for transportation canals of the 1800s. Tributary reservoirs were built by creating dams on major streams to provide flood control or water supply. Upground reservoirs were built above ground and used primarily for water supply. None of these reservoirs were constructed for the primary purpose of fishing, so the quality of fishing can vary considerably from one to the next depending upon the uses of the reservoir, operation of its dam or water control structure, and the quality of the land surrounding the lake, or watershed. Procedures for Selection Fly Fisher of the Year

The following procedure/timeline for selection the Fly Fisher of the Year (FFofY) was approved at the October Board of Directors meeting. It will be incorporated into the BUFF official Guidelines & Policies, and will be used for the selection on the 2012 FFofY.

1. By November of each calendar year, the President will present to the Board of Directors a recommendation for a Fly Fisher of the Year Nominating Committee composed of 3-5 BUFF members in good standing, including at least one member of the Board of Directors. The Board will accept or amend the recommendation as it deems appropriate. Serving Nominating Committee members will not be eligible for the FFofY award for that year.

2. The Nominating Committee will select it's committee chair, determine it's operating procedures, and solicit recommendations from the membership, including rationale for each recommendation, not later than December.

3. The Nominating Committee will consider all recommendations and prepare a ballot consisting of not more than 5 nominees from the membership recommendations, and distribute ballots at the January and February membership meetings. Voting will be held at the February meeting. FFofY selection should be based on service to BUFF, organization priorities and activities, and to fly fishing in general, rather than personal friendships.

4. The Nominating Committee will tally ballots and inform the President of balloting results no later than the February Board of Directors meeting.

5. The President will make the award at the annual banquet.


