The Great Miami River

I put in at Indian Lake where the Great Miami River starts. My goal-back in 1988-was to canoe in stages to the Ohio River. I was in high spirits as I anticipated a day of canoeing and fishing. The river was swift, not too wide, and quite clear, but as I paddled downstream it seemed devoid of aquatic life-certainly fish. The exception was where a drain pipe entered from a field attracting a swarm of carp.

About 5 miles downstream there was a stretch where a storm had blown trees down and across the river. At one spot the only way to go forward was to either drag my canoe up some steep mud banks, or just possibly, I could lean back and squeeze under a sloping tree and get through. I opted for the under the tree route-a decision that afforded me the pleasure of hauling my canoe and what remained of my fishing gear along with myself, now wet, from under the tree and up the muddy slope.

By the time I made it though the downed tree stretch my mood was considerably darker. The next surprise was to see a northern pike, about 28 inches long, floating belly up in the middle of the river. I remember thinking that he just rolled over and died when he realized he had made a wrong turn while swimming in his Minnesota home and ended up here.

Since then I've seen a much better side to the Great Miami River. In fact the northern pike may have not been lost at all, but part of a reproducing population that exists in the river above Tipp City. I once caught a 19" pike here on the fly rod and the Internet shows pictures of much larger fish taken from this stretch of the river.

Around Cincinnati a northern pike would be unusual-but walleye and sauger are common below the first dam in Hamilton. Also prevalent in our stretch of the river are smallmouth, catfish, stripers, white bass, and fresh water drum. The April/May 2009 issue of In-Fisherman-which covers fishing in the US and Canada-mentions the tailwaters below the dams at West Carrolton and Hamilton as prime smallmouth locations. The spring run of white bass can provide almost non-stop action at its peak. In my experience the Great Miami has more big fish-the ones that snap you off so quick that you're left wondering "What was that?"-than any other stream in our area.

The Great Miami is under enormous pressure from those who would develop its banks, mine its gravel, or use it as a convenient waste disposal. As a consequence the fishing can be very different depending on location. The Friends of the Great Miami work to encourage responsible development by stopping some of the worst offenders so that more of the river is healthy. Without such efforts our normal experience might be like my memorable-but frustrating-trip from Indian Lake to my pickup point where I was only too happy to see my wife with some dry clothes, and words of (almost) sympathy.

Check out the Great Miami. Perhaps it's a place where you want to fish or even be involved in local conservation efforts.

Casting For Recovery Fund Raiser A Success!

The first Fish-A-Thon fundraiser held on June 6th at a large public park near Cincinnati was an all-around success, reports CFR Program Coordinator Debbie Hampton. Nine different teams participated, raising pledges from a wide range of people in the community. All nine teams caught fish. The Central Ohio Fly Fishers' team caught 99 fish in 3 hours. Besides the fishing challenge, there was plenty for everyone to support the CFR Retreat with raffles or doggie bandanas available for a donation. While the total raised by the event was well over \$5,000, Debbie is particularly pleased "my expenses--fishing permit, water, lemonade, cups, cookies, CFR hats for teams--was very minimal for the amount of money raised and the exposure we got."

The funds are vital for annual Ohio Casting For Recovery Retreat held every September at Indian Bear Lodge for fourteen ladies from the state of Ohio. This year's Retreat will be held on September 18 – 20. Casting For Recovery is a non-profit support and education program for women who have or have had breast cancer. It provides an opportunity for women whose lives have profoundly been affected by the disease, to gather in a beautiful, natural setting and learn to fly fish, a sport for life. Through 2½-day retreats, the sport of fly-fishing is used to promote physical, emotional, and spiritual healing. The effective balance between the physical benefits of the gentle exercise provided by fly-fishing and the counseling curriculum benefits women at any age and any stage of treatment or recovery. The program allows women to get away from their disease, while providing support from the medical / psychosocial professionals present at every retreat. The retreat is totally free to each participant but the cost of having a participant is \$1,000.00 per lady.

Each Retreat is limited to fourteen women. This year over seventy ladies have applied! So the need for additional Ohio retreats is great. If you have an interest in learning more, please logon to the Casting For Recovery website (www.castingforrecovery.org).

Fly Fishing in America's Largest State Park

Wood-Tikchik State Park in Alaska is our country's largest state park at 1.6 million acres, larger than the state of Delaware. Much of it is covered with water and contains nearly every freshwater species that swims in Alaska. I traveled to the park – about 350 miles west of Anchorage - in late June to fish with Reel Wilderness Adventures out of their tent camp on Lake Nerka. The main attraction for me was the opportunity to fish for arctic char and northern pike. Other species present where I fished include sockeye salmon, grayling and rainbow trout.

Arriving at the camp on Saturday afternoon, I learned there would be only seven fly fishers present and I would be fishing all week one on one with a guide as the other six were three pairs. It was the kind of news I could deal with. It wasn't long before we were at the base of the Agulukpak River swinging streamers for arctic char. The salmon smolt migration to Bristol Bay had dozens of birds in a feeding frenzy and the char were present in force. Fishing a blue Thunder Creek minnow and using a Type V full sinking line, on my fourth cast of the trip I hooked up with a char that broke my 10 lb. fluorocarbon leader. Within 45 minutes we had released a dozen fish. While I caught char daily, hooking up with so many fish so quickly would prove to be an exception to the char fishing I would experience the rest of the week. We headed up to the head of the Agulukpak (only 2.3 miles long) to spend an hour or so fishing for grayling and rainbows using dry flies with a dropper. You have to fish through the grayling to reach the rainbows. With the grayling having an average length of around 17-18 inches it is an exceptional fishery. One of the other fly fishers caught a 22 incher. And Alaska still features rainbows on steroids.

My first full day on the water yielded the first northern pike I have ever caught on a fly. A 6 ½ inch long Murdich minnow proved to be a very effective fly – it was the best pike fly all week – and seaducers also worked well. And the Murdich minnow could take a beating and last for as many as 19 fish before it was shredded beyond use. I tried leader systems of 20 lb. fluorocarbon with a tippet of either 80 lb. spider wire (which has the diameter of 17 lb. mono) or 25 lb. hard mason. Having several bite offs with the spider wire with only a few using hard mason I believe hard mason is the way to go. While I saw 2 pike during the week that would have gone over 20 lbs. and measured over 40 inches, my largest was a 30 incher and my best 4 hour total was 53 fish. My enthusiasm for pike fishing encouraged the other six fly fishers – rainbow warriors to the core - to fish at least one session for them. And they were not disappointed with their results.

The sockeye proved to be a difficult quarry. Heavy snows over the winter and a cold spring impacted the water temperature and had the sockeye migration a little behind their normal schedule. And you really need a concentration of them to have your best chance of hooking up with these inactive feeders. I caught only 6 for the week, all of them on a sparsely tied chartreuse saddle hackle fly.

The guides were always on top of their game. One of them was Nick English, who is believed to have caught the largest steelhead ever taken on a fly. Goggle search "Nick English steelhead" if you want to feast your eyes on his 45 ¼ inch long monster.

My luck with the weather in Alaska is still holding. All of my days there this year began in the low 40s with sunny weather and temps reaching as high as 72. The bugs made their presence known when the wind was subdued, which was most of the time. The guides always had shotguns with them as there are plenty of bears present. Since it was early in the salmon migration we didn't see any brown bears on the half dozen streams we fished.

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
