We have been having our meetings at Raffel's for several years. We started paying \$10 for our meals and a couple of years ago went to \$12 with a hall rental. The Board of Directors entered negotiations with Raffel's for the next year and received a quote that was a significant raise. Directions

Traveling east on the Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway take the Winton Road exit (Traveling west, take the Galbraith Rd. exit and turn right onto Winton Rd. FollowWinton Rd. north for approximately 3 miles. Turn left onto Southshore Dr., which dead-ends at the Parky's Farm entrance.

Sign-Up Now for the Fly-fishing for King Salmon on the Pere Marquette River

Here it is at last, the long awaited trip to the Pere Marquette in search of the mighty King Salmon!

This year we will be traveling to the town of Baldwin, Michigan. Our destination is the Pere Marquette River Lodge. This is a new location with improved trip dates when compared to those we have had in the past. This location will provide us with an endorsed Orvis shop as our base of operations and is located on the seven miles of "flies only" stretch on Pere Marquette River.

Wading conditions and water temperatures are very fly fisher friendly this time of the year. With improved dates we should all have plenty of fish in the fly's only section.

This trip is a lot of fun and, if you have a one man pontoon to float the river, it's a great time. There are also plenty of restaurants and a canoe livery if you want to rent a canoe or kayak. Another great benefit is there is a full service fly shop right next door. This is an opportunity to hook and land one of the biggest and most aggressive fish you can land on your fly line. These are nice accommodations and a great time of the year to fish. Great people make this a fabulous trip that can even rival an Alaskan trip.

Trip Leader Joe Guenther has reserved several rooms at the Pere Marquette River Lodge. All rooms have air conditioning, cable TV, and wireless internet. There is a fire ring out back that we will utilize for our tales of the day. There is one room that is handicapped accessible, please call Joe if this room is needed.

Meals will be on your own, but we will plan some group breakfast and dinners. Club 37 has a pork chop dinner to kill for and the walleye dinner is to die for.

When selecting your equipment, an 8 1/2 to 10 ft fast action rod, 8-10 weight, with a disk drag reel is just the ticket. If you have a spay rod bring it, you can swing streamers for the Big King's. Polarized glasses are a must because we will be sight fishing. The main method of fishing will be chuck and duck with an amnesia running line. You will also need eggs flies, green caddis, stone flies, and egg sucking leach flies.

We will check in on Sunday, September 18 at Pere Marquette River Lodge at 4:00 p.m. We will have some experienced members from previous trips on site at the river for instructions or any questions. How much? A \$100.00 deposit will hold your spot on the trip. Meals, gasoline and travel arrangements are up to you. Lodging will cost \$40-\$50 a night. Send deposit checks payable to Jerry Schatzman, 4435 Boardwalk Court, Cincinnati, OH 45242..

The Plan: We'll be fishing on our own, self-guided, unless you prefer to hire a guide yourself. Come when you can and leave when you must. We will adjust the lodging cost per the number of nights you stay. Depending upon the number of guests per night, the cabin cost will vary. Individual cost per day will be between \$40 and \$50.

The accommodations are excellent, reasonably priced and well located, relative to the Tuckaseegee and the Nantahala Rivers. We'll be within reach of several other streams as well. No shortage of trout fishing here. We have 10 people signed up and have room for 6 more people.

Last year, we had several people with 30 plus fish per day. (Rainbows, browns and brook trout) I will not be able to make the trip this year, because of medical reasons. I will take care of all of the arrangements. Don Prince will be leading the trip and will be taking care of the final payment to Smoky Mt. Retreat.

Nature has a way of finding a balance among competing forces, but it takes time.

We are rueful of the day when invasive specie such as the Goby, Lamprey, Zebra, and the Asian Carp found our waters. We never imagined that any of our Ohio native specie could ever be considered as undesired and invasive. But the States of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, and the province of Ontario are saying some rather unkind things about one of our natives, the Rusty Crayfish (*Orconectes rusticus*). Originally the Rusty Crayfish was limited to the Ohio River watershed, but somehow it found its way into these other waters. The Rusty is larger has bigger claws and thicker shell, so they can bully their way over any other local crayfish. Because they are omnivorous, and eat about twice as much as the locals, they are being blamed for fewer macro invertebrates, less aquatic vegetation, fewer minnows, and an overall a drop in sport fishing. "FISHING IN MONTANA"

Like many of you, I have enjoyed fishing in Montana every two or three years now since I first got started 25 years ago. I have fished on the Gallatin, the Yellowstone, the spring creeks, the Bighorn, the Madison, and most recently, the Missouri River. The contrast of these fisheries is memorable. On the Yellowstone, we caught a small trout every 20 minutes or so by floating north and east from Livingston, Montana. On the Bighorn, we caught many fewer but much larger fish. It was on the Bighorn where I could see 15 to 20 feet down in the clear water where the fish gathered. But they wouldn't bite. It was the fish that were bored, perhaps because the Bighorn River is under fairly significant fishing pressure and they had seen it all before. The best part about the Bighorn was getting out of the boat, standing in the middle of the river and casting to a small drop off along a gravel rill which seemed to have an inordinate number of fish waiting for their food to fall over the edge. We pulled several aging hump backed brown trout out of this channel. At the end of the afternoon, one struck my fly so hard that it snapped it right off. I never did see what I had. Fishing on the Madison is under even greater fishing pressure. A veritable flotilla of McKenzie boats take off at the beginning of each day. It was on that Madison that I got caught in a drenching downpour at the end of the day and vowed to (once again) upgrade my gear to include a name brand impervious jacket.

It wasn't until last year (2010) that I returned to my native Missouri River to fish. It was an astonishing revelation. I had gone to high school in Bismarck, North Dakota, where the mighty Missouri is wide and muddy. Fishing is limited to an odd walleye or two and catfish, another bottom feeding fish that might be taken by bait or spin casting. When my wife discovered she had some work in Great Falls, Montana, I asked "Isn't there fishing around there, and can I come along?" So we flew out a day early so that she could go out too. We drove 45 minutes west and south from Great Falls to Craig, Montana, and put in for a half day trip. We had no problem catching browns, rainbows and an occasional whitefish. The next day I went back out for a full day by going to Wolf Creek and floating the five miles back down to Craig. Finding such a fertile cold water fishery on the Missouri was certainly a revelation. It was just the finest possible rainbow trout fishing you could imagine. I caught one every 20 minutes or so as we floated down the river. When we put in at Wolf Creek, we met Tim Linehan, a very prominent fishing guide who is active in Alaska, Northwestern Montana and I believe Florida whose ads can be seen in the fishing magazines all the time. As remarkable as anything was the village of Craig, Montana, that had a post office, a law office, and three large fly fishing tackle shops with every conceivable and beautiful piece of equipment that goes with fly fishing. As they say, if you like gear, you'll like fly fishing. Well, Craig, Montana, had it all within one block and float boats for rent. The town was completely devoted to fly fishing. The waters of the Missouri at Craig are clear and dark and yield remarkably uniform sized fish. They were all about 18 or 19 inches long. I asked the guide where the teenage fish were and he said they were up in the creeks that feed into the river upstream. What a vastly different experience it was than fishing back in Bismarck, North Dakota, on the same river so many years ago.

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

Directions:

From I-71 -- Take Exit 15, west, Pfeiffer Rd. & this becomes Glendale-Milford Rd.. At the intersection of US 42, (Reading Rd), turn left, (south) on US 42, and RAFFEL'S will be on the left approximately 3/10 mile.
