Buying a new fly rod

We all need a new fly rod sooner or later. If this is your first fly rod, or a new rod to add to your collection, you might want to glance over the following article.

This article was written by Tom Shaw, the president of Backcountry Fly Fishers located in Naples, Florida, in their December newsletter. My comments will be underlined. I know Tom, and he has a wealth of knowledge about fly-fishing and the equipment that we use. He has tried almost every combination of fly rod, fly line, rod length, and rod speed that you could think of. Much of his article is slanted to the fly fisherman who has an assortment of rods, but it pertains to the first time rod buyer, also. I put a lot of stake in what he says...what do you think?

TJA is a new help group. Tackle Junkies Anonymous. It’s the holiday season (season’s over, there are always birthdays, etc) and you’re thinking about getting a new fly rod. Sure your wife, husband (fill in the blank), and the kids have no ideas about what to get you, because you have everything made related to fly-fishing. Yeah, a new rod, that’s the ticket! That’s what they can buy me. Before you wind up with a rod you’re not thrilled with, and that sits in the closet for eternity, here are some pointers. I just wish someone had told me this a few years ago.

NEVER buy a rod without casting it. (Your local independent fly shops have rods to try before you buy.) Don’t go by a friend’s recommendation alone, or have your spouse buy it as a present. Test the rod yourself. Your casting style and ability may be quite different, and the rod that was great for your friend might not be so great for you. The local fly shops in our area have almost all the major brands available to try.

Test the rod that you would normally fish with. It’s a very important point of reference when testing various rods. The casting characteristics of a rod can change with different line configurations. I would suggest the line weight designated for the rod and one weight higher. (Your local independent fly shops have a variety of line weights to try) I used to over-line my rod and found that to be a mistake. Over-lining a slow rod can detract from it’s casting ability, but, with some of the newer faster action rods, over-lining them can turn them into turbo charged cannons.

Everyone likes to see how far he or she can throw with a rod, and will always test for that. What is equally important is the rods “dinking” ability. How well it can throw 15 to 20 feet of line? This is especially important when fishing the mangroves and docks. (This would also apply to fishing the banks of a stream, close structure, and a weed line.) How little line needs to be beyond the tip of the rod to pick up and cast back to a target without false casting? If you are fishing several hours straight, a four-count cast is twice the workload on your arm as is a two count.

So those are just a few things to consider. If you or your family is investing hundreds of dollars in a fly rod, you’d better be thrilled with it.

April Meeting Program

John Tertuliani, is a biologist from the Columbus, Ohio office of the US Geological Survey. He is also a writer and is editor of *Outdoor Writers of Ohio*, and is associated with Outdoor Writers of America. He has recently published a book entitled *Smallmouth Bass and Streams*, with the subtitle *Thoughts on Fly-Fishing*. His book presents some valuable insights into smallmouth behavior and their foraging techniques. These insights can lead to better success while fishing for them. His discussion on crayfish, that make up a significant portion of the smallmouth diet, is especially interesting, and offers some useful fly patterns to mimic the crayfish. Signed copies of the book can be purchased at the meeting. His talk will be about reading streams and fly fishing. This will be interesting to all, bass or trout fishermen, including anyone just getting started, as well as those who have spent years in the streams. This is one meeting you will not want to miss, especially if you are going on the BUFF trip to the Elkhorn this June. As a biologist for Commonwealth Technologies, and while conducting studies for Toyota Mfg., John has twice electrofished the Elkhorn. Also, as a graduate student, John had conducted field trips there.

In search of the Bronzebacks

On Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, camp at the Elkhorn Campground at the confluence of the north and south forks of the Elkhorn or get a motel on Versailles pike. Bluegrass motel 1 (502) 695-1800. For the campground, you must call 1 (502) 695-9154 and make your own reservations. They are holding 5 RV spots and 5 tent sites until April 15, 2002. There will be 2 tents to a site, so be prepared to share. It works! This is the way we get to know Buff members.

Get a reservation form from Don Hogue, 513 – 231-4852, Thesputzer@fuse.net or from the website. You must also procure a Buff consent form (also available on the website).

On Friday morning meet at the camp site, and we will match you up with an experienced mentor, show you the lay of the land, and answer any questions. On Saturday morning, Doug Mowell and Don Hogue will cook you a hot breakfast at 7:30 a.m. for \$2.00 at the campground. You will get OJ, coffee, 2 eggs, 3 link sausage and grits. Reservations only – 20 max. On Saturday night at 6:30 p.m. Don and Doug will serve, grilled steak, baked potatoes, fried corn, (and if Don can master it) fried biscuits. If not, fried cardboard *#@*+ cornbread, soft drink and one of Doug Mowell's famous tossed salads. \$8.00 reservations only, 20 max. Pay at the campground.

You can wade, bring a belly boat, one man pontoon, or canoe. Some good fishing is available right at the campground for boating, or wade up from the campground. There are access points on both the north and south forks, as well as the main stream. These all lay in a 10 mile radius from the campground.

Joe Panfalone maintains the brown woolly bugger is the best fly. Don Hogue says the Bumblebee popper w/ a flashback pheasant tail dropper is the ticket. Bob Ireton says the red fox squirrel nymph, Randy Clark won't tell! Nick Rizzo says something with long legs and everyone agrees...3" from the bank or weeds. Of course right below a riffle, in the shadows of logs, in crevices and under big rocks are good places to fish.

The last 2 years have been rained out, so Kaiser Lake will be the back up. Directions to Kaiser Lake will be in the packet. Be sure to pick up a reservation form at the April meeting or contact Don Hogue.

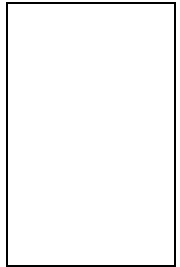

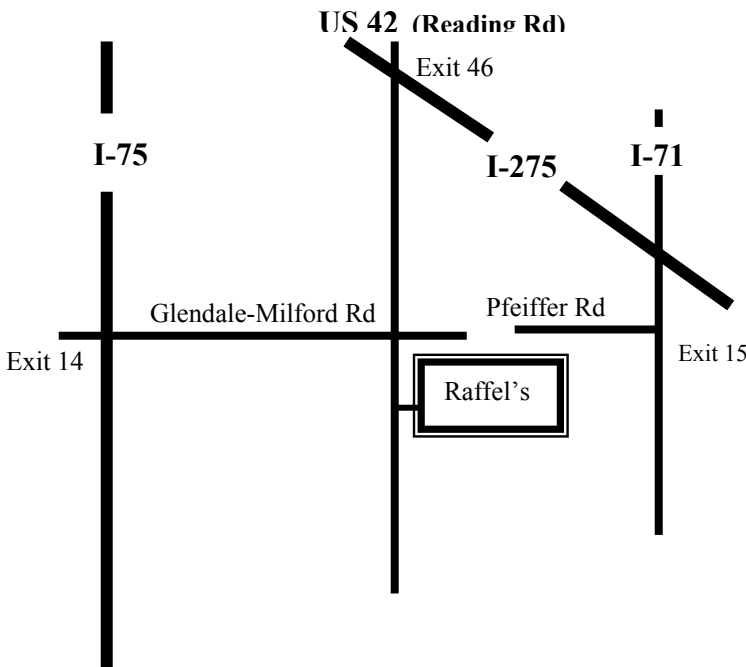

Directions:
