Fly Tying Update

March saw the completion of the Advanced Fly Tying Classes for 2014 and the one-night Introduction to Fly Tying Class. Advanced Fly Tying had 6 sessions with an average of 11 attendees per session.



We covered a wide range of fly tying styles including Articulated Flies, Small Flies, Parasol Flies, Scuds & Nymphs, and Terrestrials plus a technical discussion about feathers as tying materials. I wish to thank all the class leaders; Tim Williamson, Jeff McElravy, Tom Agin, Jim Neckers and Gary Begley. In addition I want to thank these same individuals plus Davy Jones for working as class aides when they were not leading a session.

In the Introduction to Fly Tying class, the first two weeks of our standard Beginner Fly Tying Classes were condensed into a single evening's 3 hour session. Attendance was light but that meant we had the chance to do a lot of one-on-one instruction with the attendees.

The next planned Club Tying Classes will be the Beginner Fly Tying Classes starting in late October (schedule to be announced). Between now and then, take advantage of the Tie and Lie sessions at Bass Pro led by Davy Jones and Gary Begley on the first Thursday and the third Friday of each month. Notice of proposed change to BUFF By-Laws

Article XI of the BUFF bylaws states that an amendment to the BUFF by-laws must be communicated to the BUFF membership via their e-mail address provided to the BUFF, monthly (Buffer) newsletter and posted on the BUFF website 30 days prior to the date of the meeting at which the proposed amendment is to be voted on. A concurring vote of two thirds of the members present shall constitute acceptance of the amendment. The following is the proposed addition to Article III of the BUFF by-laws.

"The president, at his discretion, may delegate contract signing and management for Fly Fishing Show booth rental sales to the Fly Show Committee."

The vote on this amendment will be taken at the May 2014 General Meeting.

Otter Creek 2014 Trip Report

On March 13 - 14 nineteen BUFFERS participated in the Club's first trip to Otter Creek Kentucky State Park for two days of trout fishing. Although the stream was heavily stocked "trout are never easy". There were about 150 fish caught. Most were small; however, several were over 14 inches and one little Bluegill. The water and weather was good but the trout were tricky. So there were many missed hook-ups. It seemed that the fly used was less important than a good drag free drift, detecting the take, and a quick hook set. The cabins were comfortable and the staff at the park very accommodating. A good thing about this trip is that we did not have to travel far and the cost was incredibly reasonable. The donuts, OJ and coffee Friday morning was a good thing but reported to not be a healthy breakfast. One poor member had wader issues; it seems that they no longer fit. The reason was reported that waders shrink when stored in darkness.



Dinner on Thursday was to be at El Camino's Mexican Restaurant only 8 miles away. Unfortunately, we did not know there were 2 "El Caminos". So half the group went to Brandenburg (8 miles west) while the other half went to Radcliff (8 miles East)

Hellbender

With very little change over the past 60 million years, the Hellbender is considered a living fossil.

A goal of the Ohio's Division of Wildlife is to reestablish as much as possible the threatened and endangered wildlife population in our streams including the Eastern Hellbender; a salamander that can reach 27 inches in length and weigh nearly 3 pounds. The Columbus Zoo, the Toledo Zoo, and The Wilds in Muskingum County have been raising Hellbenders from eggs, but the young ones aren't able to cope on their own until they are three years old and about 12 inches long. Assisting in the program, the State's Marion Correctional Institution is rearing some of the juveniles until they can be released (paroled?) into an undisclosed watershed in Eastern Ohio where they once flourished. The area is underlain with the Utica & Marcellus-Shale; the same formation that contains large quantities of hydrocarbons where even a tiny amount of a harmful chemical from the fracking process could be fatal if it came in contact with a Hellbender whose mucus covered skin is porous enough to absorb oxygen but could also absorb a poison.

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
