Here's something to think about. Everything you hear about casting says that practicing to improve your form is the way to go. That is true, but what no one talks about is your fitness and how improving that will make the casting easier. The work I'm doing for my back has improved my core fitness and strength. The casting has gotten easier. It's really noticeable with large 10 to 12 weight rod setups. Take some time while you're home to improve your core strength. You won't regret it.

As soon as things settle down and we can get back together there will be lots of things happening in BUFF. We are planning on doing the pre meeting casting sessions to help improve your fishing. The intermediate/advanced fly-tying class will complete the remaining classes. The beginning fly fishing course will complete its last 2 classes. Jan Ripple's presentation will be rescheduled to later this fall. There will be monthly Thursday night fishing at local locations. Hugh O'Donnell is working on beginning fly fishing sessions on the water for the summer into the fall. All activities will be announced by BUFF E-Blasts.

- Mad River Outfitters (<u>https://www.youtube.com/channel/UC8J2w-RuMBJz-aLAyJyluBw</u>) has been making a lot of videos for the last few years and putting them out there to help fly fishers everywhere. The subjects include gear reviews, questions from around the country, fly tying videos, subject matter videos on fishing (begging fly fishing, steelhead, carp). Check out Brian's site and support our local shops.

Fly Casting Skills Challenge Workshops

Fly Fishers International has long recognized the importance of the fly-casting skill component of enjoying fly fishing. A recent addition to FFI's educational offerings is the *"FLY-CASTING SKILLS CHALLENGE PROGRAM"*. The program is designed to be a fun way to comfortably and methodically advance one's casting skills. The challenge is to learn casts that you use when fly fishing, with each level adding or further developing a skill set.

Looking forward positively, and assuming we will be able in near future to meet regularly, BUFF flycasting instructors have planned to be available to explain and help BUFF members attempt the challenge skills prior to upcoming BUFF meetings. The plan was to start in May and continue through the September meeting on the lawn at the VOA park at 4:30 PM prior to the monthly BUFF meeting.

A casting course will be provided using a 70-foot tape and orange soccer cones to gauge successful completion of the tasks described in the three (bronze, silver, gold) levels of the FFI fly casting skills challenge. More details are in the "Fly Casting Corner" on the BUFF webpage.

Perhaps we will be able to start this in May, but if not, we will put it off. You can easily recognize the casting instructors as they will be near the tape and the orange cones waving long pointy things in the air. Come out and join the fun – *assuming and when it is safe and appropriate to do so!*

BUFF "Fly Casting Skills Challenge" Lemonade Recipe -

Here is a bit of tongue-in-cheek cheer from Tom reflecting on our current situation.

Is it lemonade time? My mom made me a bit crazy with her incessant advice encouraging that "when life gives you lemons, make lemonade".

Her point has come home to roost. We are certainly in a lemon moment.

Ingredients

- Fly rod and reel, with fly line
- 7 ½ ft leader (1x or 0x)
- Garden pea sized piece of egg yarn as a fly (hookless)
- Grassy space outdoors (great substitute for sugar)
- Follow social distancing advisory (the lemons)
- Fly casting skills challenge task of choice (example, from bronze level task B5, shooting line)
- Time off from work (more lemons)
- 1 bottle water (stay hydrated)
- Tape measure (optional, but distances are difficult to guess)
- Soccer cones ((optional) but have something to serve as targets, and guides to distances prescribed in task)

Difficulty

• increases with progression through bronze and silver to gold

Time to completion for single serving

- Best if casting limited to 30-ish minutes per session. Longer often taxes untrained muscles leading to "sour" lemonade.
- However, feel free to hang out in the park until the street lights come on. "YES Tommy, you must come home then. OK, OK Mom!"

Directions

- 1. Remove yourself from interior of dwelling to grassy space outdoors (pleasure immediate)
- 2. remain 6 ft from nearest possible source of virus transmission
- 3. set up course for task (optional)
- 4. address task. For example, from bronze level task B5, shooting line. This technique is fundamental to extending line when casting. Starting with the fly at 40 ft., the caster will strip 5-10 feet of fly line off the reel. A pick-up and lay-down cast will be performed with shooting line to 45 ft. or more on delivery with the fly landing within 4 ft. of either side of the tape. No false casting; hauling is allowed.
- 5. Repeat item above as needed until confidence is achieved

Cook's notes:

- 1) Permission may be granted by Mom, to remain on grassy space outdoors after street lights come on if practicing casting mouse patterns after dark.

A Bit of Humor – Brown Drakes in My Pajamas

Normally, I'm inclined to write a 2 word "Gone Fishin" column for the summer newsletter as I am usually "Up North" this time of year chasing trout and writing a piece for any newsletter is low on my list of priorities. I thought I might take the liberty here of recounting an event illustrating the depth of my particular affliction and the lesson found therein.

A brown drake *or Ephemera simulans* is a large mayfly that hatches at dusk or early evening from mid-June to mid-July. That hatch (and a few others) provokes a pilgrimage of anglers of epic proportions each seeking to fool trout by mimicking nature. While Michigan's Au Sable River is normally a fairly placid stream, the drake hatch, when conditions are right, can cause the river to boil over with a feeding frenzy of large, carnivorous brown trout gulping down bunches of these unsuspecting mayflies. A hatch of that kind can make anglers do strange things.

Two weeks ago, I was shutting down our river house for the evening, ready for bed after a long day of work on the camp. As I was closing a window blind, I noticed what looked like white caps on the river. I went outside to investigate further and found myself confronting one of the aforementioned events. I quickly grabbed my fly rod, crossed the bridge leading to our island and started casting. There are times when you cannot compete with nature and major hatches on a river are often just such times. I noticed a line of fishermen up and down stream of me, flailing away in frustration. No tight lines that night except for me. I made a cast, hooked a big brown trout, fought it for some time, brought it to the island and released it to the applause by a few of the anglers and laughter by many others. As it turns out, in my rush to intercept the hatch, I forgot I was barefooted and in my pajamas. At that point my exuberance was tempered with embarrassment and the discomfort of the numerous mosquito bites I received in this venture. I then did the only honorable thing I could do at that point. I bowed to the river and to the anglers who I amused, and went inside comforted by my success and by the fact that forward thinking people decided in the past to insure that this and many other waterways were protected.

Local Fishing Updates –

Indiana License Expiration Extended

For those of us who have a 2019 Indiana Fishing License, the license is dated to expire on March 31st. IN is extending the expiration of the 2019 license to Friday, May 22nd. Also, the Indiana state parks, state forests, fish and wildlife areas, lakes, and nature preserves are open, though some facilities are limited or closed.

Ohio Parks

For Ohio, state parks, recreation areas lakes, etc. are open. Campgrounds, lodges, restrooms, etc., are closed. The ODNR indicates people can get use state parks for walking, hiking, biking, etc., but maintain safe distancing.

Finding Feeding Trout –

Tom Bachey (h2oguy@fuse.net) recommends a recent article by Rob Fightmaster of Fightmaster Fly Fishing in Townsend, Tennessee. The article provides some excellent advice and suggestion on what to look for when fishing trout. Rob is an Orvis-Certified guide fishing the Great Smokey Mountains National Park and surrounding areas, which are fantastic fisheries for wild rainbow, brook and brown trout. Rob has been a guest speaker at past BUFF meetings and supports our club as a sponsor. We can have the great gear and casting skills, but knowing where trout are feeding is key to catching fish, and there are 4 things to look for -

- *Water Temperature* Trout typically feed at water temperatures between 50 67 degrees, so knowing and testing water temperatures is a good point of reference and may help guide you to better areas on a stream to fish.
- Water Depth A good target is water 1 2 feet in depth.
- Water Current Most trout feed near currents, as the water current is essentially their food conveyor belt. Bringing food to them is less energy expending than seeking food. Where the fish may locate will depend on the current. They may sit right in the current if it is slow, and remain along the edges of rapid currents.
- **Structure** Trout while seeking open areas to feed, also seek areas nearby structure (rocks, overhang, etc.) to hide if they sense a predator.
