April 6th

Maintenance at Brookville Lake

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will be conducting maintenance activities at Brookville Lake in Brookville, Indiana, which could impact downstream fishery conditions and recreation public access to the tailwater area. These activities are scheduled to begin in April and last through August 2022.

A statement issued by the Army Corps of Engineers on March 8th states "Maintenance activities will require variability in outflows that will increase the uncertainty of water volume and temperature downstream this season, which may impact the downstream fishery. We will do our best to provide outflows whenever possible during the work, but increased uncertainty in downstream conditions is to be expected."

Due to the variable tailwater conditions, the Indiana DNC is cancelling the April stocking of brown trout at the tailwater and moving the April stocking of rainbow trout at the tailwater to the fall.

Skip Morris' Trout Fly Proportion Chart

For those who may not be familiar with him, Skip Morris is among the most prolific fly-fishing and fly-tying authors alive. He has written 21 books on fly fishing and tying. Some, such as "Fly Tying Made Clear and Simple", "The Art of Tying the Bass Fly", "Morris & Chan on Fly Fishing Trout Lakes", Concise Handbook of Fly Tying", and Fly Fisher's Guide to Western River Hatches", are considered classics. Skip also has many instructional videos/DVDs and has published over 300 articles in angling magazines. Skip was the headliner at our 2013 Fly Fishing Show.



The reason for this article is that Skip is offering anglers a free download of his chart which provides proportions for trout flies. Normally, there is a fee to access and download the chart. Here is the link to

The page that opens includes a pale-yellow overlay on the web page (shown on the left) which shows one page of what is a 3-page chart. Just scroll down the page until you find a green box which says "Click Here to Print". That opens a printable pdf file of the entire chart.

What Skip gets from this offer is more people looking at his website which has a lot of information, and access to lessons on tying and fishing techniques, as well as his books, videos, and DVDs.

Some Things of Interest –

How about a way to keep pre-rigged tandem nymph set ups in your fly box?

The Gink and Gasoline site has an interesting blog discussing the advantages of keeping a pre-rigged tandem nymph rig ready to go. It allows you to quickly change out flies from and save you time when

fishing. They're also great when you find your hot fly has turned cold, when you break your rig off on a snag or find yourself with a nasty tangled mess. By having a couple different pre-rigged tandem nymph rigs on hand, you'll find it much more efficient to try multiple fly patterns and rigs out, and that should help you dial-in quicker and start catching trout. The blog encourages this a a useful technique and habit to acquire.

One key need is a way to store these fly rigs so they remain untangled. The blog shows the use of an Orvis fly box, the Orvis Dropper Rig Fly Box (shown in the photo), which has foam inserts designed to accommodate these set ups. Here is a link to the blog:

The Basics of Fly Fishing - Orvis Video Lessons

I found an interesting series of videos on the Orvis site, entitled "The Basics of Fly Fishing". It is structured as a 'video book' and has 14 "Chapters". Each chapter consists of a series of short – most are less than 2 minutes long – video blogs. Tom Rosenbauer is the host. An entire chapter is generally about 20 minutes of video instruction. You can watch an entire chapter or individual short segments. I've looked at a number of these, and typical of what Tom Rosenbauer does, they are very good and entertaining.

I really enjoyed a section in the first chapter in which Tom discusses what one needs to get started fly fishing, and does so in less than 2 minutes. He reduces all the needed 'stuff' to a rod and reel, a couple of commercial tapered leaders, a pair of nippers so you can change off flies, a couple of spools of appropriate sized tippet so you can maintain leader length, and a handful of flies (he has a small container with some wooly buggers in it!). That's it!! No waders, packs, or the piles of other stuff we all accumulate – as anglers we all know that we become enamored with 'stuff'! Tom's point is to get a newcomer fishing with a minimum of outlay. If they enjoy the sport, they will likely seek additional equipment to expand their opportunities to fish.

A Few Fly Patterns

Since I am recuperating from surgery, I've tried tying a couple of flies this past month from patterns I've seen on fishing blogs.

One is the 'Pure Midge'. The video is from Avid Max. This small midge larvae pattern (sizes 16 and smaller) requires only two materials, thread and micro-tubing which is wrapped to form the body and is tied on a standard curved midge hook. The thread head is finished with a bit of clear UV adhesive. The video shows it done in black, but you can do a range of color. A variation shows the fly tied with an added bit of ribbing made from thread, wire, or tinsel which is counter wrapped over the micro-tube body to add some

A second fly I've enjoyed tying is a "Craft Fur Clouser". This video is from the folks at The Northern Anglers Fly Shop in Traverse City, MI. As the name implies, it is a variation on the classic Clouser minnow pattern, but used craft fur instead of deer hair. I've had fun with this. The fly that is tied in the demonstration uses a combination of yellow, olive and bright orange craft fur, but other color combinations are certainly appropriate.



The pattern is tied on a standard streamer hook with lead eyes to cause the fly to ride hook up in the water, just as an original Clouser does. The photo shows the pattern as tied in the video. Here is the link to this one: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=E5H7RSTgzzs

One last fly is a stone fly pattern called "The Knuckle Dragger Golden Stone". This is another blog from Avidmax. Here is a link that will take you to the video:

https://blog.avidmax.com/2022/03/22/how-to-tie-a-knuckle-dragger-variation/. The pattern presented is a variation of a fly that was developed by John Newberry. The pattern as shown is tied on



a 60° jig hook (Umpqua XC 400BL) with a tungsten bead, tail and legs formed from a barred rubber leg material, body from Hareline vinyl ribbing, and some dubbing materials for the thorax and collar.

Invasive Small Mouth Bass in Yellowstone National Park –

Tom Bachey shared an article from the March issue of Fly Fisherman magazine that reported an angler catching a smallmouth bass in the Gardner River, a tributary of the Yellowstone River that flows through Yellowstone National Park. The fish was caught in mid-February as the river's mouth, where it empties into the Yellowstone. The catch marked the furthest upstream that a smallmouth bass had ever been found in the Yellowstone River drainage. This fish was caught about 20 miles further upstream than any previously reported capture of a small mouth in these waters.

The timing was particularly concerning and also puzzling, since it was the coldest part of the year. The water temperature in the Gardner should have been well below what smallies tolerate and a USGS streamflow gauge nearby on the Yellowstone River recorded a peak water temperature peaked at about 40 degrees on February 19, the day that fish was hooked. Smallmouth bass typically do not live in water colder than 40° F.

In view of this finding, the Montana office for Fish Wildlife and Parks is working on emergency regulations, that could impose a 'kill' order for any small mouth caught in upper Yellowstone area. At present, anglers are being asked to remove any small mouth bass caught in the upper Yellowstone and provide them, together with information as to where the fish was captured to Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks for testing.
