#### April Speaker – Barry Puskas, Miami Conservancy District, Dayton, OH. "Fly Fishing the Great Miami Riverway"

Barry Puskas is the Chief of Technical and Engineering Services for The Miami Conservancy District (MCD) in Dayton, Ohio, and an avid fly fisherman. Barry role at the MCD is to provide technical expertise in hydrologic and hydraulic modeling; river survey mapping, and engineering design and analysis. Additionally, Barry supports ethical angling and conservation as the International Game Fish Association (IGFA) Representative for Ohio.

Barry has fished since he was five years old. He started fishing with his father and grandfather, targeting trout, bass, catfish, and other freshwater species. Later in life, he was drawn to saltwater fishing on the Atlantic coast, and now travels frequently to Florida and the Gulf of Mexico to fly fish. Barry has two entries for the IGFA Trophy Largemouth Bass Club on fly and the IGFA Bass Grand Slam on fly. Today, Barry enjoys finding new fishable water and trying new techniques to catch game fish on flies.



#### Stream Health & Fly Fishing Opportunities in Southwest Ohio

The Miami Conservancy District (MCD) was formed as a direct result of the Great Flood of 1913. Since then, MCD has developed the regional flood protection system of dams, levees, and channels to ensure the system's integrity for future generations. The program has collected precipitation and streamflow data for over 100 years. It also monitors stream health. Stream health ratings vary throughout the Great Miami River Watershed. Most streams are rated good to excellent.

The MCD Aquifer Preservation Subdistrict supports the preservation and stewardship of the region's water resources. Our River Corridor Improvement Subdistrict enhances public use and enjoyment of river corridors by utilizing improvements, amenities, and activities within and along the river corridors. Whether you like to fish, paddle or cycle, you'll find plenty of recreational opportunities in the region. There are numerous fish species to challenge a fly angler in southwest Ohio including smallmouth bass, catfish, northern pike, muskellunge, and other game fish.

Workshop demonstrations & instructors will be provided by FFI Certified Casters & local Buckeye Fly Fishing Club instructors. Show up any time between 9:30 AM – 1:30 PM at Cottell Park, Deerfield Twp., 5847 Irwin Simpson Rd, Mason, OH.

There is a stocked pond at the park, where you can try your skills after practicing. It is catch and release, only. The park does require an OH fishing license if ages 16 - 65 to use the pond.

## Take a Kid Fishing – Sunday, April 28<sup>th</sup>, Miami Meadows Park, Milford, OH

Taking your child/grandchild fishing for the first time can result in great memories for both kids and parents or grandparents alike. The excitement of getting out on the water and catching fish along with spending time outdoors with your loved ones can be an extremely enjoyable experience.

Bring your child or grandchild out Sunday, April 28th, 1:00 to 4:00, at the pond at Miami Meadows Park in Milford. You may remember the location, as it is where we had our BUFF picnic the last few summers. Every child should have at least one adult with them. Waivers are required for you and the child. After all, we are around water.



#### Tips for the day:

- *Make it about them.* It's not a daylight-to-dark marathon session (unless that's what the child wants). Please focus on their enjoyment. A big part of your day is going to be small achievements. Praise them when they make a good cast or catch a fish.
- *Keep your cool.* Expect to re-bait hooks and take out line tangles and knots all day. This is their day, not yours. The quickest way to turn children off to fishing is to get frustrated with them.
- *Keep it easy.* Choose simple tackle, bait, and techniques. Fish for a species that is plentiful (bluegill) and easy to catch. The inclination for any newcomer who may not take a long-term liking to fishing is to give them lower-end gear.



That can defeat the purpose as it may limit their ability to catch fish. At the very least, make sure that your child has size-appropriate tackle and fresh line. Not only will that make casting more efficient, but it will help them bring in more fish in. On the flip side, don't go too far to the other extreme. If they're not ready for a fly rod, don't put one in their hand, no matter how much you want them to. They're going to fight it all day and it will limit their effectiveness and enjoyment.

• Keep it short. Plan only a couple hours. Be prepared to do other things.

- Keep them covered. Think about the Three Little Bears – if they're too hot or too cold they won't be having fun, and while "just right" might be a moving target think layers to ensure that they can quickly adjust. Use plenty of sunscreen and protective clothing as needed.
- *Keep them happy.* Think Snacks. And it's not necessarily a time to eat healthy. This is about bonding between a parent or grandparent and child, and you want them to want to go again.
- **Teach them what you know**. Tell them about birds, plants, or fish. Kids remember these things and find it interesting. Teach them about conservation, and respect for the environment. Try to pick up a little bit of trash that others left behind each time out.



It will be a great time for all.

# **Spring Whitewater River Cleanup – Investors Needed**

Have we got a deal for you! A deal with multiple opportunities that provide a valuable return. Recent issues of the Buffer have shamed Forbes, the WSJ and Investor's Business Daily in the number of opportunities offered for the smart investor.

We're sensitized to the degeneration of habitat, but not as sensitized as the fish are. As habitat deteriorates the fish just quit. Meanwhile, we as fishermen can lapse in citizenship. Some fishermen may dunk a crawler into factory shadows, but I bet you desire a different experience. We can go home and put our feet up in the La-Z-Boy when water resources decline....but the fish don't have that option.

On March 23<sup>rd</sup>, 20 people from BUFF and NKFF, with assistance from the Indiana DNR, picked up trash along the banks of the Whitewater River in Indiana. This is the area where many of us fish the white bass run in the spring. The combined effort resulted in removing trash that will not end up in the water during high water events and makes for a cleaner, safer environment.

Although we collected a great quantity of items, none were too interesting this particular day. Sometimes you can find some real 'odd' items. I was once bushwhacked by a mattress floating down Todd's Fork. My back was facing upriver, and the offending Serta King snuck up on me.

Why spoil half a day with work and errands? Seize one of these opportunities and get a return on your investment. Pull things out of the fire so they don't go from bad to worse.

Much can be accomplished when we work together.

#### **Stream Quality Monitoring**

This year BUFF members will have 9 opportunities to participate in Stream Quality Monitoring (SQM) in May, July and September. You can choose two sites on the Little Miami River. One at Bass Island and one at Caesar Creek. In addition, we do SQM at Four Mile Creek in Butler County. This is a great opportunity to learn more about entomology and the connection between insects and healthy waterways.

No experience or equipment is necessary. It's also a great activity for children of all ages. You can spend an hour or two turning rocks, identifying aquatic insects, and do some fishing afterwards if you like.

### **Cicada Madness**

Remember the last cicada event in Cincinnati? Explosive topwater takes occurred in any water where fish swam. Let's not wait until 2038 for the next emergence in Cincinnati. There is a hatch practically every year – somewhere in the United States.

Dave Zielinski is a fly fisher who loves these hatches and started driving each year to find the nearest hatch. He was so good at finding and fishing these cicada hatches that he decided to write a book. His process started with writing a chapter and submitting it to Stackpole Publishing for endorsement.

A selection process that normally takes half a year was quickly cut short by the CEO at Stackpole. He

contacted Dave within three days and told him that he had been waiting years for someone to write a book on the topic. Now, you can find the book, Cicada Madness, at many bookstores or order it on Amazon. In addition, you can hear Dave's full story on an Anchored podcast with April Vokey (https://anchoredoutdoors.com/); it is podcast # 232. April's interview was motivating to think about fishing for them before waiting another 13 years. So, where is the nearest hatch this year? Well, it just so happens that a hatch will occur between Northern Alabama through Nashville and westward



into Missouri. The brood expands into ten states including North Carolina. It may be time to schedule a trip to North Carolina, Tennessee, or Missouri.

The map provides a view of the cicada broods or hatches. In 2025, the majority of Kentucky and eastern parts of Ohio will see the emergence of Brood XIV cicadas. Even the Smoky Mountains will have Brood XIV. Well, what are you waiting for? Start planning your fishing trips for 2024 or 2025.
