Pine Lake Trout Club is a private fishing club located in Bainbridge Township, Ohio. For many years, BUFF has maintained a nonresident membership at this club, which can be used for BUFF members and for BUFF activities. It has been a while since BUFF members have used this excellent facility, and BUFF members should consider taking advantage of the membership. A stocked trout pond is central to the facilities and there is trout fishing on the stream on the property as well. Daily catch and release is available to both members and non-members for a nominal fee. The location is within an hour's drive of Ohio's steelhead fishing streams.

Details

Nestled in the woods of the property are four overnight cabins with fully equipped kitchens and wood burning fireplaces. All of the cabins are pet friendly. Cabins are of different sizes. There is one which can accommodate up to 10 people, which would be perfect if a group were interested in a trip. Cabin 4 is a one-bedroom unit which is ideal for a couple.

Pine Lake offers dining as well. The quiet and cozy Log Cabin Dining Room offers members and their guests friendly service and a creative food selection, serving lunch and dinner six days a week.

When the Name of a Classic Fly is a Name; or Maybe Not?

Haruko found an article in a recent issue of Trout Magazine which discussed George Griffith and the Griffith's Gnat fly which is attributed to him. The article sparked some interest in both Mr. Griffith and the fly. This column summarizes what was in the Trout Magazine article and a bit of light research we did on George Griffith, this classic dry fly, and instruction on how to tie it.

George Griffith is a recognized leader as a fly fisherman and conservationist. He was a key person involved with establishing Trout Unlimited in the late 1950's. Actually, the organizing meeting for Trout Unlimited was held in his cabin, 'The Barbless Hook' which was on the Au Sable River in Michigan. If it is still there, we'd both like to drive by and see it next time we're up there. George passed away at the age of 97 in 1998, and a decade later, was inducted as a notable person in the sport into the Fly Fishing Hall of Fame. Unfortunately, from what is listed in documents on the early history of our club, it does not appear that George was ever a speaker at an early BUFF Banquet or club meeting.

The Griffith's Gnat is a classic dry fly, and should be in one's universal fly box. Its popularity and fishing success goes well beyond the waters of Michigan. It is a successful fly used in waters across the US and in other countries as well. It is also a very simple fly to tie – just a palmered hackle wrapped over a base of peacock herl on a dry fly hook.

But back to the story – While the fly is named for and often attributed to George Griffith, he is not the person who first tied this. Even George, in his lifetime, made this clear. Also, the fly is *not*, despite a claim made on at least one website, named for the famed sheriff of Mayberry, Andy Griffith! According to the Trout Unlimited article about George, the fly is believed to have been first tied by Walt Shaw, an early fishing guide on the Au Sable, and an expert tyer. It is believed that Walt introduced it to Griffith in the late 1930's when they fished together. Importantly, it was Griffith who popularized its use. For George, it was a 'go to' fly, and one of the patterns he reliably fished with for his entire life. It remains especially effective in mid-summer during hatches of small

midges or gnats as they surface on rivers and ponds.

The photo shows a couple of Griffith's Gnats in size 20 as tied by Son Tao (<u>www.frakenfly.com</u> website). His version appears to add a bit of red material to form a head, but this is not described in the instructions. Son ties this fly in sizes 14 - 24, but we've seen comments on other websites



suggesting that they are can be tied even smaller (size 28!). For those interested, the Orvis site has a short video on tying this fly (<u>https://howtoflyfish.orvis.com/fly-tying-videos/dry-flies/730-griffiths-gnat</u>).

Here are basic tying instructions:

Materials:

Hook:	Small dry fly with adequate gape
Thread:	Black 8/0 or smaller
Body:	Fine peacock herl
Hackle:	Grizzly, palmer wrapped over the hurl

- 1. Tie on thread behind eye and wrap about $\frac{1}{2}$ the length to the hook bend
- 2. Tie in peacock herl so it extends back toward the hook bend by wrapping thread to the bend. Hurl should be positioned along the far side of the hook shank. Cut or break off any excess that extends out over the eye.
- 3. Strip feathers from base end of an appropriately sized hackle feather. Tie in in at the bend with the dull side facing you by wrapping thread back to about 1- eye gap behind the eye.
- 4. Wrap and tie in the peacock herl to form the body taking care not to crowd the hook eye.
- 5. Wrap to hackle taking care not to crowd the hook eye.
- 6. Whip finish.

The Guide to Fly Fishing by Dick Talleur, offers a slight variant on this design, with the hackle on the front half of the hook. This is shown in the illustration on the right. For this variation, tie in the hackle about midway along the hook shank and tie in the herl at the bend. Take a couple of turns of hackle toward the hook eye and tie it in. Then complete by wrapping the herl through the palmered hackle to behind the eye, and tie off in front of the hackle. Finish with a whip finish.

That's it. Happy tying and tight lines!
