A Return to In-Person Meetings!

August Speaker – Nicole Watson, "Arctic Grayling – Reintroduction to Michigan Rivers"

Nicole Watson is a 'rising star of conservation. Nicole, a graduate student at Michigan State University, in the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife, is pursuing her PhD degree in Fisheries Ecology and Management with dual degree in Ecology, Evolution, and Behavior. Her presentation will focus on the history of Arctic Grayling in Michigan, current Grayling research, and potential management implications of the preliminary findings.

Nicole's research examines early-life history of Arctic Grayling, and their




interactions with young Brook and Brown trout. The overarching goal of this research project is to clarify uncertainties to successful Grayling reintroduction into Michigan streams. It is a multifaceted study including the following: predation of Grayling fry by resident Brook and Brown trout; competition between Grayling, Brook, and Brown trout; Grayling imprinting to home waters at early life stages; water choice; alarm cues; aspects of physiological development; predator avoidance, and predator cue recognition by juvenile Grayling. Her research takes me to Alaska each spring to transport Grayling eggs back to the lab at Michigan State University. She then spends the summer and fall running trials in the lab (with the exception of 2020 due to COVID).

When not at MSU, or at home downstate, Nicole can typically be found at her Northern MI home base, The Hideout. She enjoys fishing for Brook trout in creeks and small rivers in MI, and for Arctic Grayling in the interior waters of Alaska. She is also an avid bird hunter. Nicole is passionate about native wild salmonids and has been known to hike mountains seeking them out if needed.

Directions to Oasis -

Take I-275 and exit at Wards Corner Road (Exit 54). Make the first right onto Loveland Miamiville Road and follow this. The Oasis golf course will be on your left. At the Paxton Guinea Road crossing, turn left. The clubhouse/conference center and parking lot for the Oasis facility are on the left.

He is on the faculty of Pennsylvania State University and is the lead instructor and director of the university's angling program. This program was

established by Joe Humphreys, who was George's mentor. George is a well known on-stream instructor and guide and he teaches and runs clinics across the US. He has published many articles in fly fishing magazines, and on his website (www.livinonthefly.com), along with 3 books. BUFF Picnic

On Thursday, July 22nd, BUFF members reunited for our first large-group activity since the beginning of COVID restrictions put in place in early 2020. We had an outdoor picnic at the lake-side shelter at Miami Meadows Park. Over 65 of our members signed up to attend, and about 55 attended. Dinner was fried chicken from The Hitching Post on Eastern Avenue, and cole slaw and German potato salad from Jungle Jim's catering. We also had chips, soft drinks, watermelon and desserts. It was all delicious!

Activities included a target casting area set up to demonstrate and practice FFI casting skills with several of our casting instructors. This was a popular activity. Haruko Mizoguchi and Jim Neckers did tying demonstrations, and we were able to fish the lake adjacent to the shelter (stocked with blue gill and bass). Fish were taking a range of lures, both bottom flies which targeted blue gill, and surface dry flies. Jim McElravy caught about 20 blue gill fishing a small dry fly and dropper pattern (size 20 range). Fish took both flies and he even had a couple of 'doubles'. I had similar results using a foam beetle and later a dry fly – if the flies landed anywhere near a fish, they were hit in seconds.

New Proposed Scenic River in Ohio




Figure 1. Location map of the Paint Creek watershed and the reaches examined for scenic river designation: 1 - Paint Creek, 2 - Upper Paint Creek, 3 - Rattlesmale Creek, 4 - Rocky Fork Creek, and 5 - North Fork Paint Creek.

This past month the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) announced the state's intent to designate portions of Paint Creek and its tributaries as Ohio's 16th state scenic river. Ohio is home to the first designated scenic river in the US; the ODNR designated and protected the Little Miami River, as the country's first scenic river, in April 1969. The Paint Creek system qualifies for designation as a scenic river because of it has outstanding water quality, flows through a natural river corridor with unique geological features and a rich cultural history. The system supports approximately 118 fish species and at least 11 rare and endangered species of plants and animals including two federally endangered species of freshwater mussels: the snuffbox and rayed bean.

Adding the Paint Creek system as a scenic river will add excellent opportunities for people to enjoy one of Ohio's most natural river corridors. It is

home to scenic vistas, wildlife and excellent fishing habitat. In announcing this proposal, ODNR Director Mary Mertz said, "Paint Creek is not only a hotspot for kayakers and a place for families to enjoy a natural getaway, but this designation also means protecting clean water for communities and wildlife habitat." The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency already classifies Paint Creek and many of its tributaries as Exceptional Warmwater Habitat (EWH) streams, which is the highest aquatic life use designation that can be assigned to a river or stream.

Paint Creek arises from Paint Creek Lake (Paint Creek State Park) located east of Hillsboro, OH. It flows eastward to Chillicothe where it joins with the Scioto River. The map illustrates the proposed areas to be included in the scenic river designation.

ODNR will hold two public information sessions/open houses to receive public input regarding the proposed designations. If approved, a total of 81.7 miles of the Paint Creek system would be designated as state scenic rivers in Highland and Ross counties. Hence, the stream is local to southwest Ohio

A 2020 survey conducted by Ohio State University identified over 100 fish species which inhabit various areas of this system. These include, various sunfish, crappie, and bass (smallmouth, largemouth, rock bass). The system also supports lake and shovelnose sturgeon, pickerel, and muskellunge.

ODNR Fly Fishing Clinics

On July 29th, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) announced 3 beginner and 2 intermediate fly-fishing clinics that will be held at the Castalia State Fish Hatchery. The hatchery is in northern Ohio, southwest of Sandusky, and raises rainbow trout and is the only steelhead hatchery for the ODNR. Castalia is a cold-water hatchery, with water is supplied from 'blue hole' aquifers, and Cold Creek. In addition to fly-fishing instruction by Division of Wildlife staff and volunteers, attendees will be able to test their skills by fishing for the abundant rainbow trout found in Cold Creek.

If you wish to attend, you need to preregister. There is not charge for the programs. Anglers may only participate once in a beginning fly fishing class, and all anglers age 16 and older are required to have a valid Ohio fishing license.

The beginning fly fishing clinics are half-day sessions, and are scheduled for Fridays on August 27th, September 3rd, and September 10th. A morning (9 AM to noon) and an afternoon session (1 PM to 4 PM) are scheduled for each day. Two full-day (9AM – 3 PM) intermediate skill clinics are scheduled for Friday September 17th and 24th. Heat and Drought Impacting Western Angling.

The impact of the excessive heat and drought conditions in the west is impacting angling on rivers in the far west. It is impossible to not be aware of the weather extremes and drought currently plaguing the western US. In late July the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks (FWP) announced a dramatic slate of fishing closures and restrictions which impacts some of the state's most iconic and sought out trout water, such as the Yellowstone, Madison, Beaverhead, Gallatin, and Missouri rivers. The closures come in response to dangerous and worsening river conditions, the result of historically low stream flows and excessive water temperatures, which threaten the survival of the state's trout and other fish species. While Montana's fisheries are regularly plagued by low flows and high water temperatures, this year's conditions have been further exacerbated by climate-change fueled drought and excessive heat blanketing much of the west. These conditions have pushed Montana's native trout fisheries to the brink and prompted the FWP action.

The **restrictions** affect rivers in throughout Montana and include full closures on the Jefferson River and portions of the Shields, Big Hole, and Gallatin rivers. Also included are "hoot owl" restrictions—which

close rivers to fishing after 2pm. This additional restriction affects the above rivers and also the Stillwater River.

This action highlights the danger that the low flows, high water temperatures and diminished water quality pose to species survival. The Montana FWP will enforce closures when flows drop below critical levels for fish, and/or when maximal daily water temperatures reach 73°F for 3 consecutive days.

Within the state, a coalition of outfitters, guides and lodges, the Orvis and Pantagonia companies, and several conservation organizations have petitioned Governor Gianforte to immediately create a "Cold Water Fisheries Task Force to address the dramatic decline in these fisheries in Montana. Fishing is over a \$7 billion of business in Montana, so the threat is a very serious economic concern.
