The Northeastern Ohio Steelhead Trip

After a few casts into a current that lead into a deep pool I felt a tug at the end of the line. With a quick twitch I pulled and the line pulled back. After pulling the rod downstream to insure a good hookup the fight was on. It was a nice sized Conneaut Creek steelhead. A few seconds later the steelhead surfaced and tried to shake the fly. Realizing I had hooked a fish and not a log I started walking the fish downstream, near deeper water. After a few minutes of playing the fish, back and forth from upstream to downstream, I finally had the steelhead close enough to net. But with one more burst of energy the fish took off across the creek heading slightly downstream. The drag on the fly reel held steady tension.

While I tried to gather more line, I wondered to myself rather or not the 5-pound tippet would hold. I had just tied on a two fly rig (tandem) before hooking the fish. Behind a size 16 "sucker spawn" fly was a small nymph/caddis that had been tied the night before. One of the learning experiences of fishing with fly tiers is that they usually like to share patterns. What a great way to pass time during the evening hours after fishing.

A few minutes of slowly working the fish back to shore closer to a waiting net the steelhead decided to retire. Pulling the fish into the net ended the battle. The steelhead was released a few minutes later, after pulling stubborn size 16-sucker spawn from its left jaw. The fish glimmered even in the early morning fog. With a push, it receded back to the currents it had come from.

Fishing the Conneaut Creek in northeastern Ohio during the November B.U.F.F. trip proved to be

B.U.F.F. Fly Fishing Show Presenters

This is the first in a series of articles about the B.U.F.F. Fly Fishing Show presenters. This month we are highlighting Capt. Gregg Arnold from New Orleans, Louisiana. I've had the opportunity to fish with Gregg last April. He's a great guide and a gentleman. You will enjoy his presentation at the Show in February.

Flyfishing for Redfish and Tarpon – Gregg Arnold

Capt. Gregg Arnold will present a comprehensive look at saltwater flyfishing for redfish and tarpon. He will discuss all aspects of the shallow water fishing for Louisiana redfish, including equipment, tactics, techniques, and flies. The Louisiana marshes are filled with large redfish. You can enjoy the food, drink and entertainment of New Orleans in the evening while fishing for redfish during the day that's only a 40 minute drive from the French Quarters. What a combination! Gregg will also discuss flyfishing for tarpon in Carrabelle, Florida where he guides from May to August every year. Setting the hook and watching a 75 – 150 lb tarpon jump completely out of the water is one of the ultimate experiences in flyfishing. It isn't for the faint of heart. But if you are interested in learning more about saltwater flyfishing, this is the presentation to catch.

Gregg is US Coast Guard Captain and guide that fishes the Louisiana marshes year round.

Gregg Arnold started fly fishing at the age of eight in Tennessee. He was raised on the Lake Bedford, a 1200 acre state lake that holds largemouth bass, brim, crappie, and blue gill. His great uncle was manager of the lake and during the summers when Gregg stayed there he was taught how to fish

Fish Are Falling From The Sky

(Staff writer Rick Steelhammer of the Charleston West Virginia Gazette wrote this article earlier this year. Thought the article would be of interest to Buffers - Lou Haynes)

Summersville--When the West Virginia Professional River Outfitters announce that it's time to fly fish on the Upper Gauley, don't grab your graphite rod and look for your waders. They're talking about airlifting trout into the roadless, four-mile stretch of the Gauley between Summersville Dam and the mouth of the Meadow River, where they have stocked by helicopter for the past 12 years.

On Thursday, 2,500 pounds of rainbow trout - mostly in the 16 inch, 1.5-pound range - were airdropped into the fabled whitewater stream by a chartered helicopter and a crew of volunteers. "A lot of people are looking for a wilderness fishing experience on a big river, and this section of the Gauley provides it," said Keven Yokum, a Division of Natural Resources biologist, after ladling out a 150-pound payload of thrashing trout from a hatchery tanker.

"You've got to love that kind of fishing to do it," Said Scott Wilson, a teacher at Midland Trail High School, who plans to hit the Gauley Canyon three times a week, weather permitting, until Christmas. "A river this big and with this kind of wilderness is rare," said Wilson, who helped load and airdrop trout, along with his Travel West Virginia class. "For the next couple of weeks, you'll probably see quite a few people fishing this section. But after that, you'll see just a few, and a lot of time, have the river to yourself." Not only is the four-mile stretch of the Gauley below Summersville Dam roadless, it's virtually trail-less. One wellbeaten angler's trail extends about a half-mile downstream from the camping area at the base of the dam, but that's pretty much it.

"If you spend enough time out here," said Wilson, "you'll find some old, overgrown trails that look like they used to be old railroad grades," and some very rough access roads leading into the canyon. "Otherwise, fishing here involves a lot of boulder-hopping and crashing your way through laurel thickets and briers," he

There will be a rise in temperature along this section but the new habitat will provide cover in a portion of the river that has been coverless water. a scenic, challenging and interesting trip. Conneaut, a small town that is literally in the northeastern corner of Ohio, is the last town you will come to before crossing the Ohio/Pennsylvania border. Rumor has that Conneaut was once a major railroad town, the Railroad museum located in Conneaut may attest to this. The majority of Conneaut Creek's tributaries are in Pennsylvania. Although, a greater portion of the water is in PA, the good steelhead fishing takes places downstream in Ohio. In addition to the fishing opportunities, northeastern Ohio has many sites to see. This section of Ohio is considered wine country by Ohio standards. Along the roads that service the outlying areas around Conneaut Creek you can find vineyards and wineries. While fishing different sections of the Conneaut Creek we passed a few vineyards-a unique experience for fishing in Ohio.

Conneaut Creek, home to 3 covered bridges takes you back to simple times when dirt roads were the way of life. A surprise to those of us fishing was that getting from different spots along the creek involved taking old, sometimes unmarked roads. However, the roads seem well maintained and surprisingly less bumpy than most asphalt covered roads. Conneaut Creek itself is fairly shallow creek and has an average width of 40-45 feet. The structure of creek is unique with shale and clay making up the bottom and sides of the creek. Most fish holding structures with sharp drop offs, two-to-three feet deep, hold steelhead in the winter and smallmouth in the summer. During the club outing the creek was very clear, looking much like a trout stream. This especially makes for challenging fishing because the fish are aware of you fishing near them. But with the creek's clarity you can also spot fish from overhead.

With the scenery, covered bridges, vineyards and unique towns, the Conneaut area makes for a great club outing. This area of the state has other good steel heading waters nearby, such as the Grand and Chagrin River. Though the fishing is challenging, the potential to catch big steelhead make its well worth it. Rumor is a 22 lb. steelhead was caught last winter by a local fly fishing guide. Mark you calendars for the next Northeastern Ohio steelhead trip in March. ➔

with all types of fishing gear. Later Gregg attended Murray State University in Murray, Ky. and fished the Kentucky Lake area for five years. After that he moved to Arkansas and fished the Little Red and White Rivers. Later, after many trips to Florida and Caribbean he moved to Ft. Myers and developed his saltwater fly fishing skills. He moved to Louisiana over 10 years ago, which Gregg believes is truly a Sportsman's Paradise with it's offshore, marsh, and freshwater fisheries year round. ➔

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
said. But the odds for limiting out and catching the occasional trout in the 20-inch range aren't bad for those who make the effort, he said.

The canyon below the dam is part of the Gauley River National Recreation Area, administered by the National Park Service. Wilson and Yokum say there's good evidence that many of the trout are carrying over, providing angling possibilities into the summer in the canyon's many deep holes. Wilson said the fishing's best when stream flows are the lowest-ideally with releases of between 200 and 600 cubic feet per second from Summersville Dam.

The trout used in Thursday's stocking came from Indian Lake Fisheries of Elkview. The helicopter stocking, which involves at least two dozen flights from a parking lot on the canyon rim through the length of the four-mile stretch of river, has become something of a sightseeing attraction. Scores of people watched the operation unfold from the top of the dam, and from the parking area at its base. Dozens of anglers lined the easier-to-reach pools near the lower parking, looking skyward as the helicopter approached. The annual helicopter stocking, usually made during the last week of October, is financed by the outfitters in order to compensate anglers for the annual loss of two fall stockings to accommodate the Gauley's commercial whitewater season. ➔



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
