

Before you know it, the Greater Cincinnati Fly Fishing Show will be here. No, there isn't a new Show coming to town, but the same great B.U.F.F. Fly Fishing Show, only renamed to reflect the growing regional interest in our sport. Even though the Show has a new name, it will still reflect the same great quality and interest as in the past.

Planning for this event has been underway for some time, and we believe we will have any great day planned for you. As in the past, the Greater Cincinnati Fly Fishing Show will continue it's focus on providing both BUFFer's and prospective new fly fishers timely information on the great sport of fly fishing. Our goal is to educate, inform and to have fun. During the show, we hope to showcase our club and all it has to offer, and familiarize attendees with available local, regional and national resources. The price of admission will be only \$10 per person, and children 12 and under are still admitted free. Make sure you bring your friends, family members, and especially kids to the show.

The Fly Fishing Show will be held at the Receptions Conference Center, located off of Route 4 in Fairfield. We moved to the Receptions to accommodate larger crowds, allow for more exhibitors and provide a more central location. The date is the third Saturday in February (February 15, 2003). Hours for the Fly Fishing Show will run from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. This year's event will feature Terry and Wendy Gunn of Lees Ferry, Arizona. In addition to the four presentations, there will be numerous exhibits, vendors and demonstrations available throughout the day. We plan to have new exhibitors as well as old favorites. And we are working hard to expand the fly tying section (demonstrations and exhibitors).

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
Roger Lowe Fly Tying Classes:

Roger Lowe will be our banquet speaker January 25th. He has kindly agreed to lead two fly tying classes during the day of the banquet.

Roger, who grew up fishing for trout in the Smokey Mountains, learned the art of fly tying at an early age from his father and grandfather, both avid tiers and fly fishers. Besides owning Lowe's Fly Shop and Outfitters in Waynesville, North Carolina and guiding in the Smokeys, he ties professionally and has published a video on tying some of the most productive Smokey Mountain trout patterns. You'll find him to be an excellent teacher with lots of tying tricks to share.

The classes are scheduled to meet from 9:30 AM to 11:30 AM and from 1:30 PM to 3:30 PM at the Lutheran Atonement Church in Sharonville. Roger will teach us how to tie three patterns in each session: the Coffey's Stone Creeper Nymph, the Olive Juicey Legs Bugger Streamer, and the Jim Charley Dry Fly in the morning session, and the Parachute Female Adams Dry Fly, the Hazel Creek Dry Fly, and the Horse Hair Nymph in the afternoon session.

These are hands - on classes so participants are expected to bring their own tying equipment. Basic tying skills are a prerequisite for the classes. Patterns will be provided at least one week in advance along with directions to the church. A \$25 fee per class, paid in advance, is required to hold a spot. Each class will be limited to 12 participants. A sign-up sheet will be circulated at the December 11th general meeting. You may also register by calling Lou Haynes at 777-4854, or sign up on the Banquet Registration Sheet insert available in the Buffer Any spots remaining unfilled after the general meeting will be opened to non-BUFF members, so I suggest you register ASAP to ensure a spot.




The Cast

Last month I described the four parts of the "Cast" and their relative importance to generating a good cast. This month I will discuss the "essentials" of a good cast. As you recall, we covered the difference between "style and essentials" in an earlier article and said that style can vary between casters but that the "essentials" of the cast hold true for all casters. There are really only five essentials that you must understand and be able to execute. I will give you short key phrases to help you easily remember these essentials.

- 1. NO SLACK: Try to have your fly line as straight as possible to the rod tip. If you keep your rod rip pointed right at the water, the end of the fly line will move immediately as you start lifting the rod on the "pickup" move.
- 2. PAUSE: As you complete the "backcast" you must pause the rod/rod hand to allow the fly line to form the loop and travel to the rear. It is important to understand that if you are making a short cast only a short pause is needed. If you make a long cast a longer pause is needed. This pause scenario is also needed after the forward cast if you are false casting.
- 3. SMOOTH ACCELERATION OF THE ROD TIP: Start your casting stroke slowly and end it fast followed by an abrupt stop of the rod rod/hand. Remember that the backcast is a mirror image of the forward cast and require the same speed and power and acceleration. A useful imagery of the concept of "smooth acceleration" would be what you would have to do to sling an apple off the end of a flexible stick. You need to start the motion slowly, pick up speed and then stop the motion of the stick (rod hand) abruptly to have any chance to throw the apple any significant distance. Try it sometime.

4. ROD TIP MUST MOVE IN A STRAIGHT PATH (SINGLE PLANE): The path of the rod tip will determine the type of loop you will generate. There are only three basic loops. 1. Tight loops, defined as loops where the top and bottom of the line are separated by two feet or less. 2. Wide loops are defined where the top and bottom of the line are greater than two feet apart. 3. Tailing loop is one where the end of the fly line/leader dips below the main body of the fly line or actually slams into the fly line. *Continued on page 6*



Generally speaking tight loops are good, wide loops are almost always bad and tailing loops are definitely always bad. Try to avoid the last two.

To generate a good tight loop all that is necessary is that you move your casting forearm hand in a straight plane ending with a minute "snap" of wrist to an abrupt stop. This maneuver will flex load the rod tip that will, in turn, form a tight loop as the rod unloads following your abrupt stop of the rod hand motion. A wide loop is generated when the rod tip travels in a "convex" path, which path can be caused by excessive "breaking" of the wrist at the end of the backcast and forward cast. It can also be caused by a forearm that travels in a convex arc, or a combination of these two sins.

A tailing loop is formed when the rod tip travels in a "concave" path. What happens is that at the end of the casting stroke the rod tip has moved up. As the rod tip unloads, it is in the path of the fly line that must pass over the rod tip. By simply using a little downward thumb pressure on the handle after you have stopped the casting stroke, the rod tip will move down allowing the fly line to pass over unobstructed. Tailing loops can be caused by applying too much power too early in the casting stroke (shocking the rod), starting the forward cast with the rod too low at the end of the backcast, or applying power too late in the casting stroke. No matter what the cause, all will result in a rod tip that travels in a convex path. The cure is simply a smooth application of power and a rod/hand forearm motion that travels in a straight (single plane) path.

4. VARIABLE CASTING STROKE: There is a direct relationship between the amount of line we are attempting to cast and the length of our casting strokes. This essential simply states that to make a short cast make only a short casting stroke. To make a longer cast, make a longer casting stroke.

If you understand and can execute these ideas and concepts I have presented to you in "The Cast" series of articles, you should be able to make good casts. If not, sign up for the casting instruction course that will be offered by the BUFF Certified Casting Instructors this coming year. I hope I have been of some help to some of you with your casting. I am available to answer questions or provide further assistance at club meetings. My number is in the Buffer. Tight loops and tight lines.



Directions:

From I-275 – Take Exit 46, (US 42), south for three miles to Glendale-Milford Rd. --Continue south and RAFFEL'S will be on the left approximately 3/10 mile.

From I-75 -- Take Exit 14, east, on Glendale-Milford Rd. until the intersection of US 42, (Reading Rd). Turn right (south) on US 42, and RAFFEL'S will be on the left approximately 3/10 mile.

From I-71 -- Take Exit 15, west, Pfeiffer Rd. & this becomes Glendale-Milford Rd.. At the intersection of US 42, (Reading Rd), turn left, (south) on US 42, and RAFFEL'S will be on the left approximately 3/10 mile.
