One thing I've been surprised with is how colors combine in these streamers. Some of the ugliest color combos when dry really look good in the water. At least they do to me. Now, if only the fish agree.

# North Carolina Trout Trip – November 7<sup>th</sup> – 11<sup>th</sup>

On the late afternoon of November 7 fourteen members of the Buckeye United Fly Fishers gathered in cabins three and four at the Smoky Mountain Retreat outside Bryson City, North Carolina. Tom Agin, Bob Cregge, Mike Rubush, Phil Pursley, George Hupp, Gary Cummins Jerry Schatzman, and Cecil Osborn were in cabin three. Patrick Goddard, Mike Busam, Jim Neckers, Don Schrantz, Jack Gormley, Harry Pass, and Jeff Pitts were in cabin four. Cecil Osborn was the leader of this trip. As a result those of us chosen for cabin three knew that we were the "chosen ones", since Cecil assigned us to his cabin. There was some discussion as to the basis for us being the chosen ones. Several scenarios were floated as to why we were the "chosen ones". One, we were the best fly fishers, probably not. Two, we would require more supervision that those in cabin four, this is possible. Three, those of us in cabin three had more CPAP machines and thus less snoring than in cabin four. This is also possible. Four, most likely those assigned to cabin four farted more than those in cabin three. This is probably the real reason Cecil chose the residents for Cabin three to be in his cabin.

Fish were stocked in the Tuckasegee River on November 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, and they were readily able to be caught all during the trip. Those of us who fished the Tuck had some satisfying days on the river. In contrast, the Nantahala River had been stocked in October, but not in November. Those trout were adjusted to the river and had seen many flies. They became well educated over the past few weeks and were much harder to catch. Rain earlier in the week and on Thursday morning also made fish more difficult to catch.

Saturday started as a very cold day, with temperatures in the low 30's, making fishing a bit uncomfortable. However, some of us were able to find some sunny spots on the rivers and soon forgot about the cold temperature when we started catching fish. Saturday turned out to have an exceptional end of the trip meal. Cecil Osborn and Jerry Schatzman prepared an end of trip meal that was outstanding. We had salmon, mac and cheese, green beans, cold slaw, and rolls. Somehow wine and beer seemed to appear on the table and we had a wonderful feast. After eating and cleaning up the dishes many stories and tales were told. Yes, JR Jackson's name came up several times. JR's name came up because we all like him so much even though he can't catch fish. It was easy to get more and more laughs later in the evening. This was an easy crowd to please with stories.

Sunday morning we put the cabins in order and shoved off for home a little after 8:00 with all of us thinking about the fun we had and the thoughts of next year's fall trip.


It's never too early to pencil in a couple women's events coming up in 2019.

## 2019 Sunnybrook Trout Club Trips

The schedule for the 2019 BUFF trips to Sunnybrook Trout Club in Sandusky, OH is:

Spring:	May $3^{rd}$ , $4^{th}$ , and $5^{th}$ , with extra day on $2^{rd}$ .
Summer:	June 18 <sup>th</sup> , 19 <sup>th</sup> , and 20 <sup>th</sup> , with extra day on 17 <sup>th</sup> .
Fall	September 27 <sup>th</sup> , 28 <sup>th</sup> , and 29 <sup>th</sup> , with extra day on 26 <sup>th</sup> .

The trip includes 2 nights lodging at the Sunnybrook club, lunch and dinner on the first day, breakfast, lunch and dinner on the second day, and breakfast on the third day. Meals and lodging are first rate. BUFF members are given this opportunity to experience this club because several of our members are also members of the Sunnybrook Club. For each trip, there is an option for an additional day as well, as shown in the listing above. Ken Dixon has organized and hosted these trips for a number of years.

For those not familiar with the club, the Sunnybrook Club is part of the Cold Creek System, a true springfed creek system. It is cool year around, does not freeze in winter, and is fishable year around. The Club has nearly 2 miles of fishable stream on its property. All fishing is from the stream banks (no wading). The streams are a combination of pools, runs and riffles.

Cost is the same as 2018. The basic 3-day/2-night cost for non-members of Sunnybrook is \$505 per person, or \$895 for a couple sharing a bed. There is additional charge if you want to add the extra day. If you are a member of the Sunnybrook club, there is a significant discount. # Fly of the Month – Grey Goose Midge Emerger, an Evaluation Fly for the FFI Tying Skills Bronze Award

At recent BUFF meetings, we have been informed that Fly Fishers International (FFI) has an education program to help individuals become better fly tiers. The program tests individuals tying skills at 3 award levels – bronze, silver, and gold. Each level judges a series of flies tied by the individual, and if they meet established standards, the individual can achieve the FFI award and recognition.

Information on the FFI bronze-level fly tying award program can be found on the FFI website at, <u>https://flyfishersinternational.org/Tying/Fly-Tying-Skills-Award-Program/Bronze-Award</u>. There is a connection on that page to FFI's pdf file of the "Bronze Award Handbook", a 51 page file that lists the flies required for this achievement, and full trying instructions. The file can be downloaded or printed. There are also videos demonstrating how to tie each of the required flies on this page of the FFI website.

Several BUFF members have expressed interest in this program, and Gary Begley has enrolled. Gary also leads our Tie and Lie sessions, and at the last session we tied a couple of 'evaluation flies' required for

achieving the Bronze level of FFI recognition. One of those we tied that evening, the Grey Goose Midge Emerger, is a relatively simple fly, and one that is fun to tie. At the Tie& Lie session, once we finished this fly, we self-critiqued our first attempts against the fly that Gary tied as to how our flies might be judged by FFI reviewers for a Bronze award. Generally, our first attempts could be thought of as "close, but no cigar". This month's column will show how to tie the Grey Goose Midge Emerger.

#### Materials:

- Hook: size 10 14 scud hook (examples: TMC 2487, 2488 or 403BLJ, Daiichi 1130,
- Umpqua U202, or Da0Riki 125 or 135)
- Thread: Black 8/0 Uni-Thread or equivalent
- Rib: Fine silver wire
- Body: Canada goose wing fibers (herl) or similar
- Wing Case: Canada goose wing fibers (herl) or similar
- Thorax: Peacock herl
- Head: Whip finish and head cement

#### Instructions:

 After debarbing and mounting hook in the vise, attach the thread behind the hook eye, leaving some space so there is a place to build a head after the rest of the fly is complete. Wrap a neat thread underbody extending to half way around the bend of the hook. After doing this, take a few wraps to position the thread back at the middle of the hook shank to prevent the thread on the bend from sliding. Trim excess. It should look like the image on the right



- 2. Tie in the silver wire for the rib, using thread wraps starting at the end of the underbody. The wire should be positioned at the far-side of the hook shank at the end of the underbody, so that it can be counter-wrapped later. Tie in the wire along the bottom of the hook shank, wrapping thread around it to a position where the body ends, and the thorax will begin. While wrapping the wire, it is important to keep it positioned along the bottom of the hook shank; this is a criteria that is evaluated when FFI judges the fly.
- 3. Cut a few goose herl wing fibers (about 4 fibers) from wing and tie in by the tips starting at
  - middle of the hook shank and wrapping
    thread back to the end of the\_underbody.
    As with the wire, these herl fibers should
    also be tied in along the bottom of the
    hook shank (again, judging criteria). The
    herl fibers should be positioned on the
    near side of the hook at the end of the
    underbody tie-in point.
- Return thread to the middle of the hook shank with a few wraps. The figure to the right shows appearance at this phase.



- 5. Wrap the goose herl forward to form an even body using touching wraps, making sure the fibers
- remain flat and do not twist around themselves. The last turn should take the material into the thorax area. Tie in with a few thread wraps and trim excess material.
- 6. Counter wrap the wire rib forward. While the number of turns is not specified in the recipe, the FFI instructions recommend 5 turns. The wire turns should be evenly spaced. Tie in at same point as the herl body. Trim excess. The image at the right shows how fly should appear at this stage.



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7. The next step is to tie in the wing case, which is made from about 6 strands of same wing herl used to form the body. The portion desirable for the wing case is the flat part of the fibers, which is towards the base. As shown in the image on the right, the wing case is oriented toward the hook curve so that it can later be folded over the

thorax. Once the wing case is tied in, return thread to the tie-in point so that the thorax material can be added.

8. A few strands of peacock herl is used to form the thorax. The number of strands is dependent on the hook size – more for a larger and fewer for a smaller hook. For the fly tied in the video, 4

strands were used. Tie in by the tip ends, which should be trimmed so they are even before tying them to hook shank. Material should be tied in along the bottom of the hook shank, wrapping the thread forward. It is still important to leave some space behind the hook eye to allow building a thread head at the end.

 Wrap the peacock herl forward to form the thorax.
 You can overlap the herl to help fill in the thorax. Use a couple of thread wraps to lock in the peacock herl,

trim excess and then wrap a couple of thread turns to cover the ends. At this point the fly should resemble it figure on the right.


- 9. Pull the goose fibers snugly over the thorax to form the wing case. Make sure the wing case is properly oriented over the thorax and that the fibers remain together. Once positioned, tie in and trim excess. To get a neater finish, trim a few excess fibers at a time. The image to the right shows the tied in wing case before trimming the excess herl.
- 10. Build a small thread head, whip finish and trim. You can use a drop of head cement to seal the head.

The finished fly should look like the image at the beginning of this article.


