Adventures From The Reel World

My Kind of Vacation

A weather report during the first week of October reminded me of a fishing trip I had taken earlier in the year and prompted me to write this article. The report showed a 12" snowfall in Ashland, Wisconsin, where I had spent a day getting sunburned just three months earlier.

Bob Gray, my fishing partner, and I met at the airport to begin a long planned and much talked about fishing trip to Chequamegon Bay (pronounced quickly "she wam again"). We had arranged for a day of guided fishing with Roger LaPenter of Anglers All in Ashland, and we were excited to finally be on our way. We were both anxious for an encounter with the legendary Lake Superior smallmouth bass. Typically my fishing trips do not involve a guide and seldom do they start at an airport. This trip was different, we would fly to Minneapolis-St. Paul, drive to Ashland, spend two days fishing local trout streams, with a day of trophy smallmouth fishing sandwiched in between. My kind of vacation!

I was as ready as I could be. For five months, ever since the B.U.F.F. Banquet, I had been tying every smallmouth pattern I knew, in every size and color. I had been practicing with my 7 weight, on the water and over grass, not wanting disappoint the guide or look too bad casting alongside Bob. I had high hopes of fighting muscular Smallies until my arms ached.

We had been keeping up with the regional weather reports and knew that the area had a significant rainfall over the weekend, but neither of us was prepared for what greeted us as we first sighted the lake. It was the color of coffee with cream. The nearby river was swollen to capacity by three days of torrential rains. Not exactly what we had hoped for, but as we

drove closer to Ashland, the water clarity steadily improved, and so did our spirits.

We checked into our motel, and stopped by Anglers All to buy fishing licenses and confirm our arrangements for the next day. We began to notice mayflies everywhere in town. A huge mayfly hatch was taking place, and had been for over a week. Literally millions of mayflies, the huge 1"-2" long Hex's were everywhere. This was not exactly what we had hoped for either.

We spent a couple hours that evening wading the nearby Brule River catching small brook trout. It was fun, but my thoughts were on the next day. I was day dreaming of thick-bodied bronze backs slamming my flies. Back in town we went to Subway to pickup sandwiches for the next day's lunch. There were so many Hex's on the glass doors that we literally couldn't see into the shop. As I said, "a huge Hex hatch". I couldn't help but wonder if any fish in the lake would still be hungry after such a mayfly feast.

Next morning we arrived at Anglers All at 9:45 A.M., the appointed time. The smallmouth bass in Lake Superior don't get active until after 10 A.M. That suits me just fine, sleeping in, and still not being late on a fishing trip. My kind of vacation!

Out on the lake the guide lived up to our highest expectations. A well equipped, and powerful flats boat carried us a few miles down lake to the areas we would fish. Roger expertly guided the boat and us all day long. The bay areas we fished were relatively shallow, averaging 6-10 feet, capable of being effectively fished with floating line. The bottom is stacked with layers of sunken driftwood providing excellent cover for the bass. The Lake Superior area is remote and beautiful. We were treated to several Bald Eagle sightings and watched an otter playing on the shore while we had lunch. The fishing was however, very slow, at least

Conneaut Creek Steelhead

By the time November arrives, the fishing has dropped off sharply in our area of Southwest Ohio. I had heard talk of steelhead fishing for several years, but because of conflicting fishing trips, and other pursuits, I really hadn't seriously contemplated doing it. Well, Jorge Villares and I had started talking about it, and the more we talked, the more interested I became. Neither Jorge, nor myself, had ever been Steelheading before. Jorge told me that two friends he knew from Mad Men Trout Unlimited. Mark Blauvelt, and Jeff Johnson, were also interested. Jeff had never fished for steelhead before, but Mark had. What came next was an e-mail marathon between the four of us. We decided to leave the evening of November 16th. At the last minute, the weather turned bad, especially in Northeast Ohio, where Conneaut Creek is located. They were forecasting lake effect snow, wind, and cold temperatures. We reasoned that Mark would be driving his 4WD SUV, and that the nasty weather might keep most of the other fishermen away. We decided to go!

Next came a crash course on steelhead fishing. I bought and read a book on Steelheading in Great Lakes tributaries, and borrowed and watched a video on the same subject. I visited some fly shops to get needed supplies, and started tying some flies. My egg patterns didn't turn out as nice as I wanted, but my sucker spawn flies were pretty good, so that is what I concentrated on tying. I added some nymph patterns for good measure. I constructed a leader recommended in the video, and put my steelhead flies in a separate fly box, and outfitted my vest for Steelheading. I even bought a 'Steelhead' size net, as my trout nets were too small. I was as ready as I thought I could be. Jorge had been tying flies, and also preparing.

November 16th finally arrived, and the

Flyfishing the Cumberland Tailwaters

This month we are highlighting our fourth presentation and speaker for the B.U.F.F. Fly Fishing Sports Show. Brett Billings will provide an exciting presentation on flyfishing Cumberland tailwaters. This stream is just now being recognized as a first class trout fishery. It is possibly the best tailwater stream in the southeast, with catches of very large browns and rainbows, and very high densities of trout/mile. And it is only hours from the Cincinnati area. Brett will cover the major aquatic bugs Cumberland trout feed on, discuss appropriate flies and techniques, and give an update on the yearlong stomach contents analysis of trout from the river.

Brett Billings has been flyfishing and fly tying for 21 years in Kentucky, Alaska, and Germany. He is earning his Masters degree studying aquatic insects of the Cumberland River, is the associate producer of "Kentucky Afield" TV show, and is writing a book "Fishing Guide to the Cumberland River" (due out in 2002). Check out the new Cumberland tailwaters website (www.cumberlandtrout.com) that Brett is pulling together.

plan went into action. I met Jorge at his house, and we drove to Mark's house. Jeff was already there. We loaded everything into Mark's SUV, and headed on our way. As we got further north, it got colder, and started to snow. By the time we arrived at the Days Inn, in Conneaut, the weather was nasty. We turned in right away, so we could get an early start.

November 17th started off cold and windy, with heavy snow. To make it easier, we put on our waders and wading shoes at the motel. We loaded up, and were on our way. Mark knew a spot that was quite a few miles upstream from Lake Erie. With over 6 inches of snow on the ground, and still snowing, we missed our turn, and had to double back. We found a place to park, put on our gear, and walked through the woods to the stream. I had never walked through snow with wading shoes before. What a surprise! Every step added a compacted layer of icy snow to the bottoms that quickly got to be several inches thick! Imagine walking like that! I had to stop and kick or scrape it off every few steps. When we got to the stream, I opted to stay in the water, even if the water temperature was only 35 degrees! It was much easier! I was wearing several layers of synthetics, so I stayed warm. My feet did feel the cold a little.

The stream is named 'Conneaut Creek'. but it looked a lot like the 'East Fork-Little Miami River'. It was similar in size and appearance, and the flow was about 100 CFS, or so. With the big snowflakes falling, it was a beautiful sight. We spread out along the creek and started fishing. I always use 'sink putty' for the weight when I nymph fish, but I soon realized that it would not stick to the line in this frigid water, so I switched to 'split-shot'. Definitely not my first choice, but at least it stayed in place. I found steelhead fishing a lot like nymph fishing for trout, except the holding patterns were somewhat different. After a while, we all wound up at the same place; a nice sized fast run/pool. When I arrived, Mark had already caught and landed a 25" male steelhead, and Jeff had lost a couple. I positioned myself downstream of Jeff, and started working

Despite the snow and cold weather, we all stayed reasonably comfortable, and had a great time. We tried a couple other locations, and came home the next day. A good time was had by all! I'll always remember my first steelhead trip. 2



PROGRAM: At the February meeting we will have a trio of presenters on the subject of stream small mouth fishing. Bob Ireton will be tying dry flies, John Kennard will tie streamers, and Bob Goldberry will present a program on fishing for stream small mouth.



WHERE: Deerfield Park (October through May meetings) 5847 Irwin-Simpson Rd., Deerfield Township, (southern Warren County). The Park is located on the southeast corner of the Irwin-Simpson / Snider Road intersection, approximately ½ mile north, and ¾ mile west of the Mason-Montgomery Rd. / I-71 interchange. We meet in the large white house.

DIRECTIONS: Following the directions below will help you avoid the traffic congestion at the Fields-Ertel / Mason-Montgomery / I-71 interchange.

From The East Side: Take I-275 West to the Montgomery Rd exit. Turn right (north) and get in the left lane. Turn left onto Cornell Rd. Turn right at the 1st light onto Snider Rd. Follow Snider Rd. for about 2 miles and turn right onto Irwin-Simpson Rd. The park is now on your right. Turn right into the 1st driveway. There is no park sign, but the mailbox has a township emblem on it.

From the West Side: Take I-275 East to the Rt. 42 Exit. Turn left (north) and follow Rt. 42 for about 1 mile to Dimmick Rd. and turn right. When Dimmick Rd. crosses Butler Warren Rd. it turns into Irwin-Simpson Rd. When Irwin-Simpson Rd. crosses Snider Rd. the park is on your right. Turn right into the 1st driveway after crossing Snider Rd. There is no park sign, but the mailbox has a township emblem on it.
