February Presentation – Robert Thompson, Film Presentation – “Night of the Hex II”

Robert Thompson is an Emmy awarding winning producer currently living and working in Chicago, IL. A former Michigander, Thompson grew up in the northeast part of the state as an avid fisherman and found his way to a fly rod in 2004. Fly fishing soon became an obsession and in 2009, he combined his background in film & television and his love for fly fishing to create fly fishing documentaries. His first film, “Night of



the Hex” was released in 2010, followed closely by “Musky County” in 2011, “Heart of the Driftless” in 2012, “The River” in 2014, “Spey Daze” in 2017, “Summer Haze” in 2019, “Musky Country Lessons” in 2021, and the latest release “Night of the Hex II” which is a remake of the original 2010 film. All of his films are set in the Midwest and four, have been featured presentations on the Fly Fishing Film Tours.

Robert will also be bringing some of his films on DVD for sale. Price will be \$10 - \$15, and sales are cash only. Titles he will have are:

Oasis Dinner Cost

From BUFF Board of Directors

As everyone knows, inflation has raised prices of everything over the past couple of years. Those who attended the January meeting may have noticed that dessert was absent from the meal.

Following the meeting, we learned that our 2025 Meeting Contract with Oasis Conference Center keeps the price at \$20 per dinner, but in doing so, they have needed to eliminate dessert. The Board is now deciding whether to raise the dinner price to cover the dessert that we’ve had in the past couple of years (cakes/pies) or keep the price at \$20 with no dessert. If we want to have dessert served, the cost will go up and the meal will likely cost \$25. Based on discussion at the January Board Meeting, the

Board is seeking feedback and input from the membership to gauge how our meeting participants feel about having dessert with dinner, and accepting a higher cost for that.

The Board also wants to add that Oasis has, and continues to offer us an excellent venue and arrangement for the monthly meetings. We are not charged for use of the room/facility, and only pay the pass-thru cost of the meal. When we restarted in person meetings following COVID, we had a small team that investigated other venues. None offered us this. All other venues we approached required we payment for the use of the facility, and that cost was significant. Adding a meal incurred additional costs. Furthermore, for most other facilities required a separate arrangement with a contract caterer, and even at that time, none offered a meal equivalent to what Oasis has been providing for \$20.

- BUFF is committed to the conservation and preservation of our environment. In recent years, BUFF has made donations to the Little Miami Conservancy, Rivers Unlimited, Three Rivers Conservation Trust, Izaak Walton League, Anglers of the Au Sable, Mad River Chapter of Trout Unlimited, Ohio River Foundation, and the Mill Creek Alliance.
- BUFF Volunteers help with Butler and Clermont County River Clean-up Days.

Michigan Anglers Base Camp Fly Fishing Trip

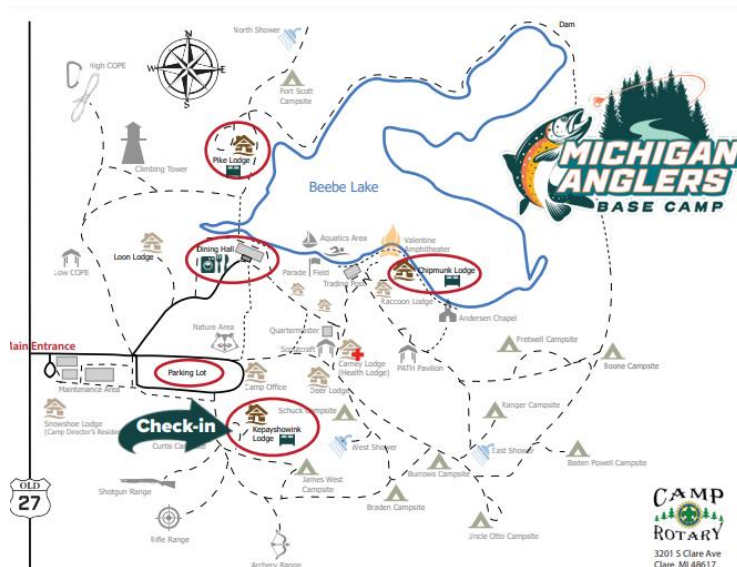
For the last few years several BUFF members have participated in the Yellowstone Anglers Basecamp fly fishing trip based outside of Cody, WY. Tim Guilfoile, of NKFF, helped organize and run these events. This past year, Tim worked with another scouting organization to organize a similar trip based in north-central Michigan, the “Michigan Anglers Base Camp”.

Michigan Anglers’ Base Camp is an adult program managed by MITTEN Outdoors Adventures & Events. The camp provides an opportunity for fly fishing on some superb rivers at a very affordable price. Furthermore, proceeds from the Anglers’ Base Camp support the Michigan Crossroads Council, Scouting America.

Anglers’ Base Camp is located in the central part of Michigan’s Lower Peninsula at Camp Rotary in Clare, Michigan. Camp Rotary has over 1,100 acres and abundant natural resources and is on a large, clear, spring-fed lake, Lake Beebe. Housing and facilities are much more modern than what is available at the Yellowstone camp. Cabins are heated and have bathrooms and showers in each cabin. Hugh O’Donnell and Lane Stocker were invited to tour the site this past November and were quite impressed. Reservations include a week of fishing, lodging and all meals. The cost does not include transportation, required fishing licenses, or any fees to fish with guides, if desired.

The camp will have 4 one-week outings starting in late April, so if interested, it would be a good idea to follow-up soon regarding availability. Cost is \$580 for the full weeks and \$385 for the one short week — Schedule and rates are below –

Week 1	Sunday April 27 – Saturday May 3	\$580/angler

Do You Want to Learn Tenkara

Tenkara. You have probably heard that word sometime during your fly-fishing life. Tenkara. Just exactly what is Tenkara?

Tenkara is the Japanese art of fly fishing: a rod, a line and a fly; simplicity and minimalist. Its history is in hundreds of years of fishing by Japanese farmers supplementing their income during the winter months. It has been in the USA for about 15 years. Some have compared it to cane-pole fishing, but it is much more than that.

Quite a few BUFF members have already embraced Tenkara. Others may have purchased a Tenkara rod, but still not fished with it, and, a lot of people have never heard of it. I started with my first Tenkara rod nearly ten years ago and have continued to fish and build my skills. In my other pastime of motorcycling, I have taught "Fly Fishing for the Motorcycle Traveler," and always conclude with how Tenkara is perfect for packing light. There is that minimalist approach again. Tenkara fishing is perfect when backpacking, bicycling, and hiking to a stream or pond. I do not consider myself an expert, but members of our club have encouraged me to teach an introductory Tenkara class.



The Tenkara Class - What will you learn?

This is an introductory class and will last about two hours. It is designed to build on your existing fly-fishing knowledge, but it is great for beginners too. The first 30-45 minutes will discuss equipment - kinds of Tenkara rods, Tenkara lines, and Tenkara flies, which largely cross-over with those of conventional fly fishing. The remainder of time we will be fishing. Equipment will be provided for attendees who do not have a Tenkara rod. For starters, class size will be limited to four members in order to provide personalized instruction. We will see how that goes and if other Tenkara volunteers want to help. I anticipate the first class will be in April. Look for announcements in the BUFFER and registration on the website.

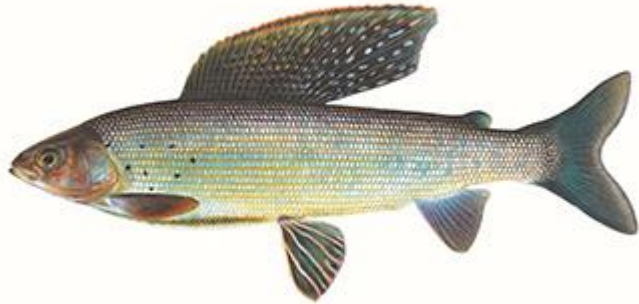


Arctic Grayling Reintroduction In Michigan Rivers

In the 1800's arctic grayling were the native fish in many of the rivers of north-central Michigan. The combination of habitat destruction by clear-cut lumbering, overfishing for commercial and sport, and introduction of competing species (brown and rainbow trout), led to their eradication, and grayling were declared extinct in MI waters in 1936. Starting in 2016, the MI DNR, together with other organizations, started the Michigan Arctic Grayling Initiative (MAGI), to study the feasibility of reestablishing self-sustaining populations of grayling within their historical Michigan range.

What are Arctic grayling?

Arctic grayling (*Thymallus arcticus*) — often referred to simply as “grayling” — are a freshwater fish in the salmon family. They have a unique and striking appearance, with a prominent, sail-like dorsal fin and often iridescent markings. Outside of the arctic, grayling is native to only Michigan and Montana in the lower 48 states.



A few days ago, the MI DNR published a new phase for this program. On May 12, the Oden State Fish Hatchery in Alanson, Michigan, will provide approximately 400,000 grayling eggs to the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, and the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians. These partners will reintroduce the eggs at locations along the North Branch of the Manistee River, the Maple River and the Boardman-Ottaway River.

Though previous attempts have been made, without success, new technologies and methods have improved the likelihood of effective reintroduction. The grayling eggs will be placed in streamside incubators to allow them to imprint on the waters in which they are placed, helping them thrive. MAGI partners will closely monitor the hatching and development of the fry, as well as follow up on how they move through these systems as they grow.

Twenty years ago, Debbie Hampton came to the board and members of Buckeye United Fly Fishers and asked you to take a risk on her dream to bring Casting for Recovery to Ohio. Your belief and support has grown into a program that has involved countless volunteers working for countless hours to touch the lives of nearly 300 breast cancer survivor-thrivers. A program that is now strong enough to expand to two retreats per year and twice as big an impact starting 2025.

We literally couldn't have done it without you, Buckeye United Fly Fishers, and for that we will be eternally grateful. You have given some women their very first cancer support group, and you've given some their last beautiful experience in nature before cancer claimed their lives. You have helped to build a community of past participants who have found connections beyond their cancer diagnosis, providing them with life-giving friendships. Those of you who've had the joy and privilege of fishing one-on-one with a lady at the retreat have inspired some of the participants to begin their own journey into the world of fly fishing. Spring is Coming – How About an Easy Fly to Tie?

Tom shared a tying recipe for an easy blue gill candy. As spring approaches, and ice comes off of local ponds, blue gill should be out there. This version was posted on the Mid-Current blog. It is simple – only materials are the hook, bead, some chenille and the legs. The fly is tied on a size 12 jig hook and uses a slotted tungsten bead. The legs, 8 in number are tied in near the hook bend.

Ken Mandel notes – I liked this pattern, and I tie a similar blue gill candy using rubber legs, beads, and chenille for the body. However, I do not bother with a tungsten bead or a jig hook. I tend to use 2 glass beads placed behind the eye, with the second bead along the shank being red. I find the red bead to be a good attractor. Maybe the fish see the red bead as ‘gills’. I’ve also not found a need to get the fly down quickly to get blue gill to eat it; they pretty much eat anything! Finally, I use fewer legs – 4 vs. the 8 in this version, but like the spider-like appearance that the legs add to this fly. Tying all these legs in at the hook bend tends to form a significant ‘bump’ in the wrapped chenille at that point. If I were to tie this version, I think I would tie in the legs behind the bead and along the hook shank to the bend. Then when you wrap the chenille forward to the bead, it should form a more uniform body. I may tie a few of both types and see which, if either, works better!
