The President's Fly Box

The New Year is here, and it greets us with opportunities and challenges. For BUFF, these opportunities include fishing trips: both local and travel trips. We also look forward to improving the Brookville tailwater fishery via coordination with other interested groups and the governing bodies. We anticipate that this discussion will begin as soon as a new state biologist is hired. The conditions of local fishing streams are always of high value to our members.

Everyone knows we still have the challenges of COVID. As I write this, the headlines say that the while the Omnicron variant may pose lower risk of severe illness, it is however highly contagious, and appears to spread more rapidly than the earlier variants. We all have choices to make to balance living our lives versus protecting from infection. BUFF recognizes this balance is needed. For the upcoming Fly Show, the show committee will monitor conditions and government guidelines. They will shift as needed to follow guidelines. For BUFF membership meetings, we take several steps to manage risk. First, we continue to limit table seating to maintain spacing between people. Second, we ask all to follow mask recommendations, and please wear a mask when self-serving in the buffet line. BUFF will maintain the ability to shift any event if warranted by conditions and government guidelines.

With positive anticipation that all activities will resume this year, our members are preparing a long list of fishing, education, and conservation events. Please reach out and help. Here are ideas of how you can help and enjoy the benefit that comes when working with a good group &/or for a good cause:

- Cohost a local fishing trip, especially where you fish often. This trip can be weeknight or on a weekend. Your help in sharing knowledge of local fishing by guiding others on-stream is important. Furthermore, being out on the water remains a socially distanced activity.
- Cohost a travel trip. If you are experienced in areas like Michigan, Kentucky, or other places, your willingness to be a trip host or leader, will help restore these trips to the BUFF travel agenda. Trip housing can be modified to minimize large group exposure by using facilities like hotels or camping versus large group houses. Steve Bailey, the BUFF Trip Director can be very helpful in providing guidance on hosting or leading such trips.
- Link a high school teacher with our education efforts so that more kids and educators are exposed to the art and benefit of fly fishing. This is often an outdoor activity.

- Become involved in one of the many groups that uses fly fishing to reach the hearts and minds of people. These groups include Project Healing Waters, Casting for Recovery, and The Mayfly Project.
- Spend a Saturday morning with our local aquatic bugs. The Stream Quality Monitoring Program is an excellent opportunity to support conservation while learning how to find and identify the bugs that trout, bluegill, baitfish, and bass eat, and which form the basis for the fly patterns we tie. Consider bringing one of your older children so they learn too.

We anticipate that 2022 will be a year of renewed opportunity. We hope that you will stay involved in this sport and BUFF. Let us all benefit from the fun, relaxation, and joy of the outdoors in this coming year.

Request Meeting Attendees Wear a Face Mask While in the Buffet Serving Line



Fly Tying Workshops – Friday, February 4th



We have scheduled three, hands-on, fly-tying workshops, led by our headliner, George Daniel, on the Friday before the show. Each session will tie a different group of flies:

- "Streamers" 9 AM 11:30 AM. This workshop will tie a "Sculp Snack Jig", Sparkle Minnow Jig", and "Verlac Wedge Head" (single hook)" flies.
- "Euro Nymphs" 1 PM 3:30 PM. This workshop will tie a "Gasolina Jig", "SOS Jig", and "Sulpher/PMD Perdigon" flies.
- "Conventional Nymphs" 4 PM 6PM. This workshop will tie a "Tan Caddis CDC Pupa" and a "Simple Bead Head Pheasant Tail" flies.

While all tying materials are provided, participants need to bring their own vice, tools, and threads. Details on what tools and materials are suggested, and level of tying skill recommended for participation, are on the BUFF website under "2022 Fly Tying Workshops".

You can register for 1 or all 3 workshops. Registration is now open to anyone who wants to register, not just BUFF members. Openings are still available. *Cost is \$30 for 1, \$50 for 2, and \$70 to register for all 3 workshops. Registration is on the BUFF website*

outings and as lifelong recreation. BUFF members volunteer and work with veterans in this
program for fly fishing and fly tying activities.

- Support for Casting for Recovery. Casting for recovery is a fly fishing program tailored for women who have or have had breast cancer. The program provides an annual retreat to participants at no cost. Funds raised at our banquet support this activity.
- BUFF volunteers teach students how to cast and tie flies in cooperation with local high schools.
- BUFF volunteers support Ohio's Stream Quality Management program on the Little Miami River.

- New for 2022 is a once-monthly evening casting workshop. This is an informal program to work

 mornings, from 9 11 AM at Cottell Park. We work with the club's excellent casting instructors

Some Things to Check Out

I found a short video by Tom Rosenbauer on the Orvis Fly Fishing Instruction site that discusses using tippet rings on one's leader. If you are new to fly fishing, of just have never considered using tippet rings, this is a good video to watch. It is only about 3 minutes long, and provides a lot of good information. Using a tippet ring allows one to cut tippet to change flies without continually shortening the remaining leader. Once the ring is tied to the leader, when one replaces tippet, such as when changing a fly, the leader is not altered as the new tippet is just tied to the ring. Tom makes the point that using a tippet ring greatly extends the life of the leader. He also gives an excellent tip on how to tie the ring first to the leader and to avoid dropping and losing them, especially if you are doing this on the water. The only knot needed is a clinch knot. It is used to tie the ring to the leader and the tippet to the ring. A final piece of good advice is to spend a bit more money and buy rings from reputable suppliers. Inexpensive tippet rings are often rough castings that can cut tippet and leader line. Better quality rings are finished and smooth and will not cut the line. Tom has another short video on this site which discusses different types of floatant materials and how they are used to keep dry flies floating. Essentially, there are liquid or gel floatants and the powder materials, like Frog's Fanny, which our club seems to have in endless supply. Tom discusses types of dry flies that are better dressed with the powder versus gel floatants, such as flies tied with delicate CDC feathers. Using a gel on these flies will just mat the CDC barbs.
