## January Speaker – Skip Morris, "Make Dry Fly and Emerger Fishing Work"

Skip Morris is among the most prolific and best known fly-fishing and fly-tying authors alive — his name is known to anglers around the world. Skip has written twenty-two books on fly fishing and tying, including what is considered the standard beginning fly tier's volume "Fly Tying Made Clear and Simple". Other notable books he has authored or co-authored include "The Art of Tying the Bass Fly", "Morris & Chan on Fly Fishing Trout Lakes" (co-authored with lake-fishing guru Brian Chan), "Concise Handbook of Fly Tying", and "Fly Fisher's Guide to Western River Hatches".



His **videos and DVD's** range from instruction for tying nymphs, to tying bass flies, to tying and fishing flies for sea-run cutthroat trout.

Skip has published **over 300 articles on fly fishing and tying** in magazines from *Fly Fisherman* to *American Angler*. For three years he was **among the hosts of the "Fly-Fish Television Magazine" show.** 

As a speaker and clinician, Skip is well-known as an entertaining, concise, and knowledgeable presenter, with a sly sense of humor and an easygoing manner that draws in the audience. He has presented to our club before and was our headliner for the 2013 Cincinnati Fly Fishing Show. He used to offer it for sale, but it is now a free download. It's a useful chart for any tyer.

- Glenn will demonstrate dry-dropper patterns
  which he uses for trout, bluegill and large mouth bass on streams and in ponds.
- Lance will tie emergers, and do a couple of different patterns during his presentation.
- Finally, Kevin Ramsey will be tying some streamer patterns that can be used in both fresh- and saltwater angling.

While Susan Thrasher's casting workshop is fully subscribed, there are still available slots for all of Gary Begley's tying workshops. The final ballot will be presented for membership vote at the February 2024 membership meeting. Members in good standing, who are present at the meeting are allowed to vote (by secret ballot) for one nominee on the ballot.

# Mountain TroutFitters Guide Trip – Fishing the North Toe River

After bidding up three trips at the annual BUFF Banquet, and explaining to my husband Bruce that I actually WON ALL OF THEM, I had the opportunity to go on one of the trips this pasts May after having joined in BUFF "Spring Trout Quest" trip to North Carolina. This was a guided trip with Cade Buchanan of Mountain Troutfitters, which included a half-day wading trip on private waters. I thought this would be the perfect exclamation point at the end of a great outing with the club. I met Cade at his shop at the Eseeola Lodge in Linville, NC. I've been to some pretty nice shops in some beautiful places but this whole upscale private community is beyond gorgeous – think about the houses that surround Pebble Beach. There are multiple



beats you can fish right by the shop as well; sort of like Orvis waters in Europe. Based on Cade's recommendation, I stayed at the Pineola Lodge Cabins & Taproom. It was a great place, filled with memorabilia, and I liked the taproom part after a long day. The lodge sits right on a trout stream – making it even more perfect! I went to bed early hoping to dream of big fish...



My guide, whom I met at the shop the next morning, was Jeff, a longtime friend & guide working with Cade. We drove about a half hour to fish private waters that were owned by his grandfather. We drove back a gravel road to a locked gate & Jeff hopped out, opened it & drove us down to a beautiful section of the North Toe River. He informed me no one had fished this area for 2 weeks; who's the lucky *girl?* Jeff pointed out a branch across the stream where he used to sit as a boy and watch his dad and grandfather fish. I love a great story like that! Jeff got out an 11-foot rod for me to try, gave me a great lesson on high-sticking with a mop fly, and we started sticking fish! I mean LOTS of fish, and LOTS OF REALLY BIG fish (as seen in the photos). I wasn't expecting them to be so big in North Carolina. We really didn't wade too far; we didn't need to. The fish were right there! This would be an excellent trip for someone who can't venture out too far. I had to back up to the gravel bank to land some of these fish and

some just flat-out broke me off. That's ok. I'm a good sport and we caught plenty the whole time. Jeff also put on tungsten flies which get down way better and way faster than the more traditional flies I've been tying.

Since the trip, I've tied some mop flies to take up salmon fishing in Michigan and I caught a nice brown on my mop, so thanks Cade & Jeff! # **The Billion Dollar Impact of North Carolina Mountain Trout Fishing**

Tom shared the following article which he received for the NC DNR. The article was written by Anna Gurney and published on the NC Wildlfe Resources website on December 8<sup>th</sup> (<u>https://www.ncwildlife.org/Connect-With-Us/Blog/the-billion-dollar-impact-of-north-carolinas-mountain-trout-fishing</u>). Clearly mountain water trout fishing is a large, and profitable tourism business for the state, and is a business that has grown considerably over the last several years.

Each dollar anglers spend to fish for mountain trout in North Carolina returns \$1.93 to its economy and results in a \$1.38 billion impact, according to new data from the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission (NCWRC).

#### The Evaluation of North Carolina Trout Anglers' Opinions, Participation and Socioeconomic Impact

study was developed by NCWRC's Conservation Policy & Analysis group and the Inland Fisheries Division. The report deep dives into an analysis of the socioeconomic aspects of trout fishing. In addition to monetary values (including out-of-state angler contribution, equipment and trip-related expenditures, etc.), the study explores anglers' motivation for participating in the sport,



satisfaction levels and challenges of trout fishing in this state, as well as feedback on NCWRC's management of trout.

"We took a very comprehensive approach to this study. We wanted to better understand how anglers utilize the trout waters we manage and the views of trout fishing from the anglers themselves," said Jake Rash, cold water fisheries research coordinator. "Understanding anglers' motivations and perceptions provides broader insight into this popular North Carolina sport."

The report was published in July and outlines how the various dollar amounts spent on this sport resulted in an overall economic impact of \$1.38 billion. The previous economic impact evaluation, published in 2015, reported the impact to be \$383 million. The increase in the economic impact of trout fishing is largely due to the increase in freshwater anglers in North Carolina. The number of fishing license holders increased 53% from 2014 to 2023, while the estimated number of trout anglers increased from 18.5% to 32% of all licensed anglers. The 29% increase in the cost of living since 2014 may also have played an important role in increasing the cost of equipment and trip-related expenditures.

"Given the recreational importance of trout fishing, it's important for NCWRC to understand public perceptions on management of trout and expenditures on trout fishing," said NCWRC Mountain Region Fisheries Supervisor, Doug Besler. "These surveys put an economic value on the resources we manage and help us focus our programs and infrastructure, such as capital investments in modern fish hatcheries. In addition, these surveys allow us to better communicate with constituents and partners about the value of the <u>Public Mountain Trout Water</u> program (PMTW) and its potential benefits to their community."

The PMTW program manages approximately 5,400 miles and 2,600 acres of trout waters in 26 western counties, with <u>six distinct classifications</u>: catch and release, delayed harvest, hatchery supported, special regulations, wild trout waters and wild trout/natural bait waters. This year, the N.C. General Assembly granted \$20 million to NCWRC to help fund a major renovation and expansion of the <u>Bobby N. Setzer State Fish Hatchery</u>, which is NCWRC's largest trout-producing hatchery. <u>NCWRC hatcheries</u> produce and stock about one million brook, rainbow and brown trout each year.

PMTW also manages and oversees wild, self-sustaining trout populations; native brook trout conservation; aquatic organism passage and stream habitat projects; numerous partnerships; and aquatic nuisance species management.

- Cost for the 2024 trip is \$985/person for the one week trip. A \$500 deposit is required at the time of registration. Each week is limited to 32 participants.

#### Other Information -

- There will be an additional van and more drivers to get anglers to locations in 2024.
- 4 new graveled sites for RVs are being added to provide a total of 6 sites. All have electricity, and there is fresh water and black-water disposal available.
- For those who travel by air, Tim suggests you consider Billings-Logan Airport, in Billings, MT as an option. There will be a shuttle service on Sunday from the airport (and hotel) to the camp.
  - One advantage is lower ticket prices and greater flight choices for Billings than the Cody airport.
  - If you choose to fly into Billings, and arriving on Sunday, Tim asks that you to arrange arrival times around 12:00 noon +/- an hour or two, to make pick-up by the shuttle service efficient, and provide time to drive to the camp.
  - Another option is to arrive on Saturday, and stay in Billings. If opting to do that you are asked to stay that night at the Rodeway Inn Billings-Logan Intl Airport (1315 N 27<sup>th</sup> Street, Billings, MT 59101 (406-245-4128)). Using the recommended hotel will have everyone 'clustered' and make the Sunday shuttle to the camp more efficient.
