Spring North Carolina Trout Trip – Trip Leader Needed

Mike Redmond has indicated that he will not be the trip leader for the 2025 Spring North Carolina trout fishing trip. This is usually scheduled in late-April, and is a popular club trip. The club is seeking someone to be trip leader for this event. It would be a great opportunity for one of the regular trip participants to take this on, as you know the routine.

Another Montana Trout Trip

Most of our members are aware of the late summer trip to the Yellowstone Park area organized by Yellowstone Anglers Basecamp. This trip occurs in early August and is a week of fly fishing based out of the Camp Buffalo Bill boy scout camp. The camp is on the North Branch of the Shoshone River and offers access to this stream as well as rivers in and near Yellowstone National Park. Several of our members have participated in this trip over the past few years.

Well, we now have an opportunity to join another fly-fishing trip in Montana. This trip is offered through Western Kentucky University, who have been doing it since 2012. Fishing is based out of Missoula, which is in northwest Montana. The dates are Monday, September 22nd thru Saturday, September 27th. The schedule has arrival on 9/22, 4 days of guided fishing - Tuesday – Friday (9/23 – 9/26), and departure on Saturday, 9/27. All fishing is from boats and is guide-led. Rivers which can be accessed from Missoula include the Blackfoot, Bitterroot and Clark Fork.

Cost is effected by the number of anglers - \$2,750 per person if there are 9 anglers (minimum) to \$2,475 if there are 17 anglers (maximum). This includes 5 nights lodging (Holiday Inn Downtown Missoula), 4 days of guided fishing. gratuities for guides, lunches when fishing, and airport-hotel shuttle. Travel to and from Missoula, licenses, and other meals are not included.

Things of Possible Interest

Hand Strip Line or Use the Reel?

Here's an item Tom Bachey found on the MidCurrent Blog site.

We've all been here: the moment you set the hook, you're faced with two choices: use the reel or trust your fingers to maintain the delicate connection between you and your quarry. Each approach is a distinct tool to use in landing fish. So, when do these techniques work best?

A strip retrieve works most often when working smaller water or dealing with fish under about sixteen inches. That frisky brown trout darting through the pocket water isn't going to take you into your backing, and your hands will give you the split-second control you need to keep it out of those submerged branches. The same goes when fishing for smallies in riffles—quick adjustments to line tension can mean the difference between solid hookup and a story about the one that got away.

Signs You Should Switch to the Reel

Line burning across your stripping finger, the fish heading for the next county with your line and showing no signs of slowing down, or the fish the first appeared to be a decent rainbow turns out to have shoulders like a steelhead, are all good clues it may be time to switch to the reel and rely on the consistency of a quality drag system. Making the switch requires practice to maintain steady pressure while gathering loose line and engaging the reel and avoiding any slack. Modern reels are designed to tip the odds in your favor with drag systems that can deliver consistent pressure which systematically wears down fish while protecting those 6x tippets from sudden surges. When you hook into something that's going to test your backing knot, that drag mechanism becomes your best ally in the fight.

Different waters also suggest different approaches. In a brush-choked mountain stream hand-stripping can keep fish from wrapping you around every submerged root wad. But when you're on water where fish have room to run, and few obstacles you need to worry about, getting them on the reel fast becomes critical.

Each species also writes its own rules. Smaller fish, such as a little brookie in a mountain stream, call for stripping line. But when you're swinging flies for winter steelhead or working the flats for bonefish, you want that fish on the reel before it realizes it's hooked.

The bottom line is that there are no rigid rules in choosing between reel and hand-stripping. It's about reading situations and responding with the right tool at the right moment. These are techniques that need practice to become second nature. The more comfortable you are switching between methods, the better equipped you'll be when that trophy fish inhales your fly. Over time, the decision becomes a less conscious choice and more instinctive.

Fish Every Cast

The key point of his article to emphasize that regardless of how good or poor a cast is, if the fly hits the water, fish it!

Justin is a guide, and he opens the article by saying Just about every day that I spend on the water with a client, I'll find myself, at some point, explaining to them the reasons why I want them to fish each and every cast to the very end.

Flies only catch fish when they are on, or in, the water. All too often we all lay our fly on the water, and immediately rip it off the surface to make another, hopefully better, presentation. This is a major mistake -


- For one, the act of landing flies on the water and then ripping them off creates noises, ripples, and splashes which can either spook fish, or at least alert them that somethings going on. If the fly hits the water, leave it and let it drift out of the run, or at least well downstream of the fish, before picking it up.
- Secondly, take your time and regroup. Yanking your flies from the water only to cast again
 without changing anything isn't likely to make the next presentation any more successful. Take
 time to make adjustments before recasting. Change your position, check your distance,
 maximize your chances to make your next cast better or more on target.
- The third thing that I emphasize is the "you never know" factor that is always there. Just because you think you've made a crappy cast doesn't mean it will have crappy results. Fish don't know that you made lackluster cast, and that presentation may lead to a hook-up.

Making awful casts is just part of the game. We all do it, but sometimes those "awful" casts can produce some amazing results. So, even if you're certain that a presentation is a dud, it is best to let it go in order to save you some grief. Let each drift play out and view each cast as a learning experience. Use them to make adjustments for the next presentation and you'll be more successful on the water.
