Adventures From the Reel World

ALMOST HEAVEN

Jayne and Dave Uckotter, Louise Goldsberry and myself, Don Prince and Jon Kennard ventured into wild and wonderful West “by God” Virginia, the beginning of June to fish for the gamest of freshwater fish - the smallmouth bass.

Dave and I rafted the New River along with our wives the first day of the trip, a beautiful, bright and sunny day. One of those “bluebird days” that I hate to fish; give me those cloudy overcast days everytime. But, there we were, pretty bright and fairly early, to begin our fishing odyssey on the New River. Jayne and Louise were, of course, forewarned they had better not catch more fish than Dave and I, or dire consequences would follow. Our warnings, of course, fell on very deaf ears.

Well, we had not floated 100 yards when I got one heck of a strike, upon setting the hook. “The Fish” made a

strong run up current, then cross current, then I pumped him up a couple of times, followed by a dive to the bottom. I thought I had tangled with one of those so called “hawgs.” (That’s what the Saturday morning TV fishing pros call a big fish.) I was going nowhere fast until finally our guide was able to row back upstream so my line was going straight down and I was able to look down and could see I had “caught” someone’s trot line. My fly not only grappled that trotline, it was sliding up and down the length of that thing making me think that not only was he pulling directly against my rod, but also diving and going cross current. Oh, well, that was a big letdown and I may have heard a few snickers from the other end of my raft and the one occupied by Dave, Jayne and their guide. Fame can be so fleeting.

Continuing on down the river we encountered riffles, pools, downed trees, weed beds and rocks of all sizes. Just about every kind of cover any self-respecting smallmouth could ever hope for. I attempted to make a cast

to every lively looking spot I could find. Although my rod and line were smoking from so much use, the flies I was choosing were not meeting with many of my intended prey.

Once in a while, I would sneak a peek at the other raft and more often than not, would notice a tight line with a bent rod. I had been given a hot tip that morning that led me to believe that white was the "hot" color. Something must have been changing my white flies into some kind of camouflage that made my offerings to these West Virginia bass so ineffective that these fish would never find anything on the end of my line. As I look back on our highlights of that first day, it was the shore lunch for me. To sum up, Louise and Jayne had a good time and caught some fish and I know Dave did pretty well. While I caught less than the fingers on one hand, I'd like to meet the guy that coined the phrase "almost heaven."

Day two on the New River, Dave and myself were joined by Don Prince and Jon Kennard, Jayne and Lou having chosen to do some sight seeing and shopping. This day started with a little rain as we were having breakfast at the hotel but by the time we jumped in our rafts, the rain had stopped, but the clouds remained. Don and Jon were into fish right away and Dave and myself were right behind them. I think we were catching some larger fish today than we did yesterday and I believe I

discovered a fly that was holding it's own against that brown wooly bugger. Tied with squirrel hide, brass bar bell eyes and a little crystal lite under the tail, it proved to be my best fly of the trip. It did so well, I dubbed it the "Squirrely Screamer."

Halfway through the float, our guides from Twin River Outfitters, Dave and Bubber set up our shore lunch and by this time of day every one of us had worked up a pretty good appetite. The weather remained very overcast so as soon as we finished eating we packed everything back in our two rafts and were soon into fish once more. At one point, Dave and I were into fish at the same time. A feat that we readily let our buddies in the other raft know about.

Just after this double header, I hit on my best fish of the trip. Fishing the "Squirrely Screamer" down the side of a steep rock and gravel bank, the fish of the trip struck. Setting the hook I could tell there was no "give" from this smallmouth. He made a run under the raft from which I was able to turn him. Then, coming up alongside, he turned on his side, pushing a foot and a half long. A very deep profile and we all got a good

look at him. Then, he went deep again and when he did, I lost him.

Not long after this heartbreaking affair, we could see the rain clouds coming our way, right down the river valley. We could see it and hear the drops hitting the trees on each side of the river's corridor. When it reached us, it was as if someone had turned on the fire hoses, we had rain jackets on but they only delayed the soaking we were to get in a very short time. We beached the raft and sought shelter under the trees. This worked for awhile, but soon, just as much rain was dripping through the trees as was falling out in the open. After spending about two hours in one of the hardest rainstorms I've ever witnessed, we arrived back at our hotel where after wringing out my underwear and a good, hot shower, I was finally feeling human again.

Thinking back, I realized we went from "Bluebird Days" to the monsoon season, we shared meals of Chinese, Tex-Mex, and Biker bar fare with good friends. "Almost Heaven?" Not quite, but even considering the one that got away, it was close enough. ■

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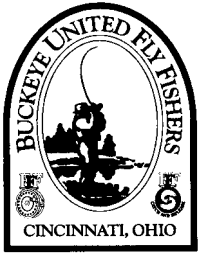

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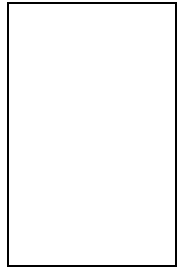

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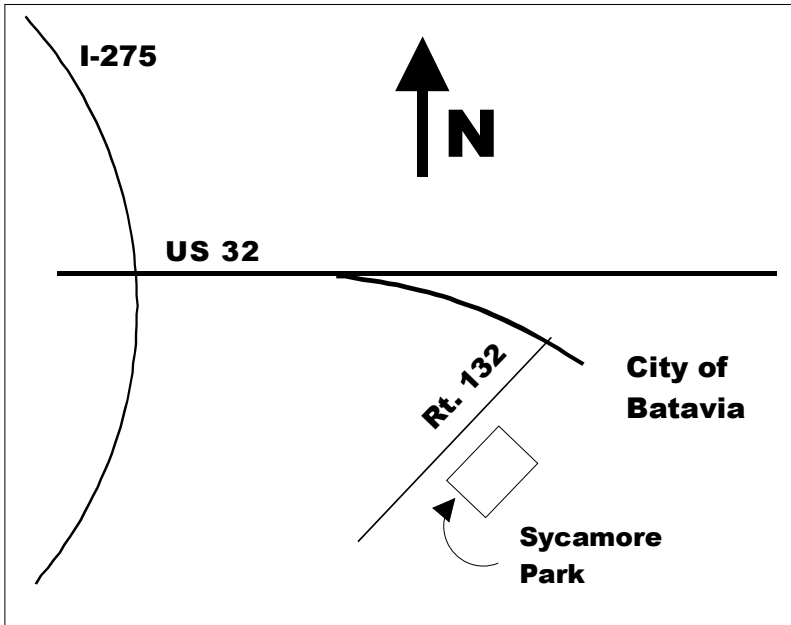
