On Thursday, we had a nice day to fish. Doug Mowell and I struck out! But, Linda Ireton caught five fish, while Bob Ireton only caught one. Bob Said "She is just getting too good!" Roger Corrado and his son caught a few smallmouth at the upper end of the campground. Randy Clark, Steve Walker, Jeff McElvary, Jim Agin, and Charlie Montgomery all caught a few fish in the pool by the campground--from their pontoon boats. Bob and Terri Mackey also caught a few fish. On Thursday night the wind came up, and we must have had 2 plus inches of rain. The water became 4" deep around my picnic table so I moved the van up the drive pad to higher ground. The wind pulled out a couple of tent stakes allowing my dining canopy to collapse. My table cloths were soaked, the matches were wet. What a mess!!!!

An Evening on the Elkhorn Creek

It was the week of May 23rd before I finally got to do some real fishing this year. I arrived at the Fish Hatchery on the Elkhorn Creek about 2:30PM, and got in the water about 3:30. I began fishing the far channel with a blue popper. I was working the popper from a back eddy up to a seam of the fast water. I caught two smallmouth bass (7 and 8 inches).

Shortly, I heard a strange sound coming from the area of my line; it was a school of bass pointing and snickering. I was only casting out the leader. The knot connecting the tippet and popper came untied. The tippet and popper was floating down stream toward the Kentucky River. I will be at Lou Haynes' knot tying table at the next meeting!

The fishing gods came to my rescue. I was fishing the same kind of water that produced the other two bass. Something knocked my popper out of the water. I fished other similar spots with no luck before going back to that bass's hideout. This time it inhaled the popper, and the fight was on with jumps, runs and tail walking. I netted a 14inch smallmouth.

A seven inch blue gill also decided to eat the popper, and another not much bigger than the popper hooked itself.

This afternoon was made more memorable by the fact that the blue popper and the net all came from classes given by BUFF members.

Here are some hints about fishing the Elkhorn Creek at the fish hatchery. If you plan to fish past 3:00PM, you must park outside the gate, since it is locked at 3:00PM. It is about a quarter mile (a country mile) walk to the creek from the gate. Just up stream from the hatchery the creek splits into two channels and then rejoin farther down stream. A good first time plan is fish down the far channel till they join and back up the near channel to your entry point. There are numerous runs, pools and back eddies on both pools.

Did you know?

The patron saint for people who fish is the apostle Andrew. In mythology the god for people who fish is Tyche (Greek) and Fortuna (Roman). Now you know where to turn when the fishing goes sour!

In Morrow turn LEFT at second traffic light (State Route 123). Drive 1 block and turn rt. before bridge.
