# The President's Notes Jeff McElravy (<u>imcelravysr@cinci.rr.com</u>)

Life is good! As I contemplated writing this message, I am in process of the West Virginia trip. Randy and I have for the last few years started our trip a few days early at Kumbrabow State Park. The Mill Creek runs through this park and has some beautifully colored Brook trout. The stream runs from about six to eight feet at its smallest to twenty something with runs and deep holes spotted between pocket water and riffles. They have six cabins that sleep between three to eight persons. They have wood burning fireplaces and stoves and a generous wood shed stocked with split wood. The lighting in the cabins is propane based. The drinking and cooking water is found at one of several hand pumps not too far from the cabins. The sanitary facilities offer silent no hands flushing. The cabins were built by the WPA and CCC and are very well maintained. We stayed there three nights and fished for four days. The Bookies are very fast and ranged from four to seven inches. A trophy fish measured in at eight inches. Great fishing with a two to four weight rods. The canopy was open enough to use a full length rod in most of the stream, but some of it needed a seven footer or so. I did well this year, but not quite as good as last year. Randy had some outstanding fishing, and I think he told me he had a thirty fish day. Sitting at the table eating dinner fixed on a wood stove, watching a fire in the fire place after a good day of fishing, is the best. The weather ran the gambit, from a few snowflakes on the jacket and a chilly night on Monday, to a little rain here and there, to a sunny short sleeve day at the end. Life is good!

Thursday we left and went to the other spectrum of convenience, Elk River Springs. We shared a cabin on an island with three other BUFF members Gene and Dixie Gaffney and Jeff Messerly. Electric power and lights, a working kitchen, and two full baths. A large gathering room and a great front porch were part of the package. We decided to forego cooking and ate at the dining room on the meal plan. The food was very good, and there was more than I could eat. A full service fly shop was upstairs of the dining room with all the tiny flies (28s anyone?) and 7X and 8X tippet you could want. March brown in 14 and Sulfurs in 16 were hatching in the afternoon and evening. Close to dark the spinner fall was just starting. Good timing by our trip leaders Rodney and Steve. The fish that I caught and the ones that I saw were all good size and heavy, some very heavy. I was using both a four and mostly five weight fly rods and the fish put a real bow in both of them. I think everyone caught fish, even the first time new members. The last night on the spinner fall I lost count of the fish I caught and the smallest was about 16 and the largest was just under 20. Randy did better than I did

and had a larger fish break him off before he could get it to the net. Earlier in the day, I saw a 26 inch fish caught in the Mill hole by the Fly Shop. Life is good!

I really enjoy going on the fishing trips with BUFF. It is the time that you get to know the people behind the faces you see at the meetings. You get to share what each of you has learned no matter the level of experience. Sometimes the eagerness of the new members ferret out information we haven't heard of or have long forgotten. When we return to places we have fished for a few years, it's interesting to see how they have changed along with us. The gathering at dinner, in a great room, on a porch, or around a campfire is some of the best parts of the trips. Thank you for sharing them with me.

# Muskies On A Fly

Come learn a little about the tackle, gear, and flies used to catch ESOX MASQUINONGY ... AKA the "water wolf" ... AKA muskellunge or "muskie" for short. At least those that inhabit the lakes and rivers in Kentucky and Tennessee. Mike Arnold has been fishing for these toothy critters since 1991, while bass fishing at Cave Run Lake in central Kentucky, and, a small one decided Mike's bass fly was in the wrong place at the wrong time. Ever since, he's been making at least one or two trips a year to his favorite waters and so far has accumulated about five "legal" muskies (36" in KY now) and twenty-some less than legal (ten at 32" which used to be "legal"). So far, he hasn't cracked the 20-pounder goal he set for himself years ago, and he attributes his lack of success to not being able to cast planer boards and cannon-ball downriggers with his 9-weight outfit.

## The smallest Mayfly in North America is the Tricorythodes Minutus, their common name is Trico, and among fly fishers they are often called "the white-winged curse".

The Trico dun refers to a subimago stage of metamorphosis unique to Mayflies that occurs between the nymph and adult stages during which the reproductive system is developed. The male duns emerge from the water in early evening and make it to the streamside vegetation where by dawn they have transformed into adult spinners. The female duns emerge at dawn and immediately change into spinners. The males will swarm over a riffle in the stream followed by the females. Together they form what appears to be a dense cloud. The top third of the cloud are males, the middle third are males and females, the bottom third are fertilized females. Shortly after joining the swarm the female is mated and the male, fully spent, falls. Meanwhile the female flies to some nearby vegetation where the fertilized egg is pumped from her abdomen to an egg sac. She then flies back to the stream to deposit the egg sack after which she falls fully spent into the water. The eggs hatch into nymphs in a few days and quickly grow while shedding their skin several times. In about seven weeks the cycle starts over with the males emerging once again and the females follow. The eggs from this second emergence don't hatch right away, instead, they go into diapause until next year.

## **Brookville Tail Waters TRICOS**

The tricos (tricorythodes), the only predictable mayfly hatch on the BTW, usually start emerging in late July and can continue on a daily basis until early October. Watch for the mating swarm high above the water at first, then descending closer to the water. Keep an eye out for rises and spent spinners on the surface. Hook size tends to diminish from #22 to as small as #26 as the season goes on. Small caloric return from these little fellows usually finds the fish keying in on slower water to minimize energy expenditure. I was spotting one morning from the 252 bridge, and the mating swarm engulfed me. I had them in nose and mouth, but never have had a better look at the imago stage before they fall as spinners. Long leaders and perfect dead drifts do yield results, but fill your vest with patience before you head over.

His modest, affable manner has helped bring many folks into the sport of fly fishing and build BUFF as a premier fly fishing club.


A native of southern Illinois, Jerry has had a lifelong love of the great outdoors. From farm ponds in Illinois and Texas, to the Alaskan tundra, he has honed his fly fishing skills to expert status. He has also pursued outdoor studies professionally, earning a PhD from Duke University and serving as professor in the Department of Biologic Sciences at the University of Cincinnati, specializing in the studies of algae, fungi, lichens, and bryophytes. He has been published in numerous scientific journals and has mentored graduate students as faculty advisor for their pursuit of advanced degrees. He is married to Linda and lives in Colerain Township.

Since retiring from U.C., Jerry kicked his love of fly fishing into high gear, teaching fly tying classes in local fly fishing shops and converting the basement of his home into a first rate bamboo rod making shop. Over the years, Jerry has produced dozens of fly rods and developed self-taught skills and methods in rod building, machining, and finishing. He is constantly tinkering in the shop, improving the operations and experimenting with new methods. He has contributed rod building fraternity. Though his rods compare with the best, Jerry is not interested in building rods for sale, preferring instead to teach others how to build rods. He has taught about a dozen BUFF members to build bamboo rods and currently has 5 BUFFers working in his shop. Jerry's teaching skills are very apparent, as is his encouragement and enthusiasm for the hobby. He charges students a modest fee, mainly to cover materials and shop consumables.

Jerry has been generous to BUFF over the years, contributing bamboo rods as raffle prizes for club banquets and the Greater Cincinnati Fly Fishing Show. The raffle sales for his rods always sell out, owing to the obvious quality of the workmanship and fishability. The value of rods contributed by Jerry over the years approaches \$20,000. Beyond the rod donations, he has participated in BUFF fly shows by showcasing a rod building booth and making presentations on bamboo rod building.

These days you'll find Jerry fishing with friends and students in Indiana (trout, bass, bluegill, white bass) depending on the season. He will catch twice as many fish than you do, but claim a few less than you.


