Hello springtime! As May comes to a close and June is ready to bust out, I think we have finally gotten into some great fishing weather. May saw three of our more popular Club trips occur; the Sunnybrook Trout Club Trip, the Carolina Trout Quest Trip and the Elk River Trip. Sunnybrook Trout Club BUFF May Trip

The only confirmed trip in June is the Sunnybrook Trip on June 24, 25 & 26. We normally have a trip to the Elkhorn River in Kentucky in June but we need a trip leader. If someone would take the trip leader's position, this trip could still occur this year. (An experienced person is willing to be an assistant.) Similarly, the September trip to the Pere Marquette is also in need of a trip leader. Contact Steve Bailey if you would like to lead either of these trips. I encourage our new members to check out the Club sponsored trips. This is a great way to try out some new waters with folks that have experience and are more than willing to help get you on the fish.

June will see other Club activities as well:

- Casting Classes are scheduled June 1, 8, & 15 from 1:00 to 4:00 at Cottrell Park in Deerfield Township near Mason. There are still openings available. If interested contact Gary Begley at loopdude1@hotmail.com or signup using the on-line registration.
- On June 7, you may want to take the family to "Bug-Fest" 2014 in the Rotunda and the Museum of Natural History at the Cincinnati Museum Center. A number of our members will be on-hand doing tying demonstrations, discussing stream entomology and providing casting demonstrations and discussions. "Bug-Fest" is open from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM.

- At the June meeting, our own Mike Rubush will be doing a presentation on fishing with a Tenkara rod and flies. Don't forget to register for the meeting. I am looking forward to this one!
- On June 14, the Ohio Council of the International Federation of Fly Fishers is sponsoring its Warm Water Conclave from 9:00 to 4:00 at the American Legion Pavilion located along the banks of the Clear Fork River in Bellville, Ohio. At least 10 BUFF members will be participating in this event. If you aren't fishing, get a group together and run up for an enjoyable day. Appearing at the Conclave will be Chris Helm, Steve Waak, and Jerry Drake. There will also be on-going tying demonstrations during the day, live and recorded seminars as well as live casting demonstrations and games. Admission is \$5 per person, \$10 per family. Various raffles and door prizes will be on-going throughout the day. The main raffle is for a day of fishing for two people at Sunnybrook Trout Club near Sandusky. This prize, valued at more than \$300, includes access to the private Club waters of Cold Creek; fishing fees and lunch (no overnight accommodations are provided). Tickets for the Sunnybrook trip are \$10 each with a maximum of 100 to be sold. If interested in pre-buying a ticket, contact me at krgidix@outlook.com. You do not have to be present to win.
- On June 20, BUFF will be assisting Northern Kentucky Fly Fishers at Kids Fest at Old Coney Island where we will be helping kids bait hooks and land fish at Lake Como. At prior events, the kids fished large farm watering tanks but, with the event moved to the Lake, there is much more room and we will need many more volunteers. NKFF is providing all the equipment, we just need to show up and help. If you can volunteer, contact Ed Jones or sign up using our on-line registration system. As I am writing this article, we only have 2 of 14 positions filled. Please Help!
- We will once again be helping at Parky's Farm this summer. See Ed Jones' update on Parky's later in this edition.

In **July** we will be having our annual joint meeting with NKFF. It will be held on **Thursday**, **July 10**, at Pioneer Park located at 3951 Madison Pike, Covington, KY 41017, which is easily accessible from I-275. We will be using the main shelter house (turn right after entering the park). The official meeting will start with a social hour at 5:00 PM followed by dinner at 6:30 (fried chicken, two sides and coleslaw plus drinks). The program for the evening will be a presentation by NKFF members on warm water fishing techniques plus casting clinics. This will be a swap meet so bring anything fly fishing related you would like to pass along to someone else. Cost will be \$10 and you must register (using the BUFF on-line registration) prior to July 5 (attendance is limited). If you wish, come early and fish Banklick Creek which is adjacent to the Park. The Creek is small and wading is prohibited so be prepared to do roll casts from the bank (a Kentucky Fishing License is required).

Round Goby

Studies have shown that the invasive gobies have become the major dietary item for Lake Erie Smallmouth. www.gameandfishmag.com



The Bass Island region of Lake Erie once supported a large population of mottled sculpins, a small bottom dwelling fish that were largely wiped out in the 1950's along with much of the aquatic life as a result of the pollution that took place in the Great Lakes. The Clean Water Act led to the improvement in the lake's water quality and the population of native fish such as the yellow perch, smallmouth & largemouth bass, and walleye returned. Unfortunately for the Sculpin an alien was introduced into the Great Lakes about this time as ships from the Black and Caspian Seas dumped their ballast that contained among other invaders the round goby. The goby is about the same size and has a similar appearance as the sculpin and both prefer the same lake environment. In the competition for food and spawning space, the sculpin lost out and the goby took over. The goby is native to the waters in Central Asia that is also the home of the zebra mussel, a major component in the goby's diet where they normally consume them at the rate of around 80 a day. In Ohio, while the goby are dining on the zebra mussels the water snakes in Lake Erie are dining on the goby. Perhaps there aren't any predatory snakes in the Black and Caspian Seas and the unaware goby is an easy prey. In any case the snake population rebounded and the Lake Erie Water Snake was removed from the Endangered Species List. In addition to feeding the snakes the gobies are an abundant food source for several fish besides the smallmouth bass. If only they would quit raiding the nests of other fish that are trying to spawn!!!

Major Changes at Parky's Farm for 2014

Maybe you are a regular or occasional volunteer for BUFF education activities at the Parky's Farm program pond in Winton Woods. Maybe you are just thinking about helping with that this year. In either case, you need to know of major changes in Parky's schedule for 2014 made necessary after a disastrous fish kill late in the 2013 season.

The program pond is the larger of two ponds on the property and where we help Parky's teach young children, adult individuals, and family groups how to fish for largemouth, bluegill, and the occasional catfish. It's located behind the big Program Barn. This pond will have very limited fishing activity this year - if any. It was stocked with 75 hybrid bluegill last fall and with 625 2-4" bluegill and 130 4-6" largemouth bass April 8, 2014. There are also a few grass eating carp in the mix, which should help control some of the vegetation that has been plaguing the pond in recent years. The progress of the restocking will be closely monitored with an eye on the 2015 season. We normally have Friday fishing with young children during May, but all of those activities were suspended for this year.

Some regular events normally held at the Program Pond <u>will</u> be conducted on a more limited basis at the smaller pond on the property. We sometimes refer to it as the "front pond" or the "no fishing pond." It is located just south of the main entrance to Parky's Farm. Project Healing Waters will be allowed to hold some of their activities at this location, even though it has the disadvantage of no wheel chair access. The "Barnyard Bonanza" public fishing programs (for individuals and family groups) are scheduled for June 25, July 2, 11, 18, 25, & 30; and August 15. These activities usually begin at 9 AM and last for one or two hours each morning. BUFF volunteers have been invited to come early, to help, and stay late for some bonus catch and release fly rod action. Please go ahead and ink these dates in on your personal calendar. It may save you the agony of attending something you would rather avoid ("Sorry, Honey, but I already have a firm commitment that day!)." If there are to be other events that might include BUFF, they will be determined at a later date.

Parking permits will again be required this year. Most BUFF members purchase a \$10 annual permit that allows them access to all of the Great Parks of Hamilton County sites. If you do not wish to purchase an annual permit, please let me know that you need a daily permit and I'll make sure you get one for each date you need 513-523-6523).

"Kid Fest" at Old Coney

BUFF has been assisting NKFF with one of their major service projects for several years. One day of the annual Paddle Fest activities at Old Coney has traditionally been for the benefit of youth and young children. Hamilton County Great Parks calls it the Kids Outdoor Adventure Expo which includes activities and presentations from a large number of outdoor service providers. We typically refer to it by its original name, "Kid Fest."

This year's Kid Fest on Friday, June 20, 9:30 – 4:30, will be bigger than ever. If we get enough volunteers from BUFF and NKFF, the fishing part of it will be better than ever. We will help hundreds of kids learn to fish with spin gear at Lake Como on the park property. NKFF does nearly all of the preparation for this activity. All we have to do is show up and help bait hooks and release fish.

We will also be able to try out our fly rods before or after the events and during any slack times. This change of venue will be a big improvement over past years, but it will require about twice as many volunteers. We will be spread out over the southwest quadrant of Lake Como rather than scrunched around in a crowd around a few horse troughs.
