Between Club sponsored Fishing Trips, Outside and Inside Education Events and other activities, June is shaping up to be another busy month for our Club.

### **Rock Snot**

In North America Didymosphenia Geminata aka Didymo or Rock Snot is expanding its geographical range and in some streams is forming massive growths.

Until recently Didymo was found in only a few streams in the United States that were cold and low in nutrients and in those few streams it had to compete with other algal species, consequently it wasn't a problem. However in Northern China the Didymo has always been a terrible nuisance that would completely cover a stream bottom with a thick heavy growth. Then in the early 1990's, worldwide changes began to be seen in the Didymo population when more and more areas began showing larger, more extensive blooms particularly in New Zealand. In Colorado and parts of the West it has exploded, but not here although it has been identified in Pennsylvania, New York and West Virginia. The algae produces a stalk that grows out from itself that can attach to rocks, plants, or other submerged surfaces. When the didymo cell divides the stalk divides also eventually forming a mass of branching stalks that remain long after the cell itself has died. Not much is known about this algae consequently there isn't an effective method for its elimination or control

and presently the only technique to stop its spread is by decontaminating anything that may have come in contact with it especially waders with felt soles, but just how this algae manages to propagate and spread is not well understood.

- Your BUFF name badge
- Your rod, reel & fly line; (5, 6 or 7 weight, floating line)
- Stiff leader OX or 1X 7 ½ feet long
- Yarn for a practice fly, (3/4 inch maximum length, visible color)
- Sunglasses?
- Hat?
- Bottled water
- Folding chair

Before class day, please <u>mark your fly line</u> 30 feet from the tip end with a 6 inch long mark that goes all the way around the line. A permanent marker such as a black *Sharpie* is recommended.

(Caution!! let the ink dry completely before reeling the fly line back on to the reel)

## **June Meeting Program – Fly Fishing Kentucky**

### Meeting Date, Wed. June 10, 2015

Speakers - Tom Schrodt and Valerie Askren

James Thomas Schrodt, professor emeritus of chemical engineering at the University of Kentucky gave up his tennis playing and took up fly fishing for cold and salt water fish in 1985. This pursuit has carried him into over a hundred waters including rivers in New Zealand, Alaska, British Columbia, the lochs of Ireland and occasionally the salty flats off the Florida coasts. His most exciting river catches include a 22 inch Cutthroat out of the Bitterroot in Montana, a 35 inch Steelhead out of the Thorne in the Isle Prince of Wales and a 30 inch Rainbow out of the Copper River flowing into Alaska's Lake Iliamna. He has brought a few small Tarpon to boat, but is still looking to land that trophy. Tom's three sons are also avid fly fishing anglers and when their time allows they gather together for some serious fishing. In 2012 Tom began teaching fly fishing in the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute and the University of Kentucky Discovery Program. He and Valerie became acquainted in 2012 while fishing the East Fork of Indian Creek in the Daniel Boone National Forest and shortly thereafter committed themselves to writing "Fly Fishing Kentucky". Tom lives with his wife Rita in Lexington, Kentucky.

After more than 20 years in academia, Valerie Askren traded the life of living in ivory towers to spend more time being close to nature. Her background in natural resource economics and love of the outdoors has translated into a second career of writing hiking guides, including "Hike the Bluegrass" and "Five Start Trails: Louisville and Southern Indiana". An avid outdoorswoman, Valerie has swum in Lake Malawi, climbed Mount Tai, sailed the coast of southern France, biked Nova Scotia, backpacked Canada and survived the biting cold of farm life in the Ukraine. Her honeymoon was spent kayaking the Grand Canyon with her husband, Ben. Now that Tom has opened her world to fly fishing, she has even more excuses to get outside. The mother of four, Valerie lives in Lexington, Kentucky and as soon as this book hits the shelf she hopes to be back out on the water

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
