Charity Rutter —"R&R FLY FISHING"

Program Description

Charity's abiding love of the outdoors can be traced to her childhood on a farm in rural Oklahoma. Charity received her BA in Graphic Design from the University of Central Oklahoma and upon graduation immediately moved to East Tennessee to be near the Smoky Mountains where she became an avid hiker, camper, and fly fisher. She and her husband Ian own and operate R&R Fly Fishing in Townsend, Tennessee. She has been guiding full time since 2002.

Charity worked in advertising for 10 years before eventually following her love of fly fishing into a career as a fly fishing



guide. She has been an ardent conservationist, participating in several native brook trout stream restoration projects in Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Charity was the co-coordinator for the Great Smoky Mountains TroutFest that was held for 8 consecutive years in Townsend, TN to raise support and education of the trout stream restoration projects in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Charity was part of the team of women that brought Casting For Recovery to Tennessee and she also spearheaded an effort initiated by Trout Unlimited to put trout in schools in East Tennessee through the Trout in the Classroom project. This program has been incredibly successful, teaching children the importance of clean water and fish many never knew existed so close to their homes.

Charity has fly fished in numerous locations including Yellowstone, Patagonia, Maine, Belize, Mexico, and the Everglades but still cites East Tennessee as her favorite place to fish with its diversity of opportunities. She was named one of the top female guides in the country by Field & Stream Magazine in 2015. Charity has hosted groups of fly fishers to destinations outside of her home waters including Montana, Idaho, and Belize since 2005. She has spoken and taught casting clinics at numerous fly fishing shows and clubs across the country.

Charity & her husband Ian have collaborated on five books about fly fishing as well as a video series. They are currently working with a team of film makers to create a documentary on protecting native brook trout in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. The couple has two children, Willow and Boone, who have been in the woods and on rivers and streams within days of their birth and have accompanied their parents on many of their adventures and volunteer projects with their TU Chapter as well as the Great Smoky Mountains National Park Fisheries biologists. They are true ambassadors of the sport of fly fishing.

Charity and her family reside in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains in Townsend, Tennessee.

Favorite Floats: Casting streamers on the Clinch River



Take action to help prevent Lyme Disease

yme is an infectious disease caused by a bacterium transmitted to humans by the bite of infected blacklegged ticks. It is the most common tick-borne disease in the Northern Hemisphere. There

are an estimated 300,000 cases a year all across the U.S. The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates the number of Lyme disease cases nationwide could be 10 times higher than what's actually reported.



Symptoms often begin with a distinctive bullseye rash. Some people experience fever, aches, sweats and low energy. It may evolve into various neurological problems, including facial palsy, severe headaches, muscular aches, and sensitivity to light. Without antibiotic treatment, Lyme disease can lead to permanent motor, sensory and cognitive impairment.

Ticks are active any time the temperature is above 40 degrees and there is not dense snow cover. After you have been hiking in brushy areas or in the woods, check yourself and family for ticks. Look in all the nooks and crannies, including your armpits, ears, and in your hair. Be sure to check young children, because they may not notice a tick. Adult deer ticks are hard to find; nymphal deer ticks are even smaller and look like freckles with legs.

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services offers these tick tips:

On outdoor excursions where blacklegged ticks could be present, use insect repellent that contains 20%-30% DEET.

Wear clothing that has been treated with permethrin.

Take a shower as soon as you can after coming indoors.

Look for ticks on your body. If a tick is attached to you, use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick at the surface of your skin. Pull the tick straight up and out. Don't twist or jerk the tick — this can cause the mouth parts to break off and stay in the skin.

Put your clothes in the dryer on high heat for 60 minutes to kill any remaining ticks.

Hunters and anglers cannot get Lyme disease from dressing carcasses, or eating game meat, but are more likely to be in tick habitats.

- 1 You are 10 times more likely to contract Lyme Disease than West Nile.

- 3 The common MP is using an extremely inaccurate form of testing which is only 50% accurate.
- 4 Lyme can be spread by any insect that feeds on blood (gestational / sexually also being proven in case studies)

- 6 If not treated properly it most often turns into a debilitating chronic condition.
- 7 Lyme symptoms includes symptoms that often lead to years of misdiagnosis. IMS, Pepression, ect)
- 8 To find a Lyme Literate doctor, contact the Lyme Pisease Association or ask someone currently being treated by one.
- 9 Lyme Pisease enters the central nervous system almost immediately and even if "cured" many endure relapses years later.


