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The President's Fly Box

In May, the rain fell, the rivers rose, and fish spawned. The North Carolina trout trip group enjoyed a great trip. White bass fishing trip was a success with many stories of 50 fish days. Unfortunately, our first local trip and first stream quality monitoring event were cancelled because of unsafe river flows. BUFF will always ensure that we have safe conditions for fishing. Luckily, pond fishing was good in the area. I believe that I caught my largest ever pond bass this May (3-pound bass versus the normal 1-1.5-pound bass). June promises for even better fishing. Do it with BUFF. Check the BUFF calendar and please signup.

Our fly-casting course was completed in May, and the class graduated <u>five women and two men</u>. This was the first time that women outnumbered men! In Person Presentation!



Take I-275 to the Rt 28 exit.

The park is a few miles on your left.

Fly Fishing is a Growing Sport –

Hugh O'Donnel shared an article from the May newsletter published by "On The Fly South" (www.ontheflysouth.com). The article summarizes results from a 2021 Special Report on Fishing published by the Outdoor Foundation. The Outdoor Foundation is part of the Outdoor Industry Association, a trade association of companies and manufacturers of outdoor activity related products. The report evaluated angling participation in 2020, covering who went fishing and the type of angling engaged in.

The important message from this report is that there is a huge increase in interest and participation in fly fishing. The report estimates that *in 2020, 7.8 million people went fly fishing*. This represented over a 40% increase from an estimate of 5.5 million who fly fished in 2010, and a 20% increase over estimated numbers from 2016. In addition, not only are more people getting involved in our sport, but those who are fly fishing reported getting out to fish on more occasions. The reported estimated that Americans who fly fish had spent million fly fishing outings in 2020, an increase of 27% from just the prior year. The increase in fly fishing is also being seen economically, as increase sales of equipment and accessories, which is good news for those in the angling business.

What is also important is that we are seeing growth of those new to fly fishing. Almost 18% (1.7 million) in the 2020 report, claimed this was the first time they fished with a fly rod. Furthermore, the sport is attracting younger participants with 47% under age 35. About 30% of fly fishers were women, and women's participation is also increasing.

Openings for Local Fishing Events in June –

July Local Fishing –


We have two local fishing outings in July. Both are 'after work' evening outings. Registration is now open.

Tippet Rings

I've found a couple of videos discussing the use of tippet rings, and for those newer to fly fishing, this my be useful information.


One of issues with using leaders is that as we tie and replace flies, we continually shorten the leader. This is intrinsic to the process of cutting off and replacing the fly. With commercial tapered leaders, the end part usually consists of about 3-4 feet of tippet. Hence, if you have a 9-foot 3X leader, the final few feet represent 3X tippet. As we replace flies, we continually shorten this segment and after changing flies a few times, we need to add tippet to restore the leader to its length.



A tippet ring, is a small, lightweight steel ring. One ties it onto the end of the leader, and then we tie a length of tippet to the opposite side of the ring, and a fly to the end of that tippet piece. When using a tippet ring, when one replaces a fly, one does not further shorten the leader. Just replace the fly and if needed, the tippet length, added to the ring. The main section of the leader remains unchanged. In his video. Tom Rosenbauer emphasizes how this preserves and provides a much longer 'life' to one's leader.

Tippet rings generally come with several mounted on a small clip. As shown in the Orvis and Rio videos, the general recommendation is to tie the tip of the leader to the ring while it is still on the clip, and then remove the ring from the clip and relock the clip. This reduces the risk of dropping a ring

when tying it to the leader, and dropping remaining rings from the clip. If you drop it, you're not going to find it! Once you have the ring on the end of the leader, you then tie on a piece of tippet to the other side of the ring, and the fly to the end of that piece of tippet. Tie-on to the ring is simple, and uses a standard clinch knot or improved clinch knot. Smaller rings, such as the 2 mm product shown here, do not add significant weight to the line, and are light enough to float on in the water film.

Another use of these devices is when using an indicator and dropper set up. For this, one can separately tie both the indicator and dropper flies to the ring. An example of this is in the video from Rio.

Things of Interest –

Fishing Tailwaters -



This month, the Midcurrent.com site has a blog on fishing tailwaters. For anyone not familiar with the term, a tailwater is the outflow area below a dam. When the dam releases water from the bottom of the impounded lake above, the water temperature is cooler than surface water, and the temperature tends to remain relatively constant through the year. This can make an excellent environment for trout. Locally, the tailwater below the Brookville dam is a

prime example of this type of fishery, though currently we are having issues due to ongoing maintenance of the dam. While the article published by Midcurrent appears to primarily discuss Western tailwater fisheries, the ideas would hold for others as well. Four Most Important Knots We Need –

Another video blog posted to the Midcurrent.com site is by Alvin Dedeaux demonstrates 4 knots that are basic to fly fishing. Primarily these are used when tying leaders and tying a fly onto the tippet end.

Perfection Loop is recommended to the loop-to-loop connection between the butt end of a self-tied leader and the loop on the end of the fly line.

Blood Knot is recommended for tying leader sections together to build the taper in self-tied leaders. It is smaller and smoother than a Surgeon's knot for this purpose.

Surgeon's Knot (also called a "Double Surgeon's Knot) is recommended for tying a tippet length onto the end of the leader.

Clinch Knot/Improved Clinch Knot is the knot recommended for tying the fly onto the end of the tippet.

It is good blog post, but some of the tying techniques are a bit difficult to see, but there are other animated knot demonstrations that can be used to observe detailed tying techniques. Cleaning Your Fly Line –


Tom Rosenbauer has a You-Tube video which provides basics on how to clean the line. As Tom describes, there is not much on can do to 'damage' modern fly lines short of physically damaging the line or exposing it to solvents. The latter is important, as we need to be careful when using sunscreens and insect repellents, to avoid getting these agents on the line because they can contain solvents.

Tom emphasizes that cleaning the line is important to maintain performance. A clean line moves smoothly through rod guides and casts better. To clean the line just strip it off the reel and soak it in some soapy water for a few minutes. Rinse off the soap and dry the line by pulling it through a piece of paper towel. While Tom doesn't recommend using a line dressing, many of us do use these materials, and feel they have value. How often you should clean a line depends on a number of factors, including how clear and clean the water you are fishing is. Here is the video link:


Recent Photos We've Received –

Directions to Oasis -
