Ohio River Shrimp

The Ohio River Shrimp (Macro brachium Ohioan) is the best-known of all North American freshwater shrimp

At one time, the specie known as the Ohio River Shrimp thrived in the River as far upstream as Wheeling. Their numbers were large and they were a food source for the people living along the river as well as the wildlife in the River. They were migratory and as the water warmed the females would carry masses of their orange colored eggs to the mouth of the Mississippi where the salinity of the water was high enough for their larval offspring to molt. Upon reaching adulthood, and with the water warming again, the young shrimp would begin the reverse migration and hordes of them would make the journey upstream. The females can grow up to four inches long and the males are smaller; both sexes have front claws with one claw much larger than the other. They are probably closer to the crayfish than they are to shrimp and can crawl out of the water to get past an obstacle. However the dams and other structures that the Corps of Engineers have in place prove to be too much for these migratory shrimp. Now instead of making it all the way to Wheeling, they are seldom found above Memphis. However, in the lower Mississippi and the Atchafalaya River in Louisiana they are the most abundant life form in the stream where they serve as a crucial food source for birds and fish.

The system is designed to assist with ride-sharing arrangements, permits wait-listing, allows the organizers to register non-Buff individuals, and simplifies email communications within the group. Fly fishing for small mouth bass in Ohio is sort of a lost art but is slowly gaining popularity. Fly fishing for smallmouth

can be challenging but very rewarding. A completely different mindset is required than that required for fly fishing for trout. Bass will produce some of the greatest little battles on the Ohio creeks and rivers, and the best part is there is plenty of water. As a biologist, my studies included understanding the biology components of smallmouth and how to make our rivers cleaner and more natural for generations to experience. But ultimately, it allowed me to understand what they eat, how they feed, and where to target these bronze-backs.



Fishing has been the way of life for me since I was 3 years old. I contribute my passion to my father, who still enjoys hooking up on the local smallmouth from which I grew up on. Now that I am 29, my passion has turned into a dream come true by becoming a

professional fly fishing guide and General Manager of ReelFlyRod Outfitters and Sugar Creek Fly Shop in Dayton, Ohio. I grew up all my life in Beavercreek, Ohio and graduated from Ohio University. I then became a Wildlife Biologist for 7 years for the Five Rivers Metro Park County Park system in Dayton, Ohio. I am currently pursuing an MPA in Public Administration. "BUFF Pond" allowed some folks to learn how to cast, to try new rods, as well as providing Boy Scouts the opportunity to work on their casting skills and Fly Fishing Merit Badges. Our 2014 promotion with the local Boy Scouts of America was a terrific success. Attendance by the scouts was far in excess of anticipation and kept the Buffers running the merit badge program scrambling all day. We anticipate making adjustments to this program next year to allow for this tremendous growth. Thanks to all of the BUFF volunteers who spent the entire day working with the scouts and didn't get a chance to enjoy the show!

The BUFF membership desk also did well during the show, signing up 24 new members and providing all attendees with a valuable overview of the club's activities and events.

We are grateful for those club members, vendors, and attendees who provided feedback on our recent online show survey. Findings from these surveys, as well as from general comments from club members and members of the community, will be used to help insure the event keeps pace with the needs of the club and the regional fly fishing community.

Our special thanks to Jerry Snider and Mike McFarland for donating rods to be raffled at the show. Proceeds from these raffles are critical to making our show a financial success.
