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MAD RIVER REPORT FOR OCTOBER 2000

October on the Mad as been tough fishing because of the heavy leave drop that we get every year at this time however, some morning fishing before the wind picks up and the leaves blow has produced a lot of nice fish in the 10 - 12 inch range with a few bigger ones caught as well. Using larger nymphs that the fish can see among the leaves seemed to work well. Prince nymphs in a #10 or # 12 have been working well as well as nymph patterns with a little flash in them!

By the time you read this, most of the

leaves will probably be down and the fishing should be easier by mid-November, one of my favorite times of the year to fish the Mad. Some "Reds" have been showing up on the stream bottom which indicates the fish are starting to go through their spawning routine! If you see fish on the Reds, try to leave them alone even though we know that most of the eggs die anyway do the large amount of slit in the Mad. Maybe with God's help, some of the fry will actually make it although there is no evidence to substantiate this for sure.


A few weeks ago we (Trout Unlimited) did our fall stream sampling and I am happy to report the 3 areas we sampled rated "Good" to "Excellent" with a lot of different types of bugs and other aquatic life in the river. The first area

Louise Goldsberry 265 Clarks Street Batavia, Ohio River, Williams Fork, Roaring Fork, Arkansas and Platte Rivers and several very small unknown streams that hold thousands of 8 to 12 inch trout that I have discovered. These are all within 45 miles of my house and most within 15 miles. I have found that the fishing to be a lot more challenging then in Ohio fishing for bluegill and bass.

One of the disappointments out here is the lack of a club that does anything close to what B.U.F.F provides its members. The TU club is inactive and is trying to get started again but lacks direction. I have volunteered to help if they need it but they have not even started any planning to bring it back. I have spoken to the current president about being involved in the transition and hope he allows me to help.

I was hoping to find a club that could continue to teach me about reading streams, casting, fly tying and entomology. Unfortunately, this has not been the case. Most of the shops are willing to help out on where to fish and what to use, but that is about it. It is kind of pricey for private lessons and none that I have found have any kind of classes.

So I encourage the membership to keep up the good work and continue the direction you have taken. I have great memories of learning to tie flies, casting lessons and having the opportunity to meet interesting people and learn from them. I did not realize what a great opportunity I had until I moved out here. Although, I am not willing to give up what I have here to move back and learn more about flyfishing. I would rather struggle along here with the hopes of catching some of the monster Rainbows and Browns in the Blue River that can reach up to 20 pounds and average 4 to 5 pounds, or spend the afternoon in the wonderful scenery trying to figure out what to use and where the fish might be. I know most of you don't believe it, but this is not a fish story either. The Blue River flows through Dillon Lake, which is dammed at one side.

Several years ago the powers to be out here decided to put shrimp in the lake to grow bigger fish faster. Unfortunately, for lake fishermen, the shrimp went straight to the bottom. The dam happens to be one of the few earthen dams that is a bottom release dam. (So you hope it doesn't break while fishing below it, just part of the adventure) Thus, sending hundreds of thousands of shrimp a day out into the Blue River. So the fish in the river feed on shrimp and get extremely big and fat. That stretch of river is strictly catch-and-release allowing the fish to continue to grow, but making them very, very smart. They put up quite a fight but are very picky and hard to catch. I am told a two-hour fishing trip might net one, possible two, fish in the 4 to 5 pound range if you are lucky. I have yet to catch one of any size that's a fish of a lifetime. One of the people in the fly shop I was in had a video of him landing a 13 pounder. I just hope to see one of those monsters one day but I am almost positive it would not have fit in my net. (Should have taken the net building class) It is a struggle catching these fish but I seem to learn something new ever time I put my waders on.

If you have any questions on Summit County or have an interest in fishing out here you can email me. I can be reached at andygentry@earthlink.net. I am more then willing to show anyone where the good spots are for a lesson or two on stream reading. So, again thanks for all that you have taught me and keep up the good work. I hope to bring back some picture of a monster fish some day. If I do happen to see/catch one, like any good fisherman, I will

swear I landed it, and show them to

anyone interested in seeing them. •

was below St. Rt. 36 in Urbana which rated at the top of the good range and the bottom of the excellent range. In our 3 square foot sampling we found both caddis and mayfly nymphs, riffle beetles, crane flies, aquatic worms, snails, and even a Crayfish! (Extra points!). The second area we sampled for the first time was Kings Creek near St. Rt. 29, which rated Fair to Good. The third place was on Maccochee Creek which rated "Good". We found a large number of large yellowish mayflies this time that we believe to be either Brown Drakes or Yellow Drakes. But the jury is still out on this until we have an "expert" look at samples we collected in a vile.

The next TU activity will be a Habitat Work Day on Nov. 11th. We will meet at the St. Rt. 36 bridge/low dam at 9:45 AM. If you are interested in helping out, please feel free to come. There will be fishing afterwards in the afternoon. For those of you who attended the TU banquet in Springfield we thank you for your support and hope you had a good time! We had about 60 people in attendance a lot of nice prizes were raffled or auctioned off!

As far as other Mad River News, the state did its fall stocking about a week or so ago and I heard through the grapevine that we got a "bumper crop" this year. So fishing should be excellent in the next year or two! If you go up this year and get into an area where there are a lot of "small ones", please leave them alone and wade on and fish for bigger fish. These little guys have a higher mortality rate after being hooked than the "holdover" fish. Don't keep pounding them, please give them a chance to grow. Tight lines till next time! \spadesuit



PROGRAM: Steve Groome will provide a slide and video presentation on saltwater flyfishing in Mexico, the Bahamas and Florida. Should be a great program!!!



WHERE: Deerfield Park (October through May meetings) 5847 Irwin-Simpson Rd., Deerfield Township, (southern Warren County). The Park is located on the southeast corner of the Irwin-Simpson / Snider Road intersection, approximately ½ mile north, and ¾ mile west of the Mason-Montgomery Rd./ I-71 interchange. We meet in the large white house.

DIRECTIONS: Following the directions below will help you avoid the traffic congestion at the Fields-Ertel / Mason-Montgomery / I-71 interchange.

<u>From The East Side</u>: Take I-275 West to the Montgomery Rd exit. Turn right (north) and get in the left lane. Turn left onto Cornell Rd. Turn right at the 1st light onto Snider Rd. Follow Snider Rd. for about 2 miles and turn right onto Irwin-Simpson Rd. The park is now on your right. Turn right into the 1st driveway. There is no park sign, but the mailbox has a township emblem on it.

From the West Side: Take I-275 East to the Rt. 42 Exit. Turn left (north) and follow Rt. 42 for about 1 mile to Dimmick Rd. and turn right. When Dimmick Rd. crosses Butler Warren Rd. it turns into Irwin-Simpson Rd. When Irwin-Simpson Rd. crosses Snider Rd. the park is on your right. Turn right into the 1st driveway after crossing Snider Rd. There is no park sign, but the mailbox has a township emblem on it.
