Adventures From the Reel World

Cedar Run -

Spring Creek Fishing Only 75 miles from home!!!!!!

Would you believe you can catch rainbows, browns and brookies 365 days a year in less than an hour and a half drive from Cincinnati? In late August this year, I had the privilege of being a guest at the new Cedar Run Club just north of Springfield, Ohio in Champaign County, and I can tell you I was quite surprised. This natural spring fed tributary of the Mad River has been improved and now harbors rainbows, browns, and brook trout averaging 12-15 inches. Some of the browns are even wild or came up from the Mad and have grown to lunker size.

This spring fed creek is almost 100% ground water so it is cold and clear and of very high quality! And with the amount of gravel on the streambed and no silt problems, this creek can support natural reproduction. In fact, it is documented in the book "Fishes of Ohio", that this creek did hold a population of brook trout around the turn of the century. The creek starts in the Cedar Bog Nature Preserve and flows approximately 3 miles into the Mad River near County Line. When I got to Cedar Run, it registered a brisk 60 degrees on that hot summer day even though

Lower Mad registered 68 degrees a few hours earlier.

The stream has some riffle and pool areas in the improved section and some long flat "natural" stretches with a lot of canopy and enough varying degrees of difficulty to keep the fishing as easy or challenging as you want to make it. I drifted my two fly rig (a dry and a dropper) along the watercress-lined banks (which were abundant) and through the holes in several spots and netted 4 or 5 nice browns and brookies in less than two hours.


In one hole, I even managed a "double" with a brookie on my royal humpy and a brown on my PT emerger! (That was over 3 pounds of combined thrashing around on the end of my 3 weight!) After a quick picture of the pair, I released them unharmed. While fishing I also observed some beautiful bird life including gold finches and hummingbirds. Which came down to the water for a drink!

Jerry will cover the best times to fish the Missouri, major hatches, equipment needed, habitats to fish, where to stay, and more! He will emphasize how to wade & fish a large river by breaking it down into small stream habitats. The Missouri River coming out of Holter Lake/Dam between Helena and Great Falls is essentially a huge spring creek, thus typical of spring creeks the dry fly hatches consist primarily of small dry flies usually in the 16 to 22 range. While the Missouri can be fished with a drift boat, canoe or even float tubes, large rainbows and browns in the 18" to 22" range can be crawled upon on hands and knees and fished for with light tackle and small dry flies. This is an excellent wade fishing river for the fly fisher who is willing to explore a bit to see what is around the next corner. We'll have lots of fish pictures will be shown as well as fly patterns to be used.

This is going to be a great one, I hope to see you there!

The Cast

Last month we discussed the difference of style vs. the essentials or principles in fly casting. Before we tackle the essentials, I think it paramount that we have a good understanding of what makes up the "basic cast". There are 4 parts to the basic cast. The pickup, the backcast, the forward cast and the lay-down or presentation. Many knowledgeable and skilled casters believe of that of these the pickup is by far the most important one to get right, with the backcast second in importance. Some have even suggested numerical allocations of percentiles of importance to the various parts of the cast, with the pickup being worth 50%, the backcast 25%, the forward cast 15% and the presentation 10%. This does not mean that you should not be concerned with making a good presentation. What it does mean is that if you make a quality pickup and backcast you are almost assured a quality forward cast and presentation cast.

Be aware that it is difficult to accurately discern where the pickup ends and the backcast begins. They are both part of a continuous motion. What constitutes a good pickup and backcast? First, there must be no slack in the fly line when you begin the pickup stroke. Second, the rod tip must be low. I advise my students to have the rod tip nearly touch the water. Third, start the pickup with a smooth lifting of the rod and an accelerating rod stroke that ends with a crisp "power snap" of the wrist. This positive stop of the rod hand will cause the rod to bend and load, thereby throwing the line in a tight loop to the rear. The single most detrimental error made by most casters is starting the pickup with the rod raised too high. If we reference he rod to a clock face, the rod should be no higher than 9 o'clock when starting the rod pickup. I prefer and suggest you start at a 7 o'clock position. The pickup stroke must transition smoothly into the backcast to a positive stop. This positive stop is accomplished with a slight snap of the wrist, but do not break the wrist excessively. Doug Swisher calls it the "micro-wrist" snap. A pause of the rod movement, which length in time is conditional upon the amount of fly lie held in the air, transitions into the forward cast. Here again a smooth application of power with an acceleration of the rod stroke to a positive stop is the key. A simple way to remember this is "all rod strokes start slow and end fast". The final part of the cast, the presentation is a simple matter of lowering the rod as the fly line falls to the water. If you have correctly executed the first 3 parts of the cast, a quality presentation cast almost certainly will follow.

Next month we will begin exploring the essentials of the cast. Until then, tight loops and tight lines. -



Directions:
