The Board is working on a great calendar of events, including fly fishing education, outreach, dinner meetings, and of course, new and interesting fishing trips. More to come in the upcoming months!

Giving Back - At the October dinner meeting, we announced our plans for a revitalized B.U.F.F. conservation program. We're really excited about this opportunity to give back! A conservation committee has recommended the following approach/guidelines:

- Start with small, manageable steps
- Conservation efforts should remain linked with fly fishing (B.U.F.F. is first and foremost a fly fishing organization)
- Conservation is another way for B.U.F.F. and its membership to give back to society and the environment
- Efforts should be focused in our region
- Promotion of volunteer support will be linked with opportunities to learn and educate
- Explore new waters / techniques / awareness
- Provide environmental activities / information for fly fishers in the region.

Our initial efforts will focus in on the Great Miami River. Everyone who heard Joe Cornwall's inspiring presentation at the last meeting was fired up about the possibilities on the Great Miami River. Joe will organize numerous day fishing trips to the GMR and it's tributaries in 2006. This will provide our members the opportunity to explore a new watershed. It will provide us the opportunity to educate, inform and promote issues related to GMR at the same time. We'll begin to develop links with other conservation-minded GMR organizations, and participate in activities and events such as clean-ups, float trips, etc.

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November Meeting Program

Bob Goldsberry, noted bluegill and bass catcher, and fish-dog trainer, will share his secrets about the fine art of pond fishing. Find a Good Smallmouth Stream Use Your Computer!!

This is the first in a series on how to find a local stream that has good smallmouth fishing without leaving your house - by using your computer!

A table of all of the streams in the State of Ohio has been compiled by the Department of Natural Resources, Division of Water, and can be found online at the following site:

www.franklinswcd.org/adobeDoc/GAZETTEER_OF_OHIO_STREAMS.pdf

Go online and bring up the site, read the introduction, and look over the table of data. Among the features of a stream listed in the table are: the stream or lake that it empties into, the county where its mouth is located, the length of the stream, its average fall, and the watershed area.

A good watershed to look at would be the Little Miami, although the Great Miami or any watershed would be as good. The online GAZETTEER has a search feature (the binocular icon in the tool bar) and a search for "little miami" will take you to it. Reading across the table shows that the Little Miami flows into the Ohio River; has a length of 105.5 miles,; the elevation at its source is 1137 feet above sea level; and at the mouth is 448 feet above sea level, giving it an average fall of 6.5 feet per mile; and it drains an area of 1757 square miles. Scrolling down shows that the first tributary of the Little Miami is Cluff Creek with a watershed of 8.31 square miles.

The size of the watershed is a good indication of the size of the stream. For instance, O'Bannon creek is a nice small stream with a fair amount of flow, a watershed of 59.1 square miles, and it has a nice smallmouth population. However, if it were much smaller, it probably wouldn't have enough flow to support any smallmouth. So, a rule of thumb would be that any stream with a watershed less than 50 square miles would be too small, and a stream with a watershed much greater than 50 square miles should be fine.

Getting back to the GAZATTEER, Cluff Creek would be much too small for a smallmouth stream. Scrolling further down and examining the column for the size of watershed we come to the East Fork of the Little Miami with a watershed of 499 square miles, obviously a good size stream. The streams in the table following the East Fork are its tributaries, (notice the "Flows Into" column). One of the tributaries is Stonelick Creek with a watershed of 76.8 square feet. That stream would be worth checking out.

By scrolling down the list of streams in the Little Miami watershed, we can identify the ones that may be large enough to support a smallmouth population.

Next month we will look a little more into stream flow, and also the stream gradient.

The rod is a 6'3", 4/5 wt, 2 pc, 2 tip rod with rod sack and aluminum case with polished brass butt/tip caps. Besides handcrafting this beautiful rod, including the components, Jerry made the rod tube as well. It is quite substantial, with very thick aluminum walls and buffed bright brass end caps. It is a larger diameter and quite heavy. The rod tube is based on tubes that were provided with bamboo rods numerous decades ago. We will be selling only 100 raffles tickets (@ \$20 each (there are actually only 99 tickets left, I've already purchased mine!!). We will start selling raffle tickets at the November meeting, and will announce the winner at the 2006 Gr. Cincinnati Fly Fishing Show. A Guided Trip on the Pere Marquette (PM) Roger Corrado

A young man approached us as we were sipping a few beers on the back deck of the Barothy lodge, Elkhorn, after a long day trying to find and catch fish. Fishing on the PM was poor as few fish had entered the river and we were wondering where to fish the next day. This young man turned out to be Jed Litwiller from the Indigo Guide service, and he happened to have a day free, the following day, and Patti Howell had suggested he come to the lodge to see if anyone (Joe Guenther) was interested. Feeling good (from the beer) and bad (from the lack of fish) we decided to pump Jed for suggestions and tips on fishing the PM (with no intention of hiring him). After spending about 30 minutes getting all variety of questions answered by Jed I asked him about the equipment he used. He said that he liked to use spey rods. This interested me because I had just bought a spey rod, but didn't know how to use it. Jed, after learning that I had bought one and brought it along, offered to teach me how to use it. Impressed by his generosity and offer of a lesson, I quickly got my rod and Jed spent about 30 more minutes giving me a free lesson.

To make the story shorter, we were all so impressed with Jed that we hired him for the next day. Jed picked us up at the lodge at 6am the next morning and by 6:30 we were on the river. Of course it was pitch black and Jed used a small headlight to navigate down the river. I really enjoyed drifting down the river in the quiet. However, it wasn't long before we realized why we needed to be on the river so early. We saw several other guide boats and it seemed all were trying to get to their preferred fishing spots before someone else got them. Luckily, we were able to get one of Jed's preferred spots, a deep dark hole on the outside bend, just below a very attractive house that overlooked the PM.

Jed quickly rigged up the 14 foot spey rods, but not before the owner of the house came out and welcomed us by throwing us apples to snack on from a tree in his yard – the apples were good. Jed taught us all to cast with the spey rod, which is unique in that the cast is made in front of you and you don't have to worry about catching a tree behind you. After fishing for about 10 minutes I tied into a large male salmon that did some terrific acrobatics and raced up and down the river a couple of times. Excited, I put a little too much pressure on him and he broke off – disappointment city. Jerry Schatzman however saved the day by hooking and catching 2 large female salmon from this hole.

After a while we packed up and headed further down the river stopping at a hole here and/or a redd there. At lunch time we stopped by a long gravel bar and Jed taught us a little about scouting the river and spotting fish before getting in. After getting each of us set in productive looking areas Jed started lunch – wow – he got out his grill and cooked us each a thick pork chop, homemade beans, homemade bread, homemade brownies, and some melon. What a great lunch! Jerry saved the day again and caught a large male salmon – I was getting jealous!

Jed worked hard to ensure we were having fun, learning new fishing techniques, and locating more fish. At the next stop I hooked and caught a nice salmon and Jed adroitly chased the fish down the river and expertly netted it – what a relief and excitement at the same time. Working further down the river we found another productive gravel bed and both Bruce James and I were able to catch some nice salmon. Our day ended as we pulled up to the landing at our lodge and beached the drift boat. I had wondered the day before whether we would get to fish very long, but at the end of 12 hours I had fished about as much as I had wanted and we were just in time for supper. I think Jed would of stayed out longer but we all wanted to see what the caterer was serving and we would be eating that night. Of course we also wanted to do a little drinking and bragging about the fish we caught.

This was my first drift boat guided trip and I was glad I had gone. We had learned some new fishing techniques, hooked and caught fish, had a great lunch, and learned some good fishing spots to fish when we canoed the river two days latter. Would I do it again, yes. However, I would be sure to hire Jed from Indigo guide service as my first choice. Mad River Habitat Improvement Continues at West Liberty Park

As many of you are aware, the Madmen Chapter of Trout Unlimited along with volunteers from area fly fishing clubs have been carrying out in-stream/riparian habitat improvement activities, in cooperation with the Upper Mad River Watershed Group. Recently the most demanding project was completed in the West Liberty Park in cooperation with the West Liberty Lions Club. On the mornings of September 8th through the 10th, the volunteers cabled in 18 logs and placed over 40 tons of cobble and boulders to not only create in-stream habitat but also to address bank erosion issues and overall water quality. Also, involved in the project was the consulting firm Oxbow Stream Restoration, Inc. and owner Steve Phillips, to address the more complex bank stabilization issues and incorporate more elaborate habitat such as "Lunker Structures". The entire project should be completed by the end of September.

The in-stream habitat work will continue through the fall with work planned at St. Rt. 29/296 and St. Rt. 36. If you would like to volunteer your time for this very worthwhile cause there is a workday at St. Rt. 29/296 from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. on Saturday and every other weekend until November 24th. November 5th - in-stream habitat improvement and cleanup at St Rt 36; November 19th - complete any projects before winter.
