Stream Quality Monitoring

Back in April our guest speaker was Rod King from ODNR (Ohio Department of Natural Resources). He spoke about a program called Stream Quality Monitoring. After several phone calls, emails, and rescheduling because of high water, we were finally able to hold our stream quality monitoring training on Saturday, August 15th at Caesar Creek Access Point on the Little Miami River. We had 15 B.U.F. F. members at this training ready to learn more about water monitoring and entomology.

Stream Quality Monitoring (SQM) is a biological monitoring of the water quality of the stream. The process we were using was having seine (nets) downstream of where we were turning over rocks and kicking up the river bottom. The micro invertebrates (or bugs) then get swept downstream into the seine. We then took seine over to shore where we collected various bugs and identified them and put them into separate compartments. Some bugs are less tolerant of pollution, while others are more tolerant to pollution. Bugs that are less tolerant of pollution get higher points and bugs that can tolerate pollution get a lower point. We then add up all the points for a total score to see where it falls on a scale. The higher the score the better the quality of water and the lower score the less quality of water.

SQM is a new conservation program for our club and working with Rod King and the ODNR we have been assigned two sections of the Little Miami River to monitor. The first section is Bass Island area in Newton, Ohio and the second section is Caesar Creek Access point in Waynesville, Ohio. Three times per year we will do stream quality monitoring at each section. The water monitoring will take place in months of May/June, July/August, and September/October. Because so many individuals want to help monitor our local waters we will be able to have two teams. One team will monitor the Bass Island area and the other team will monitor the Caesar Creek Access area.

We are so thrilled that so many members have signed up to be involved in SQM. Our club is involved in so many activities so having that many people want to help monitor our local water just shows how great our members really are. Thank you to all of those that participated!! If you are interested in being involved and were not able to attend our training, please contact me. SQM is a great way to determine the health of our water but, it also teaches about what insects are living in the areas we fish. Who knows maybe learning more about insects will help us catch more fish. We can only hope.





Dumb Bass

A great leap in fishing savvy can be expected with the accumulation of scientific knowledge about fish. For example, a four year study of recapture rates at a catch and release lake in Illinois showed that the average bass was caught only twice in a single season while some individuals were caught up to sixteen times. Obviously some bass are not as gifted with intelligence as others and it may be that smartness or a lack thereof is genetic and could be passed on to the offspring. The Texas Parks & Wildlife Agency explored the possibility of developing a race of dumb bass that would allow their anglers more fishing success. They would study of a population of bass in an aquarium then carefully sort the dummies from the more astute. The dummies were mated with other dummies and only the offspring that exhibited a sufficient lack of intelligence were allowed to further the breed thus resulting in a strain of mentally challenged bass. It was a

great disappointment to discover that the bass that were developed over several generations of carefully selected dummies exhibited the same level of intelligence as the usual bass population.
