Mike Porto, "Fisheries of Southwest Ohio – Lakes and Streams"

Mike grew up in the Dayton area and loves fishing for smallmouth in the Great Miami River. Mike has been a Fisheries Biologist with the Ohio Division of Wildlife for almost 5 years. He is assigned to Division 5 of ONDR, the Division responsible for SW Ohio. Prior to joining the ODNR, Mike worked for the Indiana Division of Fish and Wildlife. He also has an MS in Fish and Wildlife Resources from West Virginia University. Mike will be speaking about the most recent fish survey results from the Great and Little Miami Rivers, as well as from East Fork, Cowan, Caesars Creek, and Acton Lakes.

The Division of Wildlife of the ONDR is a direct descendent of the Ohio Fish Commission created in 1873 to deal with declining fish population in our inland waterways and lakes. It became part of



the ONDR, when it was established in the late 1940's. The division is involved in the management of fisheries for 124,000 acres of inland water, 7,000 miles of streams, the Ohio acreage of Lake Erie, and the Ohio length of the Ohio River. As anglers we benefit from habitat management and improvement programs, stocking programs, constructing and maintaining access to fishing areas, and conservation efforts.

Adventures of Mighty Mite

Our Conservation Director, Tom Britton, notified BUFF of a training lesson led by Rebecca Parry of ODNR. It was my introduction to Stream Monitoring, and I drove to the session at Bass Island one Thursday evening. Five participates were set to learn about macro-invertebrates on the Little Miami River.



Did you know that there are three classes of invertebrates with known sensitivities to water quality? Most trout fishermen already know that the mayfly, caddis, and stonefly are very sensitive to water quality. This is the food source for most trout. So, clean creeks and rivers are essential to maintain our beautiful trout.



Less known is a reclusive bug, really a giant of bugs, the hellgrammite. In a warm water stream, it must be a very tasty treat for large fish such as the smallmouth bass. I'm told finding one of these bugs is rare. What a treat, when we found *Mighty Mite*! This prehistoric-looking creature is being held by Rebecca is shown to the left.

Of course, I thought about how to clone him onto a fishing hook. All I could think about is how to make a wide tape profile with a flexible body. Not an easy feat.

Along with Mighty Mite, we found tiny caddis larva and various types of mayflies. I was amaze that my imitations were so much larger than the real thing in the Little Miami River. In fact, one caddis larva was the thickness of thread! Yes, magnifying lens are needed.

Another big creature that we were fortunate to interact with was the crane fly larva. So thick and so curly. Certainly, a stiff size 8 hook is not realistic. I asked myself, how can it be made with articulation? Alas, still thinking.

My knowledge of stream biology and imitative fly tying was enriched in this short on-stream lesson. I'm sure every SQM trip will be a learning experience.

One more learning step though. I had to prod Rebecca for the next level course - Steam 201: <u>Electroshock counting</u>. So now, I'm waiting for her to offer this next level course, and as a boy at heart, I can't wait.

Small Mouth Bass Fishing in Ohio Waters

Following last month's presentation by Jen Ripple on seasonal approaches to fishing for small mouth bass, Tom found and shared an article on the ODNR site about small mouth bass fishing in our local waters. I went to that, and found some interesting information, and we both felt it would be appropriate to share in this month's BUFFER.

The best small mouth fishing is on our rivers and streams which maintain natural populations of these exciting fish. Reservoirs and lakes can maintain some natural populations, but numbers are generally lower. A few lakes are stocked with small mouth. A 2018 forecast chart on the ODNR site ranked lake fishing for small mouth based on numbers caught and size for the top 10 lakes over 50 acres in size.

Fishing tips were very similar to those that Jen mentioned -

- Small mouth bass use pools to rest and feed and runs and riffles below pools when most actively feeding
- When a bass strikes, raise the tip of the pole to prevent the fish getting into cover
- In summer, bass avoid direct sunlight when the can, so fish deep pools, cover, and shaded areas of a stream
- Cast past the target and retrieve to the intended area.

One point, that is worth knowing for fishing smaller streams in Ohio is that stream bottoms can be owned by the landowner. Hence, it is important to get permission prior to wading through private property.

The website also contained information about how and where to fish seasonally for small mouth. The location information seemed to agree with what Jen Ripple shared with use at the August meeting. The lures discussed, seemed to focus spin fishing lures, rather than flies. Here is a seasonal summary for location –

Early Spring (Mar – Apr)	Deep pools with cover of woods, boulders, undercut banks		
Late Spring (May)	Rocky bottoms of streams with slow moving water. Males may be guarding nests. Jen suggested we do not take fish guarding nests, so that populations are maintained.		
Summer (June – mid- Sept)	Runs & where riffles and pools meet. Shady areas are often good		
Fall (mid Sept – Nov)	Fish pools and runs around cover. As water temperature drops, fish will spend more time in deeper pools.		
Winter	Deep pools around any available cover.

Guided Fishing on the Little Miami

Jim Terlinden accepted the idea of sending in fishing experiences of our members to include in the BUFFER. Here is a summary of a great day with a local guide on local waters. Jim, thank you for sharing this with your fellow anglers!

At the 2018 banquet, I won the silent auction item for a guided day fishing on the Little Miami River donated by Delamere and Hopkins. I contacted them in the fall to set up the trip. Unfortunately, the canoe liveries had shut down their canoes during the week for the fall season, and were only running on the weekends. Also, the fishing reports had not been good, so Mark Walters, one of the D&H staff and guides, suggested we do it in the spring. I told him the spring was a good idea.

I met with Mark at their spring party in their shop. He told me we could get together in June, after the spawn, to set up the trip. Of course, every time we had the trip scheduled, the water levels or the weather did not cooperate. Finally, on a Tuesday late in July, we had it rescheduled again. On Sunday of that week, Mark gave me a call to say it looked like rain on Tuesday and asked if we could do it on Monday. I got a substitute for my golf league and went fishing with Mark. Time on the water is better than time on the golf course.

We met at Morgan's Canoe Livery in





Oregonia, got our canoe and set off. The weather was beautiful, and the water level and clarity were great. It started out slow. Mark had one rod rigged up with a popper and I had a brown wooly bugger on my 6 weight. I had one bass come up to a popper, but it turned away. After fishing the wooly bugger for a while with no strikes, Mark decided to change the fly. The new fly was similar to the one I was using but a little bit darker and with rubber legs.

It wasn't long after that I casted to a downed tree and caught my first bass of the day. I caught 1 more from the same hole. The fishing continued to be good. I caught my biggest smallmouth on a fly rod at 13-¾ inches, and I picked up my first smallmouth on a popper later in the day.

Mark sent me photos he took during the day. I sent him an email thanking him for being my chauffeur on the water, fly rod caddy, caterer, photographer and putting me in the right spots. I also thanked him for donating the trip and being a supporter of our club.

Fly Fishing the Clinch River, TN, with Rocky Top Anglers

Here's a recent trip taken by Bob & Wendy Gustafson.

The Clinch River is in Northeast Tennessee about 3 ½ hours from Cincinnati, and about 30 minutes north of Knoxville. The Clinch is a tailwater fishery, flowing from Norris Lake Dam. Wendy and I have driven over the Clinch for years on I-75 heading south. Every passing included scoping out the river below and declaring that it "looked fishy". We finally got a chance to fish it after I won a half day float trip donated by Rocky Top Anglers at the 2019 BUFF Banquet.

The Clinch is a tailwater fishery, so fishing times and conditions are dictated by water releases from Norris Dam. Be sure to check the TVA release schedule before entering the water (<u>https://www.tva.gov/Environment/Lake-Levels/Norris</u> or TVA LakeInfo app on iPhone or android).

On the weekend day in late July that we fished, TVA was doing "recreational releases" designed to support kayaking, canoeing, and fishing downstream. When we started out in the morning, there was "minimal flow", and then TVA operated one generator from 10 -2, which increased flow and water level on the river. There were a few fishing boats on the water when we put in at minimal flow, mostly clustered below shallow upstream shoals. Later, when the water came up there were lots more kayaks and canoes on the river. Fishing was good all day, but picked up once the water came up.

We fished with Rocky Cox, who proved to be a great guide and drift boat oarsmen. Rocky is also the owner of Rocky Top Anglers. He consistently put us into good positions beyond other boat fishermen, who preferred to wait for the water to rise rather than work to get beyond the shoals. He is a veteran guide, patient, skilled at keeping lines rigged, untangled and ready, and he really knows the Clinch River, his home water. The fishing technique of the day was nymphing under an indicator, using a tandem rig with weighted nymphs. While the Clinch is managed by TWRA as a trophy fish tailwater, most of the fish (all rainbows) we caught were chunky beauties in the 14-16" range (Wendy, of course, caught the biggest fish). I tried tight lining soft hackle flies, but as usual, the guide knew best! Our float trip was a round trip, paddled upstream and then drifted back downstream, from the Peach Orchard boat ramp.

The trip was as much about exploring and getting to know the river as it was fishing. The Clinch is best fished from a boat. However, wade fishing is possible during periods of no generation. According to Rocky, the best wade fishing is available downstream of the weir dam and Miller's Island. The river is big enough at this point to handle a number of fishermen. Another good access point is at the Second Baptist Church in Clinton, TN. There is designated parking for anglers at the church parking lot.

We had a great time fishing with Rocky and highly recommend his guide service if you are in the Clinton/Knoxville area. More information about Rocky Top Anglers, their guides, and the rivers they guide, is on their website - <u>http://rockytopanglers.com/</u>
