September Speaker – Jerry Regan, "Grayling Michigan Fly Tyer Extraordinaire"

Today there are only a few people alive who provide a direct connection to the golden age of fly tying in the Grayling area. Jerry Regan is a retired barber from Swartz Creek, Michigan, and at 75 years old, is still fishing and tying. He is a third-generation commercial tier who grew up in the region and has owned a house on the Au Sable River for many decades. He has taught fly tying classes for over 40 years, and been a guest tier and speaker at many shows and programs throughout the mid-west and in Canada,






Jerry is a font of information about the Au Sable River and its history. He has worked as a guide on the river, and tied flies commercially. While he no longer guides, he still ties flies for Grayling- area fly shops, and you'll see him at local shows and events, keeping the fly tying traditions of the region alive. Jerry presents programs on the historical flies that are indigenous to the Grayling area.

Most of the flies Jerry ties are from natural materials that he collects and dyes himself. Regan may be best known for his series of spinner imitations. These flies went through several stages of development and were finalized in the late 1980's after thorough testing by guides and anglers. They have been available in Grayling fly shops for nearly 40 years.

On Friday August 20th, Jim Vota passed the examination and became a FFI Certified Casting Instructor (CCI). This is not a simple process. The Casting Instructor Exam is administered by FFI Master Casting Instructors. It includes an Exam Workshop which provides an overview of the history of this program and discusses elements of effective casting instruction. The candidate then takes a written examination which covers casting mechanics, fishing knowledge, knots, tackle, and teaching techniques. Finally, the candidate completes a Performance Exam which includes demonstrating proficiency in 15 casting techniques and 7 teaching tasks. One of the skills is to demonstrate a straight cast of 75 feet or more.

We extend congratulations to Jim on attaining the FFI CCI status. For those of us who have been participating in our weekly FFI casting





challenge program, we know that he has applied himself very seriously to honing the casting skills and working on teaching knowledge for the past several months. His achievement is well deserved.

Jim is only the 8th person in Ohio with FFI CCI status! Furthermore, of the 8 people who are FFI CCIs, 4 are members of BUFF – Jim, Gary Begley, Tom Scheer, and Steve Walker.

Tarpon Fishing in Belize

I have been gearing up for a real flats fishing adventure for the last several years. I retired a year ago and researched a 'trip of a lifetime'. Cancun, Cuba, the Bahamas, Christmas Island, and Belize. I decided on Tarpon Caye Lodge in Belize as several folks recommended it. I partnered up with my good friend and guide, Kevin Morlock. We spent six great days targeting permit, bonefish, and tarpon. The fishing was tough and exhilarating. If you are lucky, you visually interact with a permit for 10 seconds over a 20-minute period and have one shot to put in a cast within 2 feet of the fish. I had lots of shots, but never came tight.



One evening we were targeting tarpon. My cast of an intermediate sinking line into a deep cut came tight. When I put the wood to the fish using a 12-wt Orvis Hydros, the rod blew up in my hand! The guide leapt over three rows of seats in the boat and said, "I'll hand line the fish, you reel up the slack!", but the fish was gone. Thankfully. it was a rental rod, not mine! My thought was that if I broke every rod in the boat, I would still have had a GREAT week!

Kevin Morlock , the owner of Indigo Guide Service which is based outside of Luddington, MI, is a long-time friend and supporter of BUFF. Kevin guides in a variety of places, including the Pere Marquette River in Western Michigan for trout, steelhead, and salmon. In summers he guides on Lake Michigan from Beaver Island, fishing carp, pike, and bass, and for several years he has taken folks fishing in Southern Louisiana for drum redfish. 


FFI Virtual Fly Fishing Expo – November 5th – 7th

Fly Fishers International will host the 2021 Virtual Fly Fishing Expo from November 5th to 7th. Due to the ongoing COVID pandemic, what is normally an in-person exposition, with, for 2021 be a 'virtual' gathering of fly fishing experts and enthusiasts. There are numerous presentations and workshops on casting and tying, and general discussions. Attending the expo required registration. Many of the activities are fee-based, but there are also free sessions. The web page provides a listing of all sessions offered on each day, and the costs of fee-based sessions. There is however, a \$25 registration fee (for FFI members) to attend the Expo. If you are not currently a member of FFI, and wish to attend, registration is \$60, which includes the \$25 registration fee plus 1-year FFI membership (\$35).

Most sessions have limited enrollment. Also, there are 'pre-Expo activities, such as multi-week fly tying classes, *some of which start in early- to mid-September*. These are listed on the "Pre-Expo Activities" page of the website. Check out the site, and if you are interested, register sooner than later to avoid missing an opportunity for a class or workshop.



Buffalo Bill Angler's Camp Report

As promised, I'm reporting on our exploratory trip to the Wyoming. Nineteen BUFF members signed up for trip in the Shoshone National Forest – a land of 2.5 million acres. This region is comprised of Beartooth, Wind River and Absaroka mountains bordered on the West by Yellowstone Park. For those who have watched the TV series Longmire, yes, the Absaroka mountains is the region repeatedly mentioned in the show.

The Good - The Bad - And The Ugly

- **The Good**: The camp's location and management were very good. Normally, this would be an excellent location with easy access to great fishing. The camp management attended to all reasonable requests and provided great shuttle service to fishing spots. All locations inside and outside of the park were beautiful places to fish.
- **The Bad:** High water temperatures limited fishing times in Yellowstone to 2pm. Bison crossings in the park were all too common and tested our patience.
- **The Ugly**: Rains this year filled the local rivers with silt creating a chocolate malt mess. The outcome was longer driving times to clear fishable water.

Arrival at the Buffalo Bill Angler's Camp, aka Boy Scout camp, on Saturday was uneventful. We were assigned our bear spray and our cabin number. For those arriving early, the bottom bunk bed was ideal. We best describe the cabins as rustic: all you need without any extra amenities. The mess hall was the center of all activity. A large log cabin structure with fireplaces was a gathering place for many at all times of the day or night. Snacks and stories were always available.

The Shoshone River and Fishhawk Creek bordered the camp. The Fishhawk was an easy walk and yielded numerous trout. Nearby was Middle Fork with great fishing in the sections near the park. Because of recent rains, the Shoshone was filled with sediment and not fishable. Longer drives were needed to find the gin clear western waters such as Gibbons, Slough, Clarks Fork and Greybull. The fishing at these rivers was challenging but good as in any year.

The camp's management was a highlight. Given the difficulties created by the weather, the staff went to extreme lengths to make this a great experience. Meals were good and plentiful. Every night, staff gathered us for fishing reports and best prospects for the next day. Shuttles drove you to the best rivers starting at 4:30am (for the gung-ho fisher). Any issues were quickly handled. The interest in building a great camp and their diligence to deliver was greatly appreciated.

While this trip was challenging, the resounding consensus from BUFF participates was strongly positive. Most people will plan on another trip as they see the potential for great fishing. The value, location, and camp management all make this a worthwhile and memorable trip. We only hope that weather will return to conditions of the past two years when all local streams fished well, and all reports were excellent. I will plan on going again next year and hope that the trifecta of *drought – fire - rain* will not strike the same place twice.

Great Miami River Fishing

I went fishing on the Great Miami the evening of August 24th. The first hour or so was mainly very frustrating. The wind was blowing down on me which made it difficult to cast. What made it even harder was the fact that I couldn't find a strike indicator, so I had to tie a tag on the first 12 inches of my leader and hang a slider (more specifically something called a Sneaky Pete). The big streamer really made it hard to cast but I could at least know what the bottom fly was doing.

Early in the evening, say about 5 PM as I went out after work, I caught a few rock bass and one on the dropper, and then nothing for most of the next hour. Again, I was using the hop.

I have read many times that it really pays to watch what's going on around you and last night proved to be no exception. The water I was fishing was no more that 18 to 20 inches deep, so I really expected to be able to see the fish. What happened next made it obvious that I couldn't. About two or three times I saw a lone minnow jump, and I thought they were feeding on the few midges that were rising. Boy was I wrong! So, after seeing this again, I made a cast in that general direction, and then made a couple of hops while waiting for the drag to turn the slider before making another one. On the third hop, I had a huge explosion with my Sneaky Pete disappearing in the spray of water. I have to say I was super surprised when I brought that smallie to the net. It was the biggest of the night (14+ inches) and it changed how I fished for the rest of the evening.

I continued to use the hop for about another hour, in the hope that I could get lucky and catch two on one cast, one on the bottom bouncer and another on the slider. But after my buddy caught a monster rock bass things changed. Not so much because I wasn't having any luck with the hop but because I had watched my buddy's cast.

Most people think that a big pop is the way to get a smallies attention. I agree and use that approach, but only do in choppy water conditions. For example, fishing a riffle with lots of waves and what I would call flow noise. This is usually in the head or what I call the throat of the pool. However, my friend was making strong pops all the time, and not having any success. That's what set me on using the slider for my top water, and instead of popping it, I made a downstream mend and let the current pull it. You can do the same thing with slow steady strips as well. What is important is to get the fly to create a wake about the size of a big slice of pizza. The wake will be at least a half an inch or taller and be very obvious. It looks like a snake or mouse is swimming in the water for those that have seen it.

So now it's about 7 pm. I've decided that I'm going to fish water that my buddy hasn't since my big fish of the night was in water he hadn't fished. WHAT A GREAT DECISION! I walked about 100 yards up stream, where were several riffles along with 3 or 4 very defined pools. I had one lazy splash on drifting my Sneaky Pete through the front of one pool and then nothing. I made several casts to the front of that pool and swam the slider back out with no luck. Then I made a cast to the tail of that pool and caught another 10-inch smallie.

Now I'm really getting pumped up. I've found that using the fly as a waking object was the ticket. I had already cut off the crawfish and put the slider there instead before walking up into this stretch of water and was really looking forward to the next pool. Again, nothing in the front. My next cast was into the middle of the pool and shortly after the fly hit the water another explosive spray. This is the fish in the photo , and was my second largest fish of the night.

After that monster came out of the pool, you wouldn't think I'd catch another, but when I cast to the back of the pool and stripped the fly back out, creating that pizza wake, I caught another 10 incher. And then I learned something else. You can make a downstream cast just like you do with the hop and let the current drag your fly back. I had several small fish attack that fly. Not sure what they were but the first guy was just hiding behind a little rock in water that was only 6 inches deep. He missed the fly, but I used that to my advantage. I had 3 or 4 more little fish rise and attack Pete. None were big enough to eat it but



was it fun. I caught 3 more 10 - 12 inch smallies over the next 5-10 minutes.

Hope you enjoyed this as much as I did. What a great night.
