## BUFF Fly Tying Classes

I plan to change things a bit for our winter fly tying classes. All classes will be at the Springdale Community Center, starting at 6 PM and running until 8 – 8:30 PM

**Final general topic class – Tuesday, February 3<sup>rd</sup>**

- **Dry Flies** – my favorite fishing; there's nothing like watching a fish rise to and take a fly you tied.

**Beginners Fly Tying – Tuesdays, February 17<sup>th</sup> – March 10<sup>th</sup>**

I'm going to change things up a bit with our beginning classes. I'm going to open the classes to everyone. Beginners will be tying larger sized flies, while those with more experience will have smaller sizes with "extras". Trust me; I'll make it challenging for the experienced tyer. For example, if we are tying an Adams, beginners will tie it in size 10, and those with experience, may be doing an 18 or 20! As usual, the more experienced tiers will be available to coach and help our beginner tiers.

**Additional Classes -**

Tuesday, Mar 17<sup>th</sup> **Articulated Flies** – Articulated flies look alive and are extremely effective for picky fish. We will be learning how to use shanks and mono/wire methods.



Tuesday, Mar 24<sup>th</sup> **Flies for White Bass Fishing** – This will get folks ready, and fly boxes stocked up for the white bass trips to Indiana. White with some weight gets you most of the way, but we will be adding some colors and flash to really get them biting.

Tuesday, April 14<sup>th</sup> **Flies for Bluegill & Bass** – Spawning season for bluegill and bass will be just around the corner, and this class will get you ready for them. Bully spiders and various other top water flies will be on the schedule.

## Vetted External Trips

BUFF offers many trips for fly fishing. However, trips organized by organizations can offer even more opportunities for BUFF members to travel and fish together. The key to this opportunity is to find vetted trips, and select a common date for BUFF to attend. With this note, we are starting this process.

We are fortunate in that one of our members (and past NKFF president), Tim Guilfoile, has created trips to Wyoming and Michigan via negotiations with local boy scout councils. A good number of BUFF members have attended these trips in the past, and continue to do so. Another trip, announced last year, is an opportunity to fish in Montana on a trip organized by Western Kentucky University. For all these trips, sponsors have booths at the Fly Show in February. They can answer many questions for you. One thing I can add, is that all of these trips are quite affordable for the location and fishing opportunities.



As a club, we are selecting weeks to recommend for BUFF travel. These weeks do not conflict with BUFF trips. Below are the recommended weeks:

- **Week of May 26<sup>th</sup>** - Michigan Anglers' Base Camp is in Claire, Michigan. This is a scout facility with modern lodging and full food service. The location allows for a 30 to 75 minute drive to many classic and top-rated trout streams. For more information including costs and what is included in the week of fishing see the website - <https://michiganscouting.org/anglers-basecamp/>
- **Week of July 26<sup>th</sup>** – Wyoming Anglers' Base Camp near Cody, Wyoming. This is a primitive scout facility with full food service and transportation to local fishing streams. At this time, there are only 6 spots open. So, for a large group, the week of August 2<sup>nd</sup> may be more suitable. - **Week of September 20<sup>th</sup>** – The WKU-hosted Montana trip is based in Missoula, MT. Lodging is local hotels. Fishing for four days via guided float trips is included in the package. Limited fishing experience is required. [wku.edu/flyfishing/](http://wku.edu/flyfishing/)
- **October tbd** – Western Michigan Angler's Salmon Trip will be offered. Location regarding lodging and details, and dates will be announced later in the year.

## Fish Stocking News – or Lack Thereof

I've been looking at the Ohio DNR website. They list a spring schedule for rainbow trout stocking in regional lakes. These are adult (10 – 13") fish and are stocked for harvest. Stocking starts once ice is gone from the lakes, and this is usually by early-to-mid March. However, the DNR has not yet posted locations and stocking dates. Hopefully we will know this for next month's BUFFER.

Similarly, the KY Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources has not yet posted 2026 stocking dates either. This is due to the very cold and snowy weather we have been experiencing. They will post a schedule once weather improves to allow stocking.

## Fall Stocking in Michigan

This past fall, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources worked hard to stock fish in waters across the state. The fall effort stocked seven different species at 76 locations throughout the state; with a total of almost 650,000 fingerling-size fish. The species stocked this fall included Atlantic salmon, brook trout, brown trout, lake trout, rainbow trout (Eagle Lake and steelhead strains), walleye and muskellunge.

Six state and three cooperative fish hatcheries work together to produce the species, strains and sizes of fish needed for stocking. The number and type of fish stocked vary by hatchery, as each facility's ability to rear fish differs due to water supply and temperature. In general, fish are reared in Michigan's state fish hatcheries anywhere from one month to 1.5 years before they are stocked. Most fish are stocked in

the spring. Fish stocked in the fall require less time and fewer resources to rear in hatcheries, and may adjust better to new environments as they are younger and more adaptable to change.

Numbers of fish by species were almost 165,000 rainbow trout, over 28,000 brook trout and 17,000 brown trout, over 41,000 walleye, almost 400,000 steelhead and about 3,000 muskellunge. The fish were placed in a range of rivers and lakes across the state. The photo is of a walleye fingerling.



## Other Things of Interest

### Roll Casting Technique

While few of us are likely to be fishing locally, unless one enjoys ice fishing, it is not too early to start working on and thinking about casting techniques. Here are two short videos, one from the Gink & Gasoline blog and another from the Orvis teaching pages that demonstrate and discuss the roll cast. The roll cast is essentially a forward cast made without doing a standard back cast. It is very, very useful and an critical cast to have in one's casting arsenal as it allows us to cast when there are obstructions behind us, so that a back cast is impossible. This is a situation we often find ourselves in when on a river of stream. We teach and practice this regularly in our fly casting classes and at our Wednesday AM casting gatherings. Even when one can do a back cast, a roll cast is sometimes easier to perform. An example may be when fishing with a guide from a boat, it can sometimes, even often, be easier to do a roll cast than working to bring your line over the boat and perhaps between yourself and the guide or another angler.

## Change in Wyoming Fishing Rules for 2026

I also found this in the MidCurrent blog. As of January 1 of this year, Wyoming's Game and Fish Department is requiring all angling on North Platte River tailwaters to be limited to barbless hooks. The agency has been surveying fish in the region for hook damage. Over 20% of trout and over 70% of all fish surveyed show signs of damage from being previously hooked. Many of the fish showed damage that was considered potentially lethal. The increase in fishing pressure in the region almost assures that

all fish inhabiting the region are being caught multiple times. More detailed information is on their website at -

## Low Snowpack in the Rockies

Another article on this blog site discusses the potential impact that low snow levels in many western regions will have on fishing rivers in 2026. Satellite mapping data, indicate mid-January snow cover in many western regions was at its lowest levels since data began being recorded in 2001. It is not drought; there has been plenty of rain, but warm temperatures have meant that it has been rain, which enters and drains from the rivers. The usually expected snow pack acts as a reservoir to gradually supply water, as the snow pack melts, into the streams, and this is not happening. The central and southern Rockies are the most impacted by these conditions. The full article can be found at -
